The United Nations should be a pooling place for the wisdom of all nations—not just a legislative body, Dr. Linden Mander, professor of political science at University of Washington, said here Monday night.

2 Versions of Killing Told at Murder Trial

McMINNVILLE — Defense Attorney Bruce Spaulding, in the opening statement to the jury Monday in the first degree murder trial of Mrs. Kermit Smith, told the events leading up to the night of the slaying of Mrs. Smith's husband.

He said that the Smiths were happily married and were planning to purchase property in the Portland suburb. He said that Smith had instructed his wife to acquire dynamite and to get someone to blast old foundations on the property.

Spaulding said that police had questioned the attractive 34-year-old woman for 24 hours after picking her up the day after the blast. He said that throughout this ordeal Mrs. Smith had maintained her innocence.

The prosecution said Mrs. Smith plotted at different times to have Wolf shoot Smith in Smith's office, to knock out Smith and push him over a cliff in his car; to dynamite the car; and to defile one of Smith's tires in a rural area and shoot him as he changed tires.

An attempt was made last March 10 to knock out Smith when he drove home late at night, but Smith beat off his assailant so that plan was abandoned and the couple went back to the dynamite plot, said Willis West, assistant district attorney.

West also said one dynamite attempt was unsuccessful because of faulty wiring. So Wolf and Mrs. Smith went on a picnic, picked pussy willows and practiced dynamite-wiring, West said. He cited the pussy willows found in Mrs. Smith's home after the slaying, and said their torn ends matched stubs found on a pussy willow bush at the picnic spot.

The defense attorney ridiculed this. He said Mrs. Smith had heard the handyman, Wolf, was going into the country, and asked him to bring her pussy willows. She also asked him to bring moss for her grandmother, Wolf said both, the attorney said.

West also said he would produce a witness, Thomas Adrian Marlin, a horse meat packer of Sherwood, Ore., to testify that Mrs. Smith tried to recruit him at one time in the slaying plot.

The defense attorney asserted Marlin was of questionable character, sentenced twice to a reform school and involved later in an armed assault.

Death Takes P. A. Silvius

Park Arthur Silvius, 58, of 2315 Mountain View Dr., died Monday at home after an illness of several weeks. He was construction superintendent for the Oregon State Penitentiary.

Born Dec. 8, 1897, in Missouri, Mr. Silvius had been a Salem resident about four years.

He leaves his wife, Mrs. Harriet Silvius, Salem; stepdaughter, Lorraine, Fresno, Calif.; stepson, Lew, Portland; his mother in Missouri; and five grandchildren. The casket will be open for friends until 9 a.m. Wednesday at the Virgil T. Golden chapel.

DALLAS, Ore. — Two West Salem men waived preliminary hearing and were bound over to the Polk County grand jury Monday on charges of larceny.

Dr. Mander, a native of Australia, was featured speaker at a U.N. Day meeting of the Salem chapter of the Oregon United Nations Association held at the South Salem High School Little Theater.

A main difficulty for the U.N., said Dr. Mander, is that the struggle for balance of power in the world remains as strong as it was in the 19th century. He added that this struggle, as in the past century, often is at the expense of the smaller nations.

Veto Clause
Dr. Mander pointed out that the veto clause in the U.N. charter is indication that the big powers are determined not to be shackled by an individual organization.

"Harnessing of the awesome power posed by the atomic and hydrogen bombs is one of the great problems confronting the international assembly," said the speaker. He pointed out that the U.N. charter was drawn up before the appearance of the atom bomb.

The Salem chapter was told that one of the great troubles of the world today is the restlessness of small and weak nations.

Peace Threat
"The groundswell of discontent of small countries is almost as great a threat to the peace as the struggle between East and West," observed Dr. Mander.

Such special organizations as the United Nations Educational, Social and Cultural Organization draw high praise from Dr. Mander.

UNESCO, he said, provides an exchange of relations between farmers, educators and scientists instead of "striped panted diplomats."

Dr. Mander, author of several well known books on international subjects, was guest at a no-host dinner at the Marion Hotel prior to his speech.

DALLAS, Ore. — Stanley Joseph Simons, 72, a retired farmer and resident of this area since 1945, died Sunday at the home of a daughter in Independence after a long illness.

Education Board Seeks More Money

PORTLAND — The State Board of Higher Education Monday decided to try to provide 19 more teachers and \$50,250 for supplies and equipment in Oregon's crowded state colleges.

The board voted to ask Gov. Patterson for permission to use \$146,685 of student fee income to pay for the new teachers and equipment.

Additional staff and supplies would be allocated to the institutions according to estimates of their minimum needs.

Oregon State College would get the equivalent of 2.6 full-time teachers or \$17,600; University of Oregon, 3.2 instructors, \$11,865; Portland State, 3.6 teachers, \$21,700; Oregon College of Education, 3 teachers, \$3,350; Southern Oregon College of Education, 2 teachers, \$9,000; Eastern Oregon College of Education, 1 teacher, \$6,000; and summer session, \$9,000.

Extra money for supplies and equipment would be allocated this way: \$10,000 to the University; \$29,680 to Oregon State; \$2,800 to Portland State; \$3,325 to OCE; \$2,750 to SOCE and \$2,170 to EOCE.

The presidents of the University and Oregon State said that the problem of student housing was becoming increasingly acute. This problem was to be discussed further at Tuesday's session.

AMARILLO, Tex. — Every year druggist H. G. Maxfield sells silver dollars for 95 cents each and has a hard time moving his stock. This year he had 300 silver dollars in a display window. A sign proclaimed they were on sale at 95 cents each, with a limit of one to a customer.

During the first day he sold only three dollars, with the first sale coming five hours after he set up his display.

Death Claims Siamese Duo

MADISON, Wis. — Siamese twin girls born Sunday morning at a Madison hospital died Monday night.

The sisters, who weighed a total of about nine pounds at birth, were joined at the abdomen. Hospital attendants said the babies had only one heart.

Except for the abdominal connection, the babies had appeared to be formed perfectly in all respects. Hospital nursery workers described them as "just so adorable you wouldn't think they were new born babies."

Comedy Star Bitten, But Not by Mad Dog

HOLLYWOOD — Mexican star Cantinflas can relax. The mongrel pooch that bit him does not have rabies.

The comedian, whose real name is Mario Moreno, was nipped by the dog during a movie scene Saturday. Tests proved the animal was not rabid.

Big 3 Readies Plan to Ease World Tension

PARIS — The Western Big Three hammered out details Monday of a joint program to ease world tension. They will submit it to the Soviet Union later this week at Geneva.

A joint communique issued after two meetings Monday said in part: "The ministers, after having taken note of the work of their experts, have defined in general lines joint positions which they hope to adopt at Geneva and on which they expect to exchange views tomorrow with their NATO colleagues."

As they did so, Lord Ismay, secretary general of the North Atlantic Treaty Organization (NATO), made a brief appraisal of Russia's "diplomacy of smiles," and told the West to remember that "a bear can kill with a hug."
