Chester Gaines Dies, Rites at Albany Today

JEFFERSON—Services will be held Friday at 2 p.m. in the Fisher Mortuary, Albany, for Chester B. Gaines, 85, who died Oct. 18, in the Mennonite Nursing Home, where he had been the past three months.

Burial will be in the Looney family cemetery at Looney Butte, north of Jefferson. Grave-side services will be held by Albany Lodge 4, IOOF.

A son of Abner P. Gaines and Ellen Looney Gaines, he was born Nov. 20, 1869 in Marion County. He was married April 25, 1893 at Albany to Jenny George, who died in 1942. He had worked at Bend and Salem as a state employee and had spent the last two years at Albany.

Mausoleum Planned at McMinnville

McMINNVILLE — Plans for construction of a Colonnade Crypts, Yamhill county's first mausoleum have been announced by William Macy and Glex C. Macy (McMinnville), president and secretary respectively of Evergreen Memorial Park.

Work on the marble-faced and reinforced concrete roofed mausoleum is expected to begin in early spring of 1956. The building is estimated to have a cost of more than \$30,000. It was designed by Joseph W. Heider, Portland architect.

Additional sections will be built onto the mausoleum as needed. The present building plans call for housing of 100 crypts. The mausoleum will be built in the southern section of Evergreen Memorial Park.
