

24 Million Salk Shots Released to Pregnant Women, Youngsters

WASHINGTON (AP)—The government Wednesday made millions more children, and pregnant women, eligible for first call on Salk antipolio shots.

Expanding vaccine supplies enabled Secretary of Welfare Folsom to announce a new flexible program for inoculations which broadens the priority age group by five years and includes pregnant women.

been given children aged 5 through 9. Under the new plan which will guide allocation of vaccine among states the group may be extended five years either way. Or, depending upon incidence of the disease in each state, additional years may be added at both ends.

Areas Differ

This means priority in one state may be set from birth to age 10, in another from 5 through 14, and in still another from 2, for example, through 11.

Folsom said that while federal priorities are not binding under the voluntary program, they have been accepted "with some few exceptions to meet local needs."

Washington, -California and Oklahoma already have broadened their priority groups.

24 Million Shots

Folsom said the Public Health Service has released nearly 24 million cubic centimeters, enough for that many shots. He said this is enough to provide two injections of the three-shot series to three-fourths of the children in the first priority group.

A Welfare Department spokesman said there have been reports vaccine allocated for the 5-9 bracket has piled up unused in some states. And "virtually all states," Folsom noted, have now recommended enlarging the priority.

Supply Still Short

Folsom said there are about 32,461,000 children under 5 and between 10 and 14. An estimated 4 million women become pregnant each year.

Incidence of polio among pregnant women was reported as about the same as among 10-year-olds and twice the rate among other women.

A department announcement said that because vaccine supplies remain short of total demand, Folsom recommended that each state "initially" add no more than five additional years to its priority group.

"This," it added, "is to enable the states to move in an orderly way into lower or higher age groups, wherever they may find their poliomyelitis problems are greatest."

Proposal for Water Storage Dams Seen

PORTLAND (AP)—Army Engineers probably will propose construction of dams at the Bruce Eddy and Penny Cliff sites on the Clearwater River to offset loss of flood water storage at John Day Dam on the Columbia.

F. S. Brown, chief of the engineering divisions of the engineers' North Pacific Division, said Wednesday that this is virtually certain. He said 3,733,000 acre feet of water could be stored at the Clearwater sites.

Originally John Day Dam was projected as a high dam of 292 feet, capable of storing two million acre feet of water for flood control. But opposition developed and the proposal was revised to 262 feet, at which only a half-million acre feet could be stored.

The Army Engineers' board of review for rivers and harbors last month refused to approve the lower dam. Notice of the rejection was received here Wednesday.

Brown said sites other than those on the Clearwater also will be named, but that Bruce Eddy and Penny Cliff probably will receive the first firm recommendation as storage substitutes for John Day.

