"The Changing Status of Women in Japan" will be discussed by Mrs. Natsu Tanahashi at the luncheon meeting of the Salem Branch, AAUW Saturday at 1 p.m. in the Gold Room of the Marion Hotel.

A teacher in the Methodist Mission High School in Hiroshima, Japan, Mrs. Tanahashi is enrolled at the Oregon College of Education in Monmouth while she learns of American education methods, customs and social life. She is active in TWCA work, teacher education and PTA in Japan as well as being a member of the Hiroshima chapter of the Japan Association of University Women.

Mrs. Tanahashi is a graduate of Japan Women's University in Tokyo and has been a teacher in the Methodist school since 1948, when her husband was disabled after being exposed to radiation in the Hiroshima bombing. Her children have remained in Japan, her two boys with her husband and her daughter in Tokyo.

It is Mrs. Tanahashi's hope that she may promote mutual understanding and good will between her nation and the United States while she is becoming more familiar with secular and religious education and American family life.

Acting as American sponsors for Mrs. Tanahashi are Professor and Mrs. Floyd B. Albin and Professor and Mrs. Matthew R. Thompson, both of Monmouth, and Dr. and Mrs. Donald H. Scaring of Independence.

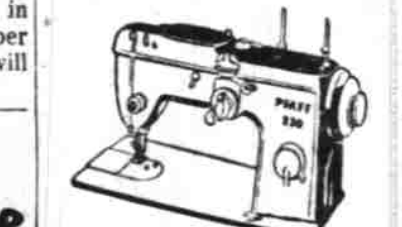
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Too Too Taboo A Milkless World Can Still Be a Gastronomic Adventure Says Expert

Standing by the dairy showcase in one of our showy, well-stocked markets today, we felt a little like a youngster, with nose pressed against the toyshop window, yearning for what's inside.

Allergic to milk and its products for nigh onto a quarter of a century, we like to dream of what's inside the dairy cases and wonder what whipping cream, cottage cheese and yogurt tastes like—it's been so long we can't even remember. But really it makes little difference, our gastronomic life is a happy one.

The milk allergic has been much better cared for these past few years, for with labeling many products now carefully list the ingredients, and we are constantly surprised at the foods that contain no milk. Many cookies, most crackers, graham crackers, and even some white rolls contain none of the forbidden products.

There are many persons with allergies, and some find a milk-taboo difficult to cope with, but take it from one who's been coddling it carefully, it's a simple nut to crack, once you know the combination.

SIMPLE RULES

For instance, we can eat butter, but not margarine (there's milk in the latter). We can eat rye bread, and most French breads and hard rolls. We can eat mixes that contain no milk, when made with water (and they are lovely and light and tender made that way.) We can have scone mix made with water, though other biscuits mixes are made with dry milk so one has to whip up her own combination.

Cheddar and other whole milk cheeses are permissible, also goats milk cheese and blue and Roquefort, but not any of the re-processed cheeses. And we can eat a bit of very dry cottage cheese, because it's just curd, and no cream has been put back into it. Cream cheese is taboo.

Crackers are almost all edible, but the label of one in a blue package reveals buttermilk as an ingredient so it's out. Anything made with breadcrumbs is off the list unless made with known crumbs.

Most pie crusts, even commercially made ones are ok, but once in a while we run across a restaurant pie with a milk glaze that cuts up inside us. Most lemon pies are all right, but we check to determine whether it's been given even a teensy weensy bit of cream by some over-zealous cook.

No frozen desserts are on our list, for even sherbets made down town have milk. We make some at home with fruit juices and commercial sherbet mixes that suit admirably, though they may seem a little thin to the confirmed ice cream eater.

LOOKING UP

We've found that life without milk is still worth living, and have come to believe that the extra bother of eating soy bean or other simulated milks is not worth the effort. We simply stick to milkless food and thrive happily on such a diet.

But the main thing about an allergy diet, as we see it is that one step across the forbidden line and nobody suffers but oneself.

And as for the other fellow, if a hostess finds her guest to be allergic, she will do him a kind service by telling him the foods he must avoid, even if he has to settle for a soft boiled egg. It will be a kindness to him. She may never know her food has been a source of discomfort, for he may not tell her, but allergies are real and far from imaginary. She may think what he does not know is harmless, but she may also be a hostess with a suspicious guest the next time.
