

Atoms-for Peace Agency Voted by Both U.S., Soviet

UNITED NATIONS, N.Y. (AP) — With the United States and Russia voting together in favor, the U.N. Political Committee Thursday called for the early creation of an international atomic energy agency for peaceful purposes. The vote was 53-0. The six Arab members of the U.N. abstained.

Russia, the United States and India buried their differences and approved a resolution which is certain to obtain final passage in the U.N. Assembly.

Diplomatic sources said the Arabs abstained because Israel was a co-sponsor of the resolution. These sources added that when the resolution comes up in the Assembly it will be a committee recommendation without sponsor and the Arabs will vote for it.

U. S. Plan

This resolution endorsed plans of the United States and allied atomic powers to hold a conference of all members of the U.N. and specialized agencies on the final text of a constitution for the agency.

The United States has circulated a proposed statute to all U.N. members and specialized agencies and hopes to have the agency operating before the end of 1956. This would put into operation President Eisenhower's proposals of December 8, 1953, to use the atom for peaceful purposes.

The committee beat down, 33-14, with 12 abstentions, a Soviet proposal to invite all states to the conference on the atomic statute. Russia has been demanding in vain that at least Red China and East Germany should have a hand in the planning of the agency and in the agency itself.

Satisfaction Told

The committee expressed satisfaction with the atomic conference held in Geneva last August and recommended a second conference be held under U.N. auspices within two or three years. This conference would be held for the exchange of technical information.

Dakota GOP Urges Farm Policy Shift

BROOKINGS, S. D. (AP) — Top ranking South Dakota Republican leaders Thursday told a Senate Agriculture Committee hearing that Congress should replace the Eisenhower administration's farm support program with one similar to that in effect under the Truman administration.

Such a recommendation was made by Gov. Joe Foss and Lt. Gov. L. R. Houck. Sen. Case, a Republican but not a member of the committee, went a step further by calling for legislation which would require processors to pay full parity prices for major crops used for human consumption.

Both Foss and Houck said farmers in South Dakota are in financial troubles because of declining prices.

"We are in trouble and something has to be done soon," Houck declared.

However, the committee—which is holding hearings throughout the country seeking views for possible new farm legislation—found South Dakota farmers divided on the question of how much aid Uncle Sam should provide.

Testimony of farmers and their leaders indicated that, for the most part, stock growers and feeders want no government price support or subsidies.

Harry Blair of Sturgis, S.D., representing the South Dakota Stock Growers Assn., said his organization commends Secretary of Agriculture Benson for resisting price supports on cattle and hogs.

He said cattlemen are willing to depend on "self-help" programs designed to encourage greater consumption of meat.

A similar stand was taken by E. D. Heitz of Vermillion, S.D., representing the South Dakota Corn Belt Livestock Feeders Assn.

Gunman Asks For Hearing

CORVALLIS (AP) — Martin Reyes, the 23-year-old Seattle gunman who terrorized this town Monday night, asked Thursday for a preliminary hearing on a first-degree murder charge.

Dist. Judge Richard Mengler set it for Nov. 9 at 9:30 a.m.

Reyes is accused of the fatal shooting of James Appelgate, 39, a reserve sheriff's deputy as he held the Appelgate family at gunpoint. He was arrested later in Monmouth case.



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Fire Damages House Wall

A smouldering box of ashes Thursday night resulted in a damaged wall and basement food shelf at a residence at 656 University St., firemen reported.

An outside wall of the house caught fire from the ashes about 11:50 p.m. and flames burned a hole through the wall and consumed the food shelf. Names of occupants of the house were not immediately available.

Plea for Benson Discharge Denied

WASHINGTON (AP) — The White House Thursday night denied a "not only untrue but completely unfounded" published report that some members of President Eisenhower's Cabinet had tried to oust Secretary of Agriculture Benson.

The report was carried by Farm Journal magazine, one of the largest farm publications.

Illness Strikes Veronica Lake

DETROIT (AP) — Veronica Lake, the stage and screen actress who made the peekaboo hair-do a fad of the 1940s, collapsed Thursday and was taken to a Detroit hospital.

Henry Ford Hospital said her condition was "good," but a diagnosis of her condition had not been announced by mid-afternoon. She still was undergoing tests.

It first was feared the 35-year-old blonde had suffered a heart attack, but a cardiogram did not confirm a preliminary diagnosis of "possible coronary occlusion."

Miss Lake's leading role in the stage play, "The Little Hut," was to be taken Thursday night by her understudy, Maria Corbett.

The vehicle actually was stolen from Don Karsten, 3420 Willa Lane, who had been loaned the car by the owner, Charles Klassen, 3375 Willa Lane. The vehicle reportedly was taken Tuesday night from a parking spot at the Oregon Pulp & Paper Co., and later was recovered Wednesday at Corvallis.

Arrested on a charge of auto theft, said city police, was Raymond Lewis Hunter, Bremerton, Wash.

Karsten, who was loaned the car, told police he first thought it was a prank when he found the car missing.

Corvallis authorities suspected the car had been stolen when they found in it a Statesman-Journal business letter addressed to Klassen.

Hunter was held for a district court appearance.

U. S. Rate of Polio New 4-Year Low

WASHINGTON (AP) — The Public Health Service said Thursday the nation's polio rate in 1955 may be the lowest since 1951.

