Orchard Land Owners Told Of Tax Cuts

Of 473 parcels of property owned by Jackson County fruit growers who sought a reduction in the taxable value of their orchards, approximately 180 will receive recommended reductions in value as a result of hearings concluded last Saturday in Medford.

The State Tax Commission, acting in place of the county board of equalization, Thursday started mailing individual notices to the growers informing them of the actions of the commission and explaining the nature of their decision.

Orders Sent

The substitute duties, in winding up its legal duties, is sending orders to Robert G. Fowler, Jackson county assessor, to change the individual values to conform with the values found by the commission. In most cases the changes result from new information on acreage and the physical condition of the orchards.

Omission of the orchards trees from the tax rolls was brought to light during the course of the reappraisal program in Jackson County. Tax commission appraisers discovered that producing orchard land was placed on the tax rolls at the same value given to bare land alone. In the controversy that developed as a result of the additional value placed on the trees by the appraisers, 225 orchardists filed notices of appeal with the Jackson County board of equalization.

Valid Assessment

Samuel Stewart, tax commissioner in charge of the valuation division, said the tax commission

State Board Urges Effort to Reactivate Air Traffic Tower

Further efforts to reactivate the airport control tower in Salem, and to prevent de-commissioning of three low-frequency ranges (beams), were urged by the State Board of Aeronautics in session in Salem Thursday.

The board also instructed Director Earl Snyder to obtain two-way radio equipment for installation at the Meacham weather station in the Blue Mountains on an experimental basis. It was indicated if the Meacham installation is found valuable in providing up-to-the-minute weather reports to pilots, similar installations might be made elsewhere in areas with frequent weather changes. The equipment would be operated by personnel of the federal weather bureau.

Efforts Endorsed

The board endorsed recent efforts of Snyder and the board chairman, A. J. Dwyer of Portland, to have the Salem control tower put back into operation, and to restore the flight-plan service which was discontinued last Monday at the weather bureau which had taken it over when the control tower was abandoned by order of the CAA.

Snyder said the flight-plan service was inaugurated by the CAA in 1950 after it had been determined the number of planes in

Oregon had increased 7 per cent, the number of pilots 28 per cent. The beams which the CAA has proposed to abandon emanate from Eugene and Baker in Oregon and Toledo in Washington. The state board has contended the low-frequency ranges are vital in winter-when planes fly below cloud ceilings and oftentimes are not high enough to catch VHF signals. It was explained that Toledo on the Portland-Seaside route would be left with no beam at all if the cut-back goes into effect.

Principal offices of the firm will be in Salem at the Capitol Shopping Center store, 1177 Center St. Capitalization is based on 80,000 shares of stock with no par value listed.

In addition to the Center Street market, first of the chain to be developed, stores are located at N. Church and Marion Streets, Salem, (now under construction), in the Keizer district at Cherry Ave. and N. River Rd., and at 79th and Killingsworth in Portland.

Incorporators besides Berg, who is listed as president, are Ralph Wirth, L. L. Balch, Charles F. Foulger and George A. Rhoten.

