

Khrushchev Reveals Range Of New Red Medium Bomber

MOSCOW (AP)—Nikita S. Khrushchev, boss of the Soviet Communist Party, told foreign correspondents Saturday, the U.S.S.R.'s new twin-jet medium bomber has a range great enough to reach London, Northern Europe, North Africa and Turkey.

In a free and easy chat with correspondents during a reception honoring Premier Khrushchev's visit to Norway, the Communist boss touched on a number of subjects, including French politics and the prospects for world communism.

His talk about the bomber, however, was the first public mention by a top Soviet leader of any technical aspects of Soviet aircraft.

Hoover Report Attacked by State Group

PRINEVILLE (AP) — The Oregon Reclamation Congress took exception Saturday to several major points of the recent Hoover Commission report on water resources.

Victor Boehl, Grants P. A. S. chairman of the group's water policy committee, said Oregon would wage a continuing campaign to retain revolving funds on reclamation projects.

The Hoover Commission had recommended that revolving funds for specific projects be abolished. That point was criticized as the group wound up its 43rd annual meeting here.

The group also opposed a Hoover report proposal for a board on water resources at cabinet level. Some speakers here said the proposal would provide a "veto power over Congress."

They also opposed another Hoover report recommendation for an increase in the Bureau of the Budget technical staff to review all proposed reclamation projects.

Paul House, Nyssa, was elected president; Tom Crawford, Lakeview, vice president; Clancy Jean, Portland, was reelected secretary-treasurer; La Selle Coles, Prineville, again was named Oregon representative to the National Reclamation Assn.

Sen. Neuberger (D-Ore.), speaking at the annual banquet Friday night, also criticized the Hoover report and advocated power subsidies to help support irrigation of new farm lands in the West.

He said the Hoover report was hostile to irrigation plans and was "of the same piece" as Hoover recommendations to abolish postal savings, raise parcel post rate and to sell Bonneville and the TVA.

Neuberger suggested a farm policy to provide direct production payments to farmers, instead of price-support loans on six basic commodities. He urged the Domestic Parity plan for wheat and proposed some form of the Brannan plan for such commodities as dairy products, row crops and orchard fruits.

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from the bomber. There is a possibility he and Premier Nikolai A. Bulganin will use such a jet liner for a trip to London next spring, but they will not use it for their trip to India next week. They are going by easy stages in conventional aircraft.

Smiling, and in a gay mood, Khrushchev told the correspondents gathered around him:

"I'm going to tell you a secret, but don't tell Gen. Gruenther (Gen. Alfred M. Gruenther, Supreme Allied Commander, Europe) because NATO is a dangerous organization. Our jet airliner is developed from a medium bomber with a range of 5,000 kilometers (about 3,000 miles). This is enough to reach London, Northern Europe, North Africa or Turkey. I suppose it is all right to tell you, but of course when you tell someone a secret it gets out anyhow. I have been too talkative and careless."

First Details

A twin-jet passenger airliner was seen in last July's aviation show here, along with a fleet of the medium bombers. This was the first time any Soviet source offered details about the plane.

Khrushchev, twinkling and apparently enjoying himself, expounded on the subject of France, England, Communism and other subjects. He volunteered the information that he liked England.

As for Communism, he said when he spoke of that way of life winning throughout the world, he was not advocating revolution but simply discussing a natural historical development. This is in line with the latest propaganda which insists that the Soviet Union does not export revolution.

Then Khrushchev got on the subject of France, and correspondents thought he might have been just a little indiscreet.

"What about France?" a reporter asked.

"Good People"

"They are good people and it is a nice country" but it can't seem to take up a definite position," Khrushchev said. "I wouldn't mind if France were against us or for us, but it is neither. I hate hesitation and wavering."

"That's why France is having elections," a reporter interjected.

"That won't change anything," Khrushchev said earnestly. "They still won't know what they want."
