BAGHDAD (AP) — The Iraqi Interior Ministry has banned a book about Egyptian Premier Gamal Abdel Nasser by Egyptian author Anwar Alguidi. No reason was given, but it is assumed the book was banned here because it states Nasser's views on Middle East defense treaties which are contrary to Iraqi foreign policy.

Scouts Plan Camperoo at Silver Creek

Boy Scouts of the Cherry City district will get lessons in survival training next weekend as the district's annual Camperoo is held at Camp Silver Creek. At least 150 scouts and leaders are expected to attend.

Snowy conditions at the camp site in the Cascades east of Silverton won't deter the project, it was announced Saturday by Don Crenshaw, camping chairman for the district. The schedule calls for transportation to the camp early next Saturday an overnight stay and return Sunday afternoon.

The camp, held each fall, is designed to teach boys how to take care of themselves in the woods. State foresters will provide compass, map-reading and survival instruction and a film also will be shown. Explorer Post 15 of West Salem will demonstrate safe and proper use of firearms.

Crenshaw said a main purpose of the project is to teach boys what to do when lost in the woods. He added that dads have been invited to attend, since many of them likewise could benefit from the instruction.

Assisting in the program besides Explorer Post 15 will be Post 41 and the honorary post, Order of the Arrow.

Permanent shelters at the camp will provide lodging for the weekend outing, Crenshaw said. If weather is bad, instruction will be held under shelter. Al Jarvis, scoutmaster of Troop No. 1, will do the cooking for the camp.

Camp participants will be drawn from the 20 troops in the Cherry City district. Registrations are scheduled Saturday at 7 a.m.

Postmen Cast Fretful Eye at Yule Approach

While most people now are interested only in how many feet a Thanksgiving turkey has, your mailman is probably worrying about his "Christmas feet," already.

Even though the Yule is traditionally a season of song and merriment, to postal employees it is a time of hard work.

And as mail bags begin to bulge with the annual letters, cards and packages, the public is warned to do its Christmas mailing early and efficiently.

"Early mailing, especially of packages, insures safe, efficient delivery," said Salem Postmaster Albert C. Gragg. "We can also give the public better service if mail is addressed correctly and legibly."

Complete Address

"A complete address would in-

clude a full name, street number and name of city and city zone, if any. A printed address is better than a scrawled one. A three-cent stamp on a card, plus a return address, insures return of undeliverable mail. A two-cent stamp does not carry that privilege."

As Salem and the state continue to grow, Gragg said, the volume of mail in and out of local post offices also increases. The volume of Christmas mail, during the past several years, has increased by about 100,000 cancellations each year.

On a peak day during the 1954 holiday rush, busy postal workers handled 1,200 sacks or packages and 217,000 letters and cards. Last December, nearly 3,000,000 letters and cards were processed by clerks.

As in previous years, Salem Post Office will rent additional space to work the Christmas mail load. About 80 extra clerks and carriers also will be hired for the temporary rush.

Christmas mail volume has reached such proportions in this area that regional and local "briefing" meetings of postmasters are held. For the first time such a meeting was held recently in Salem for postmasters of this section.

Early Mailing

"To insure safe delivery by Christmas, packages destined for service personnel overseas should be mailed from Salem not later than Nov. 15," said Gragg. "Of course they may be mailed after that date but the postoffice cannot guarantee delivery by Dec. 25."

A pamphlet of instructions on packaging and mailing of parcels is available now at all post offices and branch offices in this area, Gragg said.

White House Meet to Draw 2 Salem Men

Two Salem men have been invited by President Eisenhower to participate in a White House conference on education slated for Washington, D. C., Nov. 28 through Dec. 1.

The two are Dr. George B. Martin, head of the Education Department and Gardner Knapp, member of the Salem School Board. Among 13 Oregon persons invited to the conference, both said they will accept.

Approximately 2,000 persons from throughout the country and its territories are scheduled to attend the conference, first of its nature ever to be called by a president of the United States.

Purpose of the conference is to make "the most thorough, widespread and concerted study the American people have ever made of their educational problems."