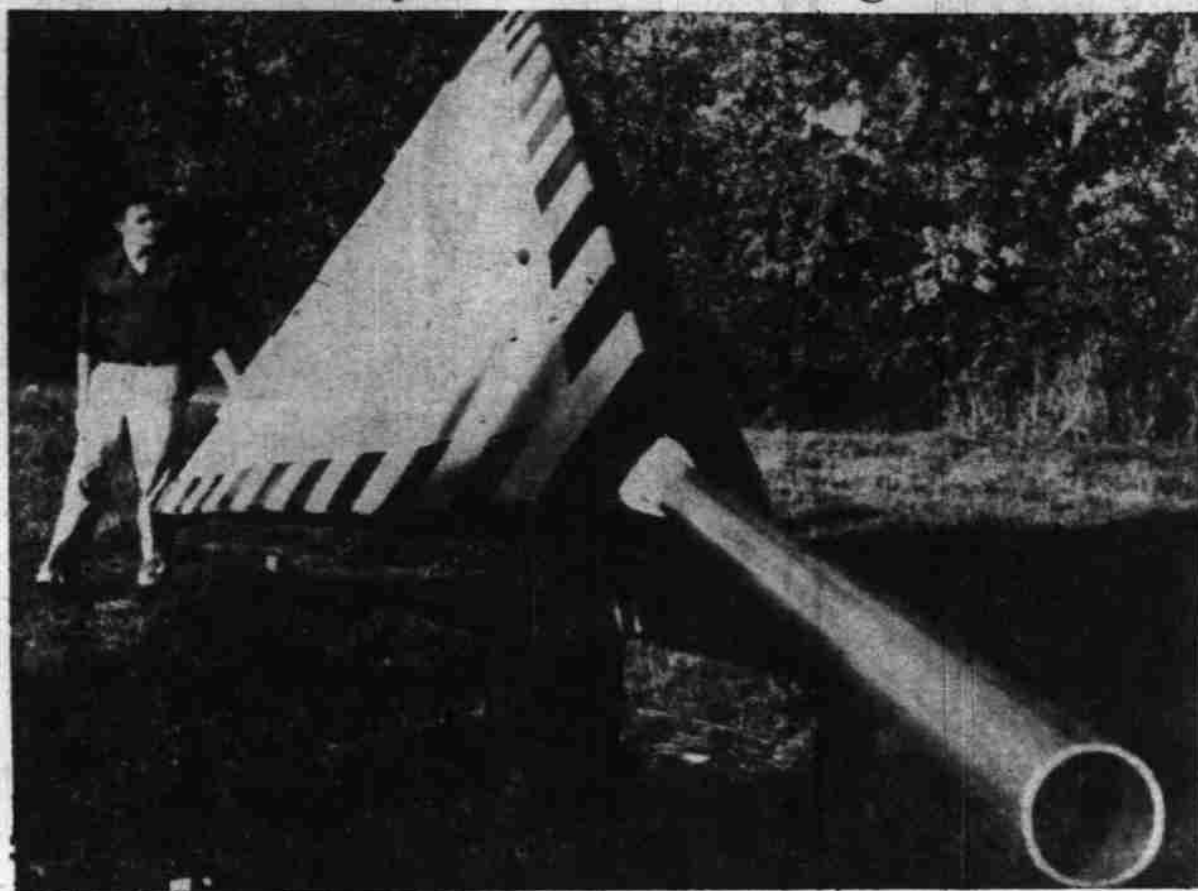
City Parks Plan Planting Project

New Castle Plant Starts Production

NEW CASTLE, Ind. (AP)—Piston ring production was started again Wednesday in the Perfect Circle Corp. foundry with National Guard protection, just a week after a strike riot that wounded eight persons.

The CIO United Auto Workers pickets at the gate said they counted less than 40 production workers checking in, less than one-sixth the normal production force of 260.

Chesley Juday, plant manager, said 32 production and 93 office workers reported as the doors were opened "to anyone who wants to work."

Union officials said there would be no more flareups like last week's demonstration by an estimated 5,000 sympathizers so long as almost 1,000 troopers patrol New Castle, Hagerstown and a part of Richmond. Martial law is being enforced around P. C. plants in all three cities.

FISCHER 'DOING FINE'

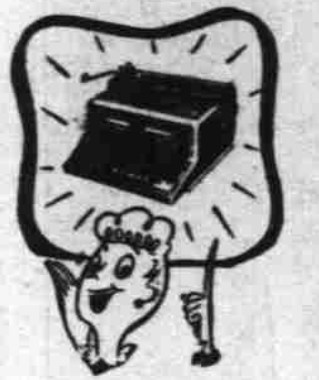

jails and prisons on the occasion of Indonesia's Independence Day. They had been held under the "state of war and siege" regulations, and all had belonged to infantry regiments.

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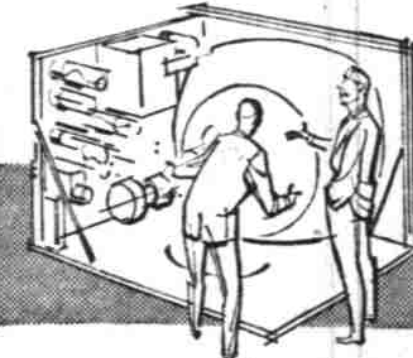


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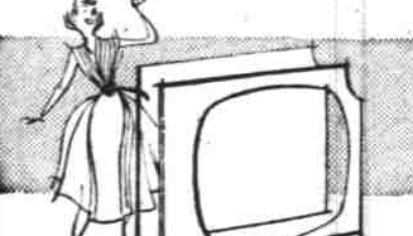
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Magic Margin frame spreads out the picture—Eye-Shade filter removes the glare.



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