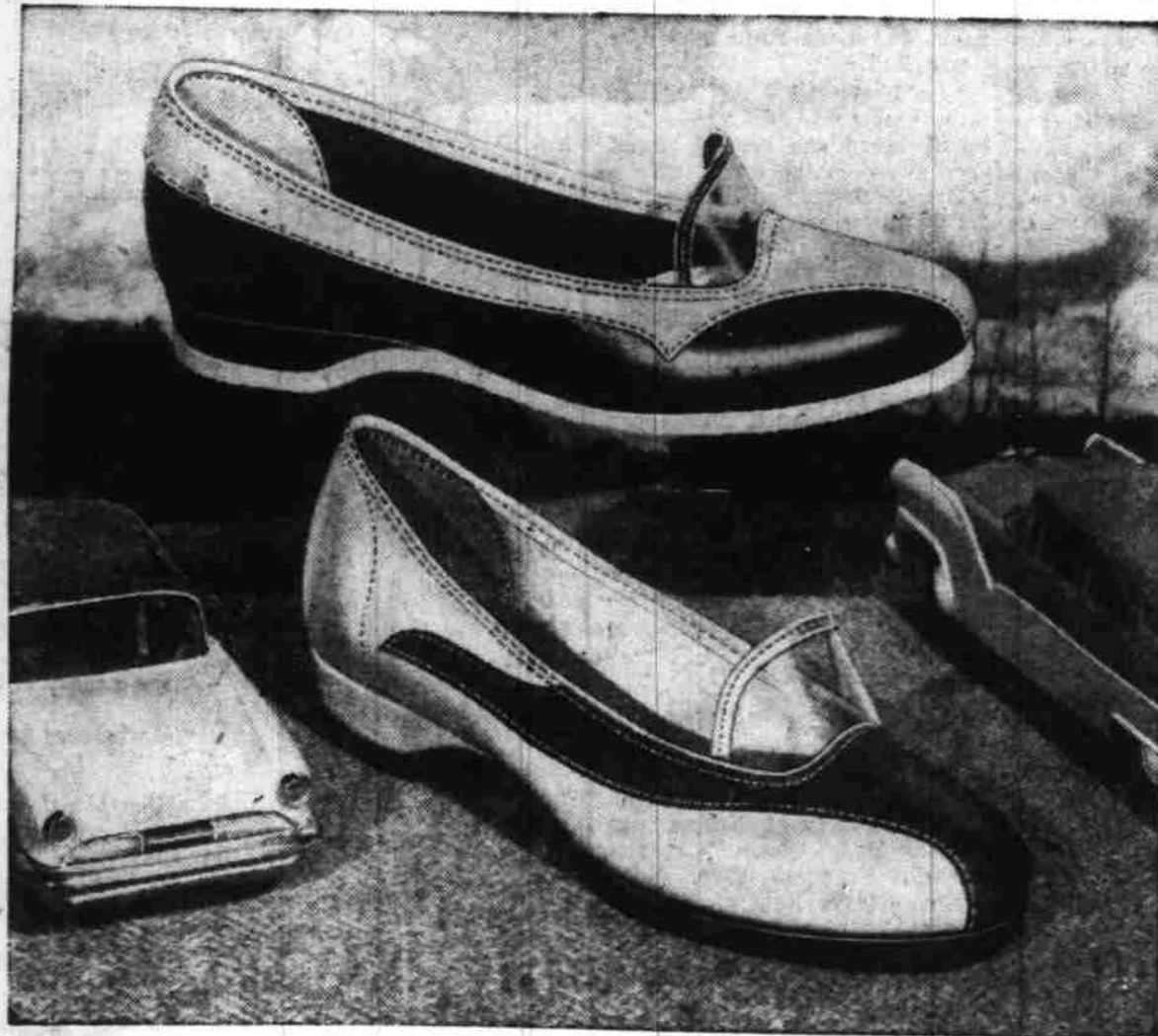

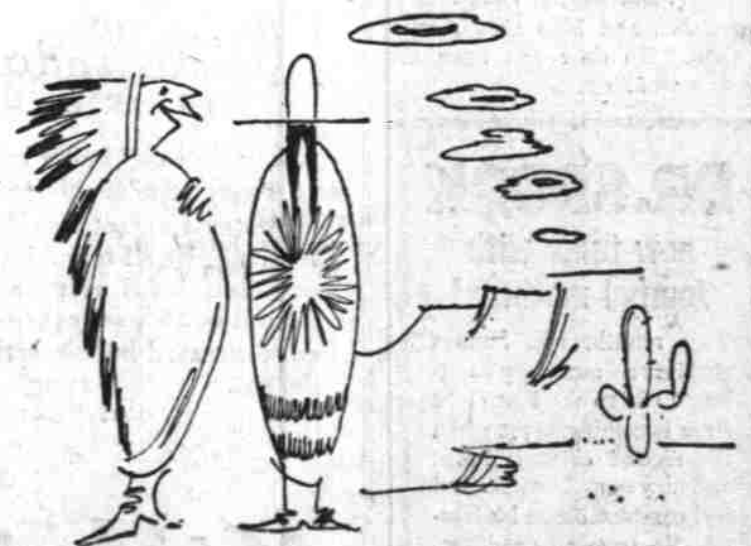
