

Slain Sportsman's Marriage Emerges As Full of Discord

NEW YORK (U-P) — Mrs. Ann Woodward told authorities Monday night she shot her millionaire sportsman husband to death in total darkness without a word of warning. She said she thought she was beset by a prowler.

A vague noise in their Long Island home early Sunday touched off her taut nerves, she related.

U.S. Scholar Freed; Lauds Red Chinese

HONG KONG (U-P) — Miss Harriet Mills, a 35-year-old Fulbright scholar from New York City, emerged from freedom Monday and described the Red Chinese prison in which she spent 51 months as "a place of hope... a place where new people are made."

She told reporters she was an unpaid U.S. and British "espionage agent" and spent considerable time in the prison with her hands cuffed behind her back and in ankle chains.

She said this was because she repudiated one of her confessions. But, she added, her jailers treated her "with the utmost consideration and courtesy."

"The Communists had a perfect right to arrest me. I confessed from the very day I was arrested. My arrest has been the most decisive thing that has happened to me," she said, adding that if she had not been imprisoned she would not have been able to see how wrong were her thoughts about the Red Chinese government.

She declared Americans are "warmongers" and the U.S. government "is embarked in an aggressive policy," but added, "I must make it clear I am not referring to the broad masses in the United States." She said the Chinese government has "a genuine desire for peace."

Liquor Agent To Pay Back Stolen Funds

EUGENE (U-P) — A former state liquor store agent, accused of taking \$4,186 in store receipts, promised Monday to repay the state.

he would sell his house in Florence from 1949 until his arrest last August, said he had taken the money to pay hospital and doctor bills for his wife, who died recently.

Sen. Lehman Disappointed

WASHINGTON (U-P) — Sen. Lehman (D-NY) acting chairman of the Senate Banking Committee, said Monday he is "greatly disappointed" that the Eisenhower administration isn't ready with a plan for federal disaster insurance.

An administration spokesman had just told the committee that, while government agencies have consulted on the need for giving citizens better financial protection against floods, hurricanes and other calamities, they weren't ready with specific recommendations.

"I am greatly disappointed at the failure of the administration to submit specific recommendations at this time in view of the President's statement of Oct. 18 that specific recommendations would be made at these hearings," Lehman said.

Road Yields Body Of Wallowa Man

WALLOWA, Ore. (U-P) — An elk hunter, Dan Dailey, about 50, Wallowa, was found dead on a road Monday after going for help to get his stranded truck out of the mud.

Friends blamed a heart attack. His partner, Loren Freel, said that after the truck became mired Dailey set out for assistance while Freel stayed with the truck. Later other hunters came along and released the vehicle. Freel drove here and found that Dailey had not arrived.

He drove back and found Dailey dead, face down in the mud.

Action Amends Zone Class of Bellevue Lots

Four lots on Bellevue Street between South Winter and Summer streets were converted from apartment to business zoning Monday night by Salem City Council at its City Hall meeting.

After objections from four property owners nearby, the aldermen amended the zoning bill to make the change to a more restrictive business classification, C-2, than originally sought by Mrs. Maple Cole Beals. This zone permits a wide variety of businesses but would exclude warehouses and some of the other possible uses which objectors predicted would devalue the many apartment properties of the neighborhood.

Attorney Roy Harland, representing Mrs. Beals, said the petitioner was hopeful of converting a duplex into a medical or dental office building. He said her property had been classified for business before most of the nearby apartments were built, but a recent citywide zoning revision had placed it in an apartment zone.

Renewed Western Union franchise, charging a fee 2 per cent of revenue.

Set Dec. 12 public hearing on proposed vacation of unopened Lister Street in West Salem, adjacent to Blue Lake Packers property.

Approved a loading zone in front of Salem Woman's Clubhouse.

Referred to city manager a letter from Mrs. Edward Kruger, 1415 N. 4th St., urging enforcement of peddlers' license law against the many persons now selling Christmas cards door-to-door.

Condemnation Action Initiated condemnation action for land now considered part of Broadway Street between Locust and Hickory but claimed as private property in a current lawsuit against the city.

Put stop signs on Mountain View Drive at Boice Street.

Ordered sewers to be built at property owners' expense in Simpson's addition and in N. 4th Street between Locust and Taylor Streets.

Ben Youssef Closes Exile

BEAUVAULTON, France (U-P)

Deposed Sultan Mohammed Ben Youssef returned to France from a two-year Moroccan exile Monday and entered political talks that could return him to his turbulent Moroccan throne within three weeks.

Amid nationalist exultation and conciliatory French moves, Youssef took up temporary residence in a well guarded Riviera hotel and prepared for a meeting, tentatively set for Tuesday in Paris, with Foreign Minister Antoine Pinay.

The Sultan met Monday afternoon with Pinay's right hand man, Henri Rissou, to arrange the meeting that could pave the way for his return to Morocco. Pinay was scheduled to come to Paris from Geneva, where he is attending the Big Four conference.

The French government view is now held to be that Moroccan opposition to the Sultan has ceased to exist and, barring any untoward outbreaks, he could resume his throne by Nov. 18, anniversary of the date he ascended the throne in 1927 on his father's death.

