# Four Safety Councils Due Over State

Plans are being completed for four regional industrial safety conferences in Oregon, the State Accident Prevention Division announced Thursday.

The Southwest Oregon conference will be in Coquille Nov. 5, the Pendleton conference Nov. 19, the Emerald Empire conference in Springfield, Dec. 3 and the Southern Oregon conference at Medford Dec. 10.

Regional industrial safety meetings were held earlier in the year at Dallas and Roseburg. A special industries conference is planned for Portland late in the year.

The conferences replace the state-wide governors' conference this year and are designed for discussion of regional safety problems by employers and employees in the area. They are co-sponsored by a local safety committee and the accident prevention division.

There will be panel discussion groups to iron out the on-the-job safety problems. Logging, log hauling, sawmilling and construction will be considered at all of the conferences.

It was expected that a food, grain and wool panel would be arranged for the Pendleton conference and a fruit panel at Medford.

It was anticipated that more than 400 persons would attend each conference.

# U. S. Drops Grunewald Perjury Case

WASHINGTON (AP) — The government Thursday dropped a ten-count perjury indictment against Henry (The Dutchman) Grunewald, once Washington's best known wire puller.

Asst. U. S. Atty. William Hitz told Judge James R. Kirkland that "certain new evidence has been made available" to the government that "renders it inadvisable to go to trial on this particular indictment." Judge Kirkland granted the action.

Grunewald, a key figure in tax scandal investigations in 1953, is under a five-year prison sentence in federal court in New York City in a tax conspiracy case.

Grunewald also is under indictment in Baltimore for income tax evasion and in Brooklyn for perjury. He is at liberty under bonds totaling \$40,000.

The perjury indictment here grew out of Grunewald's testimony before house tax scandal investigators and before a federal grand jury. The indictment accused Grunewald, among other things, of swearing falsely when he denied he had discussed tax matters with Daniel Bolich, one-time No. 2 man in the revenue service. Bolich was among co-defendants convicted along with Grunewald in the New York tax conspiracy case.

# Plans of Fresno Bachelor to Wed Widow Called Off

FRESNO, Calif. (AP) — The plans of a Fresno bachelor with a 21-room house to marry a Texas widow with 12 children have hit a snag.

John Bente, 41, told newsmen Wednesday the wedding, originally set for next Tuesday, has been postponed indefinitely.

He said any further statement would have to come from Mrs. Clara Margerum, 37, who was enroute back to her Dallas home by bus.

Mrs. Margerum arrived last week following a romance by mail. Bente got in touch with her after reading of her attempt to rent a home in Dallas to bring together her children—11 of whom are in an orphan's home and the 12th in a polio clinic.

They said last week they planned to fix up the lower part of Bente's big house for themselves and the children and to rent the second floor.

# Evacuated CD Seeking New Office Space

The state Civil Defense headquarters staff, endangered by sagging floors in the State Office building, Thursday was looking around for new quarters.

Assistant Secretary of State William Healy said CD chiefs were looking over possible quarters in the state finance office on Ferry Street just east of South 12th Street and also on the second story of the state police building on East State street.

Healy said the move would probably take place early next week. Meanwhile the 15-employee CD staff had evacuated their basement quarters for another section in the 25-year-old state office building. The hasty move was ordered Wednesday when it was discovered the ceiling was cracking.

Pressure of heavy files in the state income tax division located on the first floor directly above the CD office, was blamed for the sagging floor.

A survey of repair work necessary is being made, Healy said Thursday and the nature and extent of repairs will probably be decided early next week. The office of William I. Williams, Salem architect, is making the survey.

The defendants in the original action asked \$50,000 general damages and \$15,000 punitive damages from the corporation in the counter action. Glendon A. Ferguson, Helen E. Ferguson, Frank Markham and Minnie B. Markham, the defendants, contend that Metropolitan Chain Stores reported the inventory at \$55,335.50 in the sale when it actually was worth \$41,835.30.

The store, at 136 N. Commercial St., was sold by the corporation May 14, 1954.

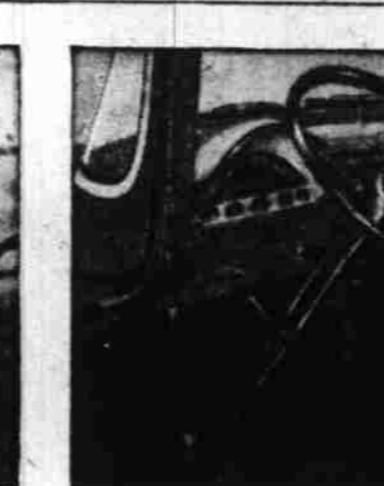
The previous low for the summer was 89 per cent.

In a letter to the British resident, Henry Steven Potter, colonial secretary Alan Lennox-Boyd gave general approval to proposals which would bring Zanzibar for the first time into the island's executive council, the protectorate's policy-making body.

MOSCOW (AP)—Burma's Premier U Nu arrived by plane Thursday at the Soviet Asian city of Tashkent, Uzbek S. S. R., to open a two-week tour of the Soviet Union. Speaking in English to thousands of cheering Uzbeks, he said "we shall struggle together for peace in the whole world and we shall achieve success."

# French Writer Wins Honor

PARIS (AP)—Jean Cocteau, jack-of-all-artistic-trades, was received Thursday in the Academie Francaise, that exclusive inner circle of French intellect.

Wearing a plumed hat, green cape and sword, he took one of the 40 coveted academy seats in a ceremony attended by French dignitaries, ambassadors, Queen Elizabeth of Belgium and Marie-Jose, former queen of Italy.

Cocteau, poet, writer, designer, painter and film producer, is 64—among the younger academy "immortals."

One of the academy's big jobs is publishing dictionaries and otherwise keeping an eye on the French language.

# Queen Slows Fire Engines

CAMBRIDGE, England (AP)—Fire engines responding to a false alarm fell in behind a procession in which Queen Elizabeth II was riding to the Guildhall here Thursday. Firemen had to slow down to avoid disrupting the procession.

The alarm came in by telephone just as the queen and the Duke of Edinburgh arrived at Cambridge station on the royal train. The caller said there was a fire on the queen's route to the Guildhall. Police said it was a "malicious call."

The queen was in Cambridge to open a veterinary school of Cambridge University.