Subjects to be discussed at the conference will include how schools can be operated more efficiently and economically, how to increase the supply of teachers and how to obtain a continuing public interest in education.

The conference will open the evening of Nov. 28 at the Sheraton-Park Hotel in Washington.

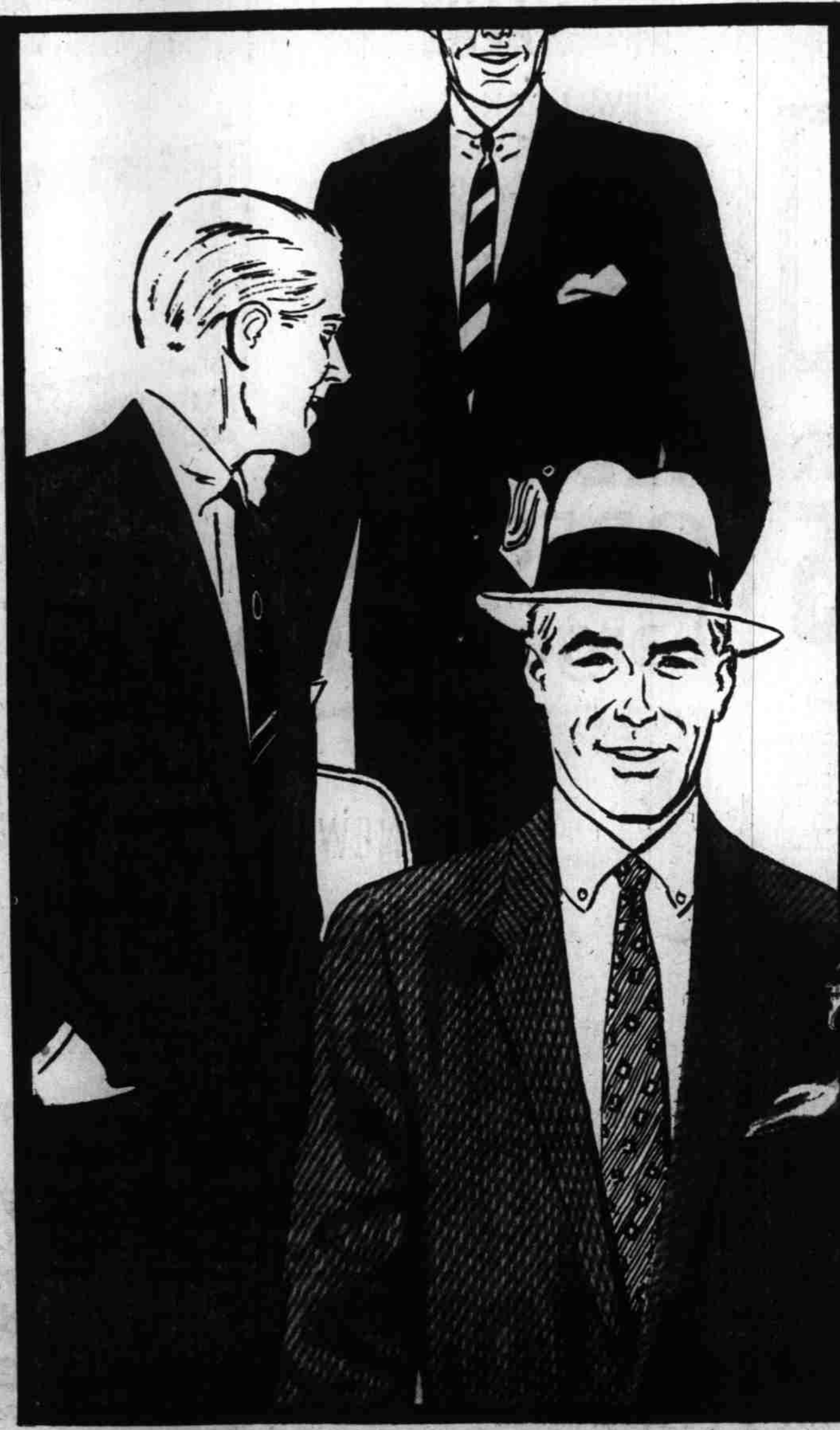
