

Brazil Calm on Heels Of 'Bloodless Revolt'

RIO DE JANEIRO — Brazil returned to normal Saturday after a swift and efficient bloodless revolt—staged to prevent a revolution.

All opposition—and the grim threat of civil war among the armed force branches—collapsed in the face of determined action by supporters of law and order led by Gen. Henrique Teixeira Lott. There had been no fighting.

The man Gen. Lott installed as temporary President in a pre-dawn coup Friday, Nereu Ramos, ap-

peared secure in office and an air of calm legality clothed the whole coup. The new government took a firm grip with the backing of the army and Congress.

Carlos Coimbra da Luz, ousted as the temporary President, ordered back to Rio de Janeiro harbor the cruiser Tamandare on which he fled to refuge Thursday night. He said the order was his last official act and begged the armed forces not to fight among themselves.

The army coup encountered open, though passive, resistance from the navy and air force. But the air minister, Maj. Gen. Eduardo Gaomes, signalled the collapse of resistance.

He had rushed to Sao Paulo, Brazil's big industrial city, Friday to organize resistance to the new temporary President. Saturday he ordered the air force to halt opposition.

Gen. Lott was the spokesman for army forces which backed constitutional processes. He insisted the present government should legally turn over its powers on schedule Jan. 31 to the newly elected administration.

Death Claims West Salem Bus Driver

A West Salem bus driver who lay over night in his bus after an apparent stroke died Saturday morning a few hours after he had been found and taken to a Salem hospital.

Roger Stuart McVey, 55, of 1129 Edgewater St., apparently collapsed about 11:30 p.m. after parking the bus at the entrance to the company garage at 1545 Elm St. He was found about 6 a.m. by Mrs. Robert E. Covert, wife of the owner of the bus company.

McVey died at 10:54 a.m. without regaining consciousness. Death apparently was due to a stroke and a bruise over the left eye apparently was received as he fell, his doctor said. An autopsy is to be performed, according to the coroner's office.

Relatives of McVey said he had taken time off from work recently because of illness. Mrs. Covert said McVey's receipts for the run he had just finished were complete and apparently nothing was missing from the bus or garage.

McVey, born July 14, 1900, at Charter Oak, Iowa, was a Salem resident more than 30 years. He leaves his wife, who was out of the city at the time of his death; a son, Kent R. McVey, with the Navy at Coronado, Calif.; two daughters, Miss Elizabeth McVey of Coblenz, Germany, and Miss Ruth McVey of Salem; a step-daughter, Mrs. Helen Minter, Salem; and four grandchildren, Sharon and Valerie Minter and Steven and Diana McVey, all of Salem.

Funeral arrangements are pending at the Howell-Edwards Funeral Home.

Former Dutch Minister Dies

THE HAGUE, Netherlands (AP)—Dr. John Loudon, former Dutch foreign minister, died Saturday after a long illness.

He was foreign minister during the First World War and afterward served his country for 20 years as ambassador to France. Before the war he served as minister to Tokyo and later to Washington.

His wife is American-born Lydia Edith Eustis, 80, from New Orleans, La.

Higher Wool Duty Urged By Growers

PORTLAND — The Oregon Wool Growers Assn. urged Saturday an increase on duties for wool yarn and cloth imports.

The association closed its annual meeting after electing Julian Arrien, Vale, president; Guy L. Arbogast, Condon, vice president; and W. H. Steiwer, Fossil, delegate to the 1956 American Sheep Producers convention.

The group also heard P. G. Karner, Robbins, Calif., sheep man, report widespread benefits resulting from feeding of antibiotics to lambs.

He said addition of the drug aureomycin to the feed of 30,000 scrub lambs into choice market quality animals.

He also said the death rate in the group was less than 5 per cent, compared with the normal 20-30 per cent in that class.
