Picture Pretty

Deep Purple Eggplant Loses Looks When Cooked But Gains in Flavor

Uncooked egg plant's one of the most beautiful vegetables in the world we think, one of the least appreciated after cooked. This from a lover of eggplant who believes one can do more with it than frying in limp slices.

Here's a way that's said to suit everyone who likes vegetables — and many who don't.

EGGPLANT CASSEROLE

1 eggplant
1 egg
1/2 teaspoon salt
1/2 teaspoon olive oil
2 tablespoons salt
1/2 pound jack cheese

Wash and slice eggplant without peeling it, making it 3/4 inch thick. Beat egg thoroughly and add half the salt. Heat oil in the skillet, slice cheese in thin slices. Dip each slice in beaten egg then flour and saute until delicately brown on both sides. Oil a casserole or oven wear, lay in some eggplant, then a slice of cheese until all have been used and a layer of cheese is on top.

Add tomato sauce to pan in which eggplant was sauteed. Add rest of salt, pepper and herbs and stir until tomato boils. Pour over eggplant, bake in a slow oven for 1 hour, basting with sauce in casserole every 10 minutes. Remove cover last 15 minutes of cooking. Allow to brown.

The Near East knows its eggplant, counting it as an important vegetable.

You can make cutlets of the eggplant the Near East way thus:

Eggplant Cutlets
1 eggplant
1 egg
1 tablespoon flour
Salt
Pepper
1 clove garlic
1/2 teaspoon rosemary
1 tablespoon shredded green pepper

Peel eggplant, boil until tender in salted water. Drain, mash and when slightly cool, mix with other ingredients. Cover bottom of skillet with a generous amount of melted butter, or olive oil. When bubbling drop in the eggplant mixture by spoonful. When brown on one side, turn with spatula and brown on the other side. Serve with meat.

Here's a Gree' way to prepare the eggplant:

Eggplant Imambirdi
6 small eggplants
1/2 cup olive oil
5 medium onions, sliced
2 peeled tomatoes
1/2 cup water

Peel eggplants and partly slice each into 4 sections, leaving stem-end intact. Heat half the oil in heavy skillet, add eggplant and cook gently for 15 minutes. In another pan heat remaining oil, and in it cook onion, sliced tomatoes and garlic for a few minutes. Remove from pan and cool.

Fill sliced eggplants with onion mixture, sprinkle with salt and pepper, return eggplants to the pan in which cooked, add water and cook for 15 to 20 minutes until tender.

Or if you like, cook your eggplant in comfortable sized cubes with onion, in oil and sprinkle with seasonings and flour, soak again until heated through then add some water and turn the heat away down to simmer until done.

Add a dash of thick sour cream for the dickens of it.

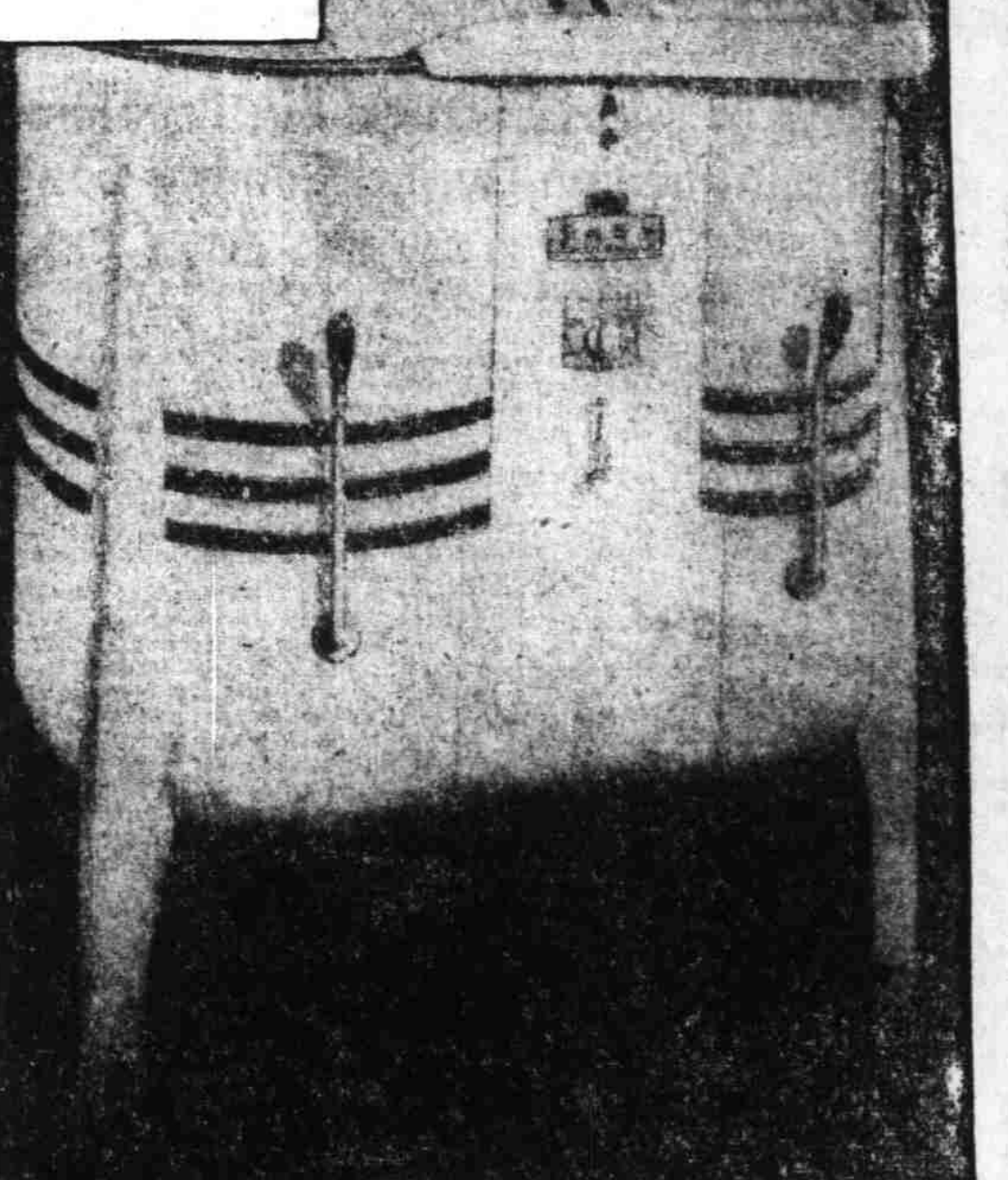
