

Latin Bloc 'To Override' U.S. On A-Fallout Study Proposal

UNITED NATIONS, N.Y. (AP)—A spokesman for the powerful 20-nation Latin American bloc said Saturday his group will press Monday over U.S. opposition to add four countries to a proposed scientific committee on atomic fallout study.

The spokesman, who declined to be identified by name, said talks "in good spirit" were going on with Henry Cabot Lodge Jr., chief U.S. delegate, in an attempt to get some settlement of the split before the vote.

But, the spokesman emphasized, "we have 40 sure votes in the Political Committee for our amendment" if the United States refuses to withdraw its opposition.

The committee is near a vote on a resolution which would set up an 11-nation committee of scientists to collect reports on fallout and any other atomic radiation and make them available to members of the U.N. and its agencies.

A larger committee would be unwieldy, the United States argues. But the Latin American bloc said Latin America and the Middle East were not sufficiently represented.

The U.S. delegation minimized any threats of a split with the Latin American group on the eve of a General Assembly session which will make another attempt Tuesday to complete its elections to the Security Council.

The United States has counted heavily on the Latin American bloc for support of the Philippines in the run-off contest against Yugoslavia.

"We will be good neighbors in the Political Committee and if an amendment is voted into our resolution we will go along with it," a delegation source said.

India Producing New Jet Plane

BANGALORE, India (AP)—India is mass-producing a new jet trainer plane claimed by its builders to be better and cheaper than its Canadian counterpart, the Chipmunk. The HT-2 is a product of the Hindustan Aircraft Factory, a post-war development of the huge airplane rebuilding factory set up here by the U. S. Air Force in World War II.

Girl Confirms Mother's Tale About Slaying

KINGSVILLE, Tex. (AP)—Five-year-old Maria Teresa Canales was reported Saturday to have confirmed her mother's story of the slaying of Don Worden on Padre Island.

Mrs. Sunny Canales Worden, 42, the wealthy San Antonio woman charged with murder in Worden's death Oct. 22, has said her little daughter was the only other person present at the time.

Officers questioned the curly-haired youngster Friday but reportedly found her unwilling to talk to strangers. County Atty. Royce C. Johnston said, however, that she did talk to a ranch employee and longtime friend, Beto Gonzales. Johnston said Gonzales quoted the little girl as telling a story which agreed with details of the shooting as given by Mrs. Worden.

Johnston, Sheriff Jim Scarborough and Texas Ranger Joe Bridge went to the Prejides Canales ranch and talked to Maria Teresa for half an hour. Canales, 52, is the wealthy oil man and rancher from whom Mrs. Worden was divorced Aug. 3, only a month before the woman married Worden at Bend, Ore.

Authorities delved Saturday into the past of Worden, a 43-year-old San Antonio real estate man.

Press Handling of Romance Rapped By Vatican Paper

VATICAN CITY (AP)—The Vatican newspaper L'Osservatore Romano criticized the world press in general Saturday for its treatment of the Princess Margaret romance. The paper called press handling of the story "the bankruptcy of the century."

L'Osservatore said the press lacked discretion and chivalry in spotlighting her activities with Group Capt. Peter Townsend as though she were a stage or screen star. It also said newspapers failed to emphasize the moral aspects involved and the "noble" message of the princess in announcing she would not marry Townsend.

State to Receive Over \$6 Million From U.S. Lands

PORTLAND (AP)—Oregon will receive \$6,104,818 as the state's share of receipts from National Forest lands for the fiscal year ended June 30, Regional Forester J. Herbert Stone announced Saturday.

The payment represents 25 percent of receipts from timber sales, grazing of livestock, land, and other uses of the National Forests.

The money will be apportioned to the counties in proportion to the forest acreage within their boundaries.

CHINA TO GROW COFFEE

TOKYO (AP)—Red China, traditional land of tea, said Saturday it is going to grow coffee. Peiping Radio said a sub-tropical region of Yunnan Province in the southwest is being turned into a "major coffee growing area."

Three Killed In Oregon Road Mishaps

Three traffic accidents in widely-separated parts of Oregon claimed the lives of three men Friday night and early Saturday.

Peter Paris Threlkel, 61, Marion, was injured fatally Friday night when his car plunged through a bridge railing into a creek south of Salem. He died in an ambulance on the way to a Stayton hospital.

Victor Miller, 22, Spokane, Wash., died of injuries suffered when his car left the highway about 20 miles south of Bend and overturned early Saturday. Miller was believed asleep and an unidentified sailor was driving when the crash occurred. The accident was witnessed by Miller's nephew, James Fisher, 19, also Spokane, in a following car.

Fisher said he picked up the sailor just outside Los Angeles as they started north, and the sailor had driven the Fisher car before relieving Miller at Weed, Calif. The sailor disappeared after the crash.