The weekly communicable disease summary from the Department of Health, Education and Welfare said 25,727 new cases of acute poliomyelitis were reported between Jan. 1 and Oct. 22, compared with 33,078 during a corresponding 1954 period.

Marilyn Monroe to Get Final Divorce Decree

HOLLYWOOD (AP) — Marilyn Monroe will get her final decree of divorce from Joe DiMaggio about next Tuesday, her lawyer said Thursday.

Atty. Jerry Giesler said the actress had instructed him "very recently" to proceed with picking up the decree.

Philippines Gain in Bid For U.N. Seat

UNITED NATIONS, N.Y. (AP) — The Philippines picked up more strength Thursday in the hotly contested race with Communist Yugoslavia for a U.N. Security Council seat, but after three ballots the outcome remained deadlocked.

Voting stopped in the General Assembly when the British, who are supporting Yugoslavia, won a 10-day delay on any final decision. The United States is backing the Philippines.

On the third ballot the vote was Philippines 32, Yugoslavia 24 and India 2. A two thirds majority of 39 was required for election.

This was the 12th ballot taken thus far in an attempt to resolve the situation. When the voting ended last week the Philippines had 31 and Yugoslavia 27.

Sir Pierson Dixon, the British Delegate, then proposed that the voting be postponed for 10 days, saying more time was needed for reflection on the deadlocked race.

The Americans saw in Dixon's move a sign that the British had given up hope of electing Yugoslavia and would look for another candidate.

A British delegation spokesman said later his country was still supporting Yugoslavia but as Dixon pointed out it was desirable to "leave the gate open for all possibilities."

There was talk that Sweden or India might be offered as compromise candidates. Sweden has consistently refused to be put in a position where its moves could be interpreted as taking sides in the East-West struggle.

Jeans Provide New Clue in Death of Boys

CHICAGO (AP) — Police Thursday disclosed the discovery of an abandoned blue car containing three pair of blue jeans and a shirt and described the find as the most promising yet in the investigation of the slaying of three schoolboys.

Investigators said they had not yet found the owner of the car for questioning. Neither have the jeans nor the flannel shirt been identified as those worn by the three youths the night they were killed.

The car, a 1942 Oldsmobile, was found on the Southwest Side.

Several witnesses reported seeing an old blue car Oct. 18, in a forest preserve near where the nude, strangled and beaten bodies of Robert Peterson, 14; John Schuessler, 13 and his brother, Anton, 11, were found a few hours later.

Girls' Dorm Raid 'Mistake' For UO Men

EUGENE (AP) — Some 200 University of Oregon men set out to raid the women's dormitories Thursday night. That was a mistake.

They found the doors locked and the women gleefully throwing water bags out of upper story windows onto them. At one dormitory the girls even had a garden hose to operate.

Those who escaped the water bags and the hose didn't come off completely dry, either. It was raining at the time.

The men did manage to get inside one building, but got no farther than an inside stairwell. Dean of Men Ray Hawk said. Then staff members appeared, and the men fled.

On top of all that, three men were nabbed by officials who broke up the affair. The three face hearings and possible suspensions Friday.

New Orleans Smog Stalls Armored Cars

NEW ORLEANS (AP) — Smog marooned hundreds of motorists and more than a million dollars in two armored car convoys on the eastern outskirts of the city between midnight and dawn Thursday.

The gray blanket, swirling over the area for the second straight day, clung in thick patches on the stretch from the Lake Pontchartrain bridge to the junction of Highways 11 and 90.

The armored car convoys, made up of two trucks each, en route to Mississippi and Louisiana points, were delayed more than an hour.

About 7 a. m. (CST) the smog, formed by fog and smoke from burning marshland, began to lift and 29 minutes later traffic movements were back to normal.

Unlike Wednesday's smog clouds, which started a wave of asthma attacks that resulted in two deaths, Thursday's seemed to have little effect on asthma sufferers.

Princess Talks With Archbishop

LONDON (AP) — Princess Margaret, torn between the dictate of her heart and a tenet of her church, talked alone Thursday with the Archbishop of Canterbury. As head of the Church of England, he must be the most adamant opponent to any idea of her marrying Peter Townsend, a divorced man.

The princess met the archbishop—apparently at her request—in a study on an upper floor of the archbishop's Lambeth Palace. "It was a private visit," the archbishop's chaplain said later.

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Man Acquitted; Jury Jeered

NEWPORT, Ore. (AP) — Leslie Lee Henry, 23, Toledo, O., Wednesday was acquitted of a rape charge and jurors were the target of verbal abuse from some 40 persons as they filed out of the courtroom Wednesday.

Circuit Judge Fred McHenry heard the commotion in the corridor and ordered Jack Waterman, sheriff's deputy, to bring in the hecklers. Waterman came back with the Rev. George Virgil Dexter, pastor of the Free Methodist Church.

McHenry said that "when this pastor was brought in, he calmed down and became quite apologetic."

Henry was accused of the rape of a 17-year-old Newport girl, a member of the Rev. Mr. Dexter's congregation.

Woolen Mill Plans Milwaukie Plant

MILWAUKIE (AP) — Pendleton Woolen Mills will begin construction next month of the first unit of a plant northwest of here.

Robert Bishop, company vice president, said the first unit, in which shirt-jackets will be made, is to have 40,000 square feet of space. Final plans call for a factory of 200,000 square feet, to employ 800 persons.