Plane Crash Kills 8 Men

BALBOA, Panama, Canal Zone (U-P) — A U.S. Navy patrol plane crashed and burned on a takeoff Monday at the Coco Solo Naval Air Station, killing eight crewmen.

Naval headquarters here said the ninth man aboard the plane was rescued, although badly burned.

The plane was a two-engine PBM Mariner amphibian.

The press office of the 15th Naval District headquarters said the plane was taking off when one engine suddenly failed. The pilot evidently tried to continue takeoff procedure, but the craft scraped a breakwater and crashed into the water, exploding on impact.

The Dublin Player's performance of George Bernard Shaw's "Pygmalion" Monday night in the new auditorium of Willamette U's Fine Arts Building will well be the beginning of a "new look" for Salem's theater-going citizens.

In "Pygmalion" Shaw sends his barbs into the English through a story which deals with a professor of rhetoric who, in six months, turns a London flower girl into a lady of fashion.

The usual first-act difficulties of Americans "hearing" British actors were entirely missing here. The Dublin Players, suave and rhetorically correct, projected every word well.

Julia Worth did a wonderful job of blossoming from a poor cockney girl into a beautiful and charming lady. Ronald Ibbes was a convincingly nervous, well bred and studied boor. Edward Byrne was a pleasant Col. Pickering, partner to Hibbins in the experiment. And Ken Huxham was a likeable father.

The house was comfortably filled, though not sold out. With the success of this play, the local management, we hope, will bring other acting groups here.

Salem has proved its interest in musical entertainment, supporting three winter series, and now that there is a suitable stage for professional performances, we will surely welcome more plays.

Girl 'Made Up' Story of Knowing Killers of 3 Boys

BROOKVILLE, Ind. (U-P)—Sheriff James Hixon said Monday Gloria Vasquez, 14, escaped California mental hospital patient, has told him she "made up" her story of knowing the killers of three Chicago boys.

After questioning her, Chicago authorities had decided she didn't know as much about the Oct. 16 killings as she claimed.

Hixon said the girl said she fabricated the story, hoping to be sent back to Chicago and to avoid returning to a state hospital at Napa, Calif., where she escaped in September.

Strobel Action Defended by Bureau Chief

WASHINGTON (U-P) — General Services Administrator Edmund F. Mansure Monday defended his aide and appointee, Peter A. Strobel, from charges of a House judiciary subcommittee that Strobel carried on "improper" business activities.

Mansure testified that he approved the arrangement under which Strobel took a \$14,800 a year job as commissioner of public buildings service July 1, 1954, while keeping his ownership interest in the New York engineering firm of Strobel & Salzman, without management responsibility.

If Strobel actually solicited business for the company later that year, as the House investigators have charged, Mansure said, "I'd think it was improper."

But he declined to acknowledge that Rep. Celler (D-NY), chairman of the subcommittee, was correct in calling Strobel's activities "solicitation."

Mansure said he would reserve judgment until he saw a transcript of the week-long hearings on the Strobel case, as well as a pending report of the Federal Bureau of Investigation.

Truck Hits 71-Year-Old

MILL CITY — A 71-year-old man was struck by a pickup truck Monday as he was crossing a road west of Mill City in the rain and dark about 6 p.m.

George T. Cree of Mill City was taken to Salem Memorial Hospital, where his injuries were reported as a fracture of the right leg and abrasions.

Driver of the truck was John Edward Tannich of Albany, Mill City Police Officer Tom Morris said.

Cree reportedly was crossing the road from his parked pickup to a field. The accident occurred on old Highway 22 one-fourth mile west of Mill City.

Israel Repels Egypt Foray

JERUSALEM (U-P) — An Israeli military spokesman said Israeli forces Monday repelled an Egyptian foray into Israeli territory east of Gaza.

It was the latest in a series of border violation charges that have raised fears of another Palestine war and sparked appeals for peace from the United Nations. Britain sent representations to Israel and Egypt Monday adding its voice to the U.N. pleas.

The Israeli spokesman said an Egyptian force under cover of automatic fire crossed the armistice line in the Nirim area east of the central sector of the Gaza strip.

He said an Egyptian position at the same time opened fire on an Israeli outpost. No casualties were reported on the Israeli side.

TV Cables on County Roads Not Allowed

Television cables can't be built along county roads, Atty. Gen. Robert Y. Thornton ruled Monday.

The opinion was asked by Dist. Atty. George L. Anderson Jr. of Union County.

The opinion means that a group of individuals in rural areas of Union County, who have organized to install a coaxial cable to improve television reception, can't install their cable along a county road.

Thornton said the law doesn't authorize television cables on county road rights of way, although telephone, telegraph and electric lines are permitted.

Russia Asked To Halt Arms Sale to Arabs

GENEVA (U-P) — Prime Minister Moshe Sharret called on Soviet Foreign Minister V. M. Molotov Monday night to halt the sale of Communist bloc arms to Israel's Arab neighbors.

Sharret went into the conference with Molotov resolved to tell him the Communist tactic:

1. Might touch off new Middle Eastern fighting that could engulf Europe and the world.

2. Penalize Israel's policy of non-alignment, which Russia supports in other parts of the world.

Molotov's immediate reaction to the Israeli protest was not disclosed.