Lee Ahyta, 37, Crescent City, Calif., died of injuries early Saturday when a car struck a bridge abutment on the Redwood Highway seven miles south of Cave Junction. Leonard W. Brekke, Crescent City, owner of the car, said he was asleep in the front seat and did not know what happened. He suffered minor bruises.

Motel Blaze Kills Man at Grants Pass

GRANTS PASS (AP)—The unexpected explosion of a heating unit in an auto court near here early Saturday caused a fire that claimed the life of a Mitchell, Ore., man and hospitalized his wife with serious burns.

E. H. Spoo, 67, died Saturday afternoon, about eight hours after the fire. His wife, Hazel 57, was being treated for burns on the arms and abdomen. Blood plasma was flown here from Portland.

The couple was dragged from their burning car cabin by Delbert Harden, 40, also of Mitchell, who was traveling with them and occupied an adjacent cabin.

Mrs. Spoo said she was in the bathroom when the blast occurred. The resulting fire destroyed two cabin units, before it was brought under control by a state forestry patrol crew.

Spoo was reported to be the owner of a sawmill at Mitchell.

Peanut Taken From Lung, Lad Serious

DETROIT (AP)—A 22-month-old Detroit boy battled for his life in an iron lung at Grace Hospital Saturday night following an operation to remove a peanut from his left lung.

Clarence J. Gumieny, 32, said his son, Ronald, had been treated for a cold for nearly two months until X-rays 10 days ago revealed the peanut.

Gumieny said the boy had stuffed some peanuts into his mouth about two months ago. Shortly afterward, he began to cough and had trouble breathing.

"We all thought he had a bad cold," Gumieny said.

The peanut was removed last Monday after X-rays disclosed the peanut. Ronald's heart stopped beating during the operation but was revived by massage.

Suit Contests Nation's Gold Buying Policy

PORTLAND (AP)—Two Portland attorneys, representing a Prairie City, Ore., woman, Saturday filed a brief with the district court of appeals aimed at upsetting federal gold purchase policies.

The woman, Mrs. Gladys Laycock, contends she owns a Grant County, Oregon, gold mine which contains 40 million dollars worth of gold at the pegged federal price of \$35 an ounce.

The mine now is idle because it would cost 40 million to extract the gold, the suit contends.

Earlier this year Mrs. Laycock filed suit in federal court here asking \$10,000 damages and challenging the government's right to become sole purchaser of newly mined gold at a fixed price. This complaint was dismissed.

Her attorneys now are seeking to have the dismissal overturned in the higher court.

The suit contends that Mrs. Laycock could sell the gold to dentists and jewelers at more than the \$35 government price, and that she then could operate her mine profitably.

She said she inherited the mine from her father. She has been working in a Prairie City drugstore to support herself and the idle mine.

Fire Damages Structure in Klamath Falls

KLAMATH FALLS (AP)—Fire Saturday night damaged the Evans Bldg. in the heart of the downtown Klamath Falls business district.

Five persons lost their lives in a blaze which swept through the same structure in February, 1947.

There was no immediate estimate of damage in the Saturday blaze, believed started by a fire in a basement trash box.

The Klamath Falls United Fund office, a furniture store, a loan office and a gas company office were damaged by smoke.

Firemen had to break a number of windows and tear up the sidewalk in front of the store to get to the blaze.

The building was an apartment house at the time of the 1947 blaze. It was later rebuilt.

Vienna's Famed Opera House, Casualty of Bombs, Reopens

VIENNA, Austria (AP)—Vienna's State Opera House—a symbol of Western culture which went down in flames in the war—was reopened Saturday night before a glittering international audience.

As they celebrated, Austrians prayed that their nation's cultural rebirth might be the opening act of an era of world peace. Only 11 days ago, Austria was freed from foreign troops for the first time in 17 years. They left in time for Vienna to reopen its opera in freedom and independence.

The penny contributions of the Viennese, clinging to their love of music and song and regarding the opera house almost as a personal possession, made the opera reopening possible.

Rubble Heap

On March 12, 1945, five American bombs reduced the Baroque Building to a rubble heap. Austria sank into despair from which full recovery appeared today. A festive gathering of 2,500 saw Ludwig Van Beethoven's "Fidelio"—the story of a man unjustly imprisoned and finally liberated. The story parallels Austria's recent history.

Thousands of Viennese who had no tickets stood in a muddy mist before the floodlit opera house to watch the arrivals and listen through loudspeakers to the opera.

Audience Cross-Section

The audience represented the new Austrian Republic and a cross-section of the modern world. It included statesmen such as America's Secretary of State, John Foster Dulles, who six months ago was here to sign the treaty which gave Austria its freedom on Oct. 25. Dulles and his wife flew in from Geneva, and Dulles said he wanted to be among "those who have come here to honor the great contribution in culture that Austria has made to the world."

There were conductors such as America's Leopold Stokowski and Vienna-born Bruno Walter, composers such as Russia's Dmitri Shostakovich, industrialists such
