

Nehru Cautions Soviets Not to Expect Indian Swing to Reds

NEW DELHI, India (AP)—Prime Minister Nehru gave notice to his Russian guests—Premier Nikolai Bulganin and Communist Party boss Nikita S. Khrushchev Sunday night not to expect their visit to swing India into the Communist bloc.

The Indian prime minister spoke at a state banquet for the two Soviet leaders after Khrushchev, at a visit to the Taj Mahal at Agra, had announced a wish to help this country become strong

industrially to "assure its freedom and independence."
Nehru conceded that Russian-Indian friendship is deep, but reiterated determination to keep India from taking sides in the Cold War.

Not Convinced
"We are convinced," he said, "it is not by military pacts and alliances and by piling up armaments that world peace and security can be attained. There is talk of a cold war and rival camps and groupings and military blocs and alliances—all in the name of peace."

"We are in no camp and no military alliance. The only camp we should like to be in is the camp of peace and goodwill, which should include as many countries as possible and be opposed to none. The only alliance we seek is an alliance based on goodwill and cooperation."

Relax Hope
Speaking 10 minutes later, Bulganin declared the Soviet Union has "not lost hopes" as a result of the Geneva meeting of Big Four foreign ministers and is "certain that in the end the four powers will succeed in solving the problems which face them."

Russia wants to lessen international tension and "in the future wishes also to support this policy, no matter what might be the difficulties," he declared.

He said he thought the German people "should be left to themselves" to seek a solution to the problems of Germany.

In his speech, Nehru did not seem to admit the Communist claim that their is the only true peace camp. But his pointed reminder that India is not a member of either camp did not prevent his setting a precedent for his Soviet guests.

Top Leaders
For the first time at a state banquet given by him for visiting

foreign dignitaries, Indian Communists were invited. Three top Indian Communist Party leaders attended, along with representatives of all other parties in Parliament.

Nehru and Indian President Rajendra Prasad escorted the Russian visitors through the famed Mughal gardens and introduced them to many of the 4,000 guests who arrived to sip tea and eat cakes at a reception before the dinner.

Crowds of guests followed the Russians about.

Both reception and dinner were completely dry, in accordance with the Indian government's prohibition policy. Banquet toasts were in pineapple juice.

Bus, Car Hit Head-On; One Dead, 15 Hurt

SEATTLE (AP)—The head-on collision of an automobile and a Greyhound bus on the Seattle-Everett Highway killed the motorist and injured 15 bus passengers early Saturday.

Killed was Walter G. Shaw, 26, Seattle. The injured included the bus driver, Robert K. Adams, 27, of Bellingham. A passenger from Bellingham, Mrs. Blanche Jude, 58, suffered a leg fracture.

State Patrolman Bryan Tennant reported that Shaw was northbound in an inside lane when the driver of another car slowed in front of him for a left turn. Tennant said Shaw's car hit the left rear of the other automobile and swerved into the path of the southbound bus.

FANATIC TO DIE
TEHRAN, Iran (AP)—Army legal officers announced Saturday Mozaffer Ali Zolghadr, a Moslem fanatic, will be hanged for attempting to assassinate Premier Hussein Ala Thursday. A bullet grazed Ala's neck.

Former Oregon Legislator Dies

OREGON CITY (AP)—Funeral services will be held here Tuesday for William M. Stone, Oregon City attorney who died Friday at the age of 69.

Stone, a 1910 graduate of Willamette University law school, served one term in the state Legislature from Clackamas County in 1921 and was city attorney here for many years.

Survivors include the widow, Julia; a daughter, Mrs. Julianne Underwood of New York; and two sons, William Stone, and Norman W. Stone, both of Corvallis.

Army Shifts Discharge to 'Honorable'

DETROIT (AP)—Sanford Waxer, 27, said Sunday the Army had classified his discharge as "honorable" after a loyalty investigation that involved Dr. Alfred Kelly of the Wayne University faculty.

Secretary of the Army Brucker apologized to Dr. Kelly for the Army's "mistake" of linking the Wayne history department chief with American Youth for Democracy. The AYD is on the attorney general's list of subversive organizations.

Waxer, a Wayne graduate, was asked to accept an undesirable discharge after service from June 1, 1953, to May 31, 1955, the Army charging he had associated with Communists or Communist sympathizers before entering the Army.

Waxer fought the discharge. He said he was advised by the adjutant general of the Army Sunday that his record would be changed to read, in the "character of separation," from "to be determined" to "honorable."

He also was told: "After a careful review of the circumstances involved in your case it has been determined that you will be retained in the Army Reserve."

Out-of-State Solons to Hear Harriman

MILWAUKIE, Ore. (AP)—Two out-of-state members of Congress are expected to attend the Democratic fund-raising dinner here Tuesday at which New York Gov. Averell Harriman is to be principal speaker.

Sen. Scott (D-NC), who will be here for the joint Senate-House committee timber hearings, and Rep. Blainick (D-Minn.), who is here visiting relatives, have accepted invitations.

Sen. Neuberger (D-Ore) will be master of ceremonies and Sen. Morse (D-Ore) will introduce Harriman.

Other Democrats who are to be at the meeting include Rep. Green (D-Ore), State Labor Commissioner Norman Nilsen; State Atty. Gen. Robert Y. Thornton; Multnomah County Sheriff Terry Schruck; Oregon Democratic National Committeeman Monroe Sweetland and State Democratic Chairman Howard Morgan.

Morgan last month criticized what he said were Harriman's presidential aspirations and the New York governor's close connection with Carmine DeSapio of New York's Tammany Hall.

Harriman has stated that he is not an active candidate for the Democratic presidential nomination.

1,031 Volkswagens Reach California

SAN FRANCISCO (AP)—A record shipment of 1,031 Volkswagen automobiles from Germany arrived Sunday on the Finnish motorship Vaasa.

The Vaasa, one of four specially designed ships which carry the small German cars to world ports, will drop 765 here and take the rest to Portland, Ore. Local dealers welcomed the shipment. "We're down to one demonstrator," said one agent.

Snake River Dam Project To Continue

CAMBRIDGE, Idaho (AP)—Despite last week's ice and snow, construction of the Brownlee dam camp site on the Snake River will start this week, Idaho Power Co. and Morrison-Knudsen Co. officials have announced.

One of the most important early camp site projects is construction of a \$200,000 bridge to span the 600-foot Snake River. There is no present link across the water except a ferry and small boats. The

bridge will require 500 tons of steel and 200,000 board foot of lumber. Construction of the bridge is necessary, the officials said, to gain full use of access roads and railroads from both the Idaho and Oregon sides of the river.

Idaho Power, which was given the green light for construction of Brownlee and two other dams in the Hells Canyon area of the river by the Federal Power Commission, recently signed a construction contract with Morrison-Knudsen.

The Brownlee dam, to be built eight miles north of Robinette, Ore., is the first of the three. Approval by the FPC came after a lengthy and bitter fight, which opponents to the three-dam proposition say they will carry into the courts.

SCHOOL OPENED
TETUAN, Spanish Morocco (AP)—Spain is expanding educational facilities in this protectorate to help the Moroccan people prepare for independence. The Moroccan Polytechnic School, a \$300,000 three-story center, was opened this week. The school, with 100 classrooms, is described as the largest in North Africa.
