

Eisenhower Takes Day Off From Duties, Chats With Golf Partner

DENVER (AP)—President Eisenhower put in a "very quiet day" Thursday in a serene 24-hour interlude of rest and relaxation between Cabinet level business conferences.

The President saw Secretary of State Dulles Wednesday and will consult Friday with Atty. Gen. Brownell. But for Thursday he put all official business aside—not even any papers to sign.

Eisenhower did mark up another "first" as his doctors reported continued satisfactory progress in his recovery from a heart attack. He visited for 15 or 20 minutes in his hospital room with Clifford J. Roberts, the New York invest-

ment banker who is an old friend and bridge and golfing companion. It was the first time since his Sept. 24 heart seizure that the Chief Executive had had a bedside visitor other than members of his family and administration officials.

Presidential Press Secretary James C. Hagerty said he imagines that from now on "more and more personal friends" will be allowed to drop in.

Cheerful Mood

Although it was a dull, grey, overcast day—the first since the early days of his illness—the doctors said the President was in a happy, cheerful mood.

They reported that his blood pressure and pulse continued normal and his cardiogram, which shows how the heart is healing, "continued to be satisfactory."

Atty. Gen. Brownell will be flying in from New York Friday for a 6 a.m. (MST) arrival at the Denver White House. He is expected to see Eisenhower in mid-morning, then hold a news conference.

Asked for guidance on the nature of Brownell's session with the Chief Executive, Hagerty said he is "coming out to discuss Department of Justice matters, including some recommendations for legislation."

Since Brownell is considered something of a political mastermind for the administration, there were conjectures here and in Washington that his trip to Denver might lead to an exploratory look at the clouded political situation.

But Hagerty tapped on the head any idea that Eisenhower and Brownell might get into politics.

As for this morning's visit from Roberts, Hagerty said that was purely social.

Roberts is chairman of the Augusta National Golf Club at Augusta, Ga. Eisenhower has a cottage at the club and has been going there for Thanksgiving and the Christmas and New Year holidays.

U.S. Economy 'Booms Along' At High Level

WASHINGTON (AP)—The American economy boomed along at a record rate of 392 billion dollars a year during the third quarter of 1955, President Eisenhower's economic advisers reported Wednesday.

A sharp upswing in personal spending accounted largely for the increase of 7 1/2 billion dollars in the July-September rate of production of goods and services.

If the pace continues, the total 1955 national product—a key gauge of economic conditions—will come close to 400 billion dollars. This would compare with slightly more than 91 billion at the end of the depression 16 years ago, and would almost double the immediate postwar figure of 209 1/2 billion in 1946.

The high for any past year was 365 billion in 1953. Last year the dollar value of all goods and services was 357 billion.

Net Profits Of Department Stores Gain

NEW YORK (AP)—Department stores racked up a 50 per cent gain in net profits in the first six months this year, the national Retail Dry Goods Assn. disclosed Wednesday and, said the NRDGA, the brisk pace should continue for the balance of the year, with Christmas sales "topping all prior records."

A survey undertaken by the NRDGA's controllers' congress showed that the higher profits for the first six months were achieved on increased sales of merchandise at lower prices. Department stores clamped down on operating costs, the survey said, and stepped up their selling punch. They also increased their newspaper advertising budgets.

After allowance for estimated income taxes, the stores' profit ratio for the first half of 1955 equalled 12 per cent of sales, Sam Flanel, general manager of the Controllers' Congress, said. This compared to the first six months last year.

CAMP FRIEDLAND, Germany (AP)—Adolf Hitler's motor pool officer, just returned from Soviet captivity, said Thursday night the Fuehrer once prepared to flee from besieged Berlin by car, but changed his mind.

"It's all the same whether I die in Berchtesgaden (Bavarian mountain retreat) or in Berlin," ex-Capt. Karl Schneider quoted Hitler as saying, "as long as the Russians do not get my body."

Schneider said he was ordered to provide the gasoline which was used April 30, 1945, to cremate the bodies of Hitler and his bride of a day, Eva Braun.
