WASHINGTON (U) — President Eisenhower said Monday night the federal government will have to step in if necessary to prevent "a lack of schools in certain important areas."

"I'm cautioned, however, that 'if we depend too much . . . on the federal government, we will lose independence and initiative.'"

Cannery Cost Estimated at \$150,000 Sum

INDEPENDENCE — Cost of installations and equipment for a proposed new Independence cannery would approximate \$150,000, a reliable source said at a meeting here Monday night.

The source added that the estimate ranged upward because of unexpectedly high acreage and crop possibilities in this area. A large delegation of farmers at the meeting indicated they would consider contracting some 2,000 acres to the cannery if it materializes.

James Daniels, Salem attorney and among those interested in the project, said it now appears that space of about 100x300 would be required.

"Ready to Buy"

An "unidentified marketing organization reportedly is ready to buy a large block of stock in the venture if sufficient interest is shown locally. Such interest was displayed at the Monday night meeting at the Independence Legion Hall.

The Independence Chamber of Commerce tentatively has planned to set up a board of farmers to aid in pushing the cannery. Ken Roberts, assistant Polk County agent, added optimism with his report on the new irrigation district in the county.

Several Sites

Daniels said several sites for the cannery have been considered. If the project materializes, a plant may be constructed or some suitable building in the area converted.

Need for a cannery in this area has grown in recent years as farmers changed over from hops to beans and other crops.

If the Independence cannery gets the "green light" it will be the only major cannery in Polk County other than in West Salem.

CHICAGO (AP) — Agreement aimed at ending the bitter, violent four-months strike of CIO United Auto Workers at the New Castle, Ind., plant of Perfect Circle Corp. was reached Monday after a month of mediation.

The settlement proposal will be submitted to 229 UAW employees in New Castle Tuesday at 9 a.m. (EST). Ratification by the members of UAW Local 370 would bring the dispute to a close.

Federal mediators and union officials declined details of the settlement proposal, but a company statement said it called for a two-year contract.

Relocation of County Health Office Okehed

(Council news also on Page 1.)

Relocation of Marion County health offices to a new building near Salem General Hospital won final authority Monday night from Salem City Council.

Acting as agent for the combined city-county health department, the Council by formal resolution gave authority for lease of a new health building from Clarmar Co., owner of properties near the hospital, at \$500 a month.

Construction of the proposed \$44,000 building, situated between the new hospital wing and the Jason Lee Cemetery, is to be subject to the city manager's approval of plans, including access street and parking area for 42 cars.

Rents Space Now

The health department now rents space in the Masonic Building. An executive committee for the health department is made up of representatives of county and city governments, school district and other agencies contributing to the combined health budget.

A milestone in traffic improvement was reached by the City Council at the Monday night meeting in City Hall when aldermen gave unanimous approval to the final contract between city and Southern Pacific railroad for the 12th Street project.

This long-planned improvement calls for extending the street north into Capitol Street, widening it so through traffic can operate west of the railroad tracks, separating tracks from street by high curbs, installing drop-arm warning devices at crossings and other changes. City voters already have approved a \$200,000 bond issue for part of the work. A major part of the railroad's work on the project is donation of a strip of land along 12th Street to make widening possible and the new signals.

Motive Approved

The Council also approved a motion directing City Manager J. L. Franzen to proceed with carrying out the 12th Street project. First construction work is expected next spring.

In another traffic matter in a busy section of the city, Salem councilmen made changes in the parking restrictions in the area of the new Meier & Frank store. The no-parking rule on Church Street's west side will be lifted during the hours the store is closed. A loading zone will be given the Church Street Laundry. One-hour meters will be installed on both sides of Center and Marion streets from Church to Cottage and on both sides on Church Street from Marion to Union streets.

Foreclosure Proceedings

Foreclosure proceedings were ordered started against 11 property owners who were reported in a formal city resolution to be more than one year delinquent in payment of interest or principal on street improvement assessments.

Caesar's TV Wife Hurt as Show Ends

NEW YORK (U) — Nanette Fabray, beautiful television wife of Sid Caesar, was knocked unconscious backstage Monday night by a heavy scenery weight a few minutes before the Caesar show ended. The injury apparently was not serious.

Miss Fabray, a stage and screen star since childhood, had just left the stage after completing a number when the 75-pound weight plunged 20 feet to the floor.

It bounded against Miss Fabray's left temple and knocked her unconscious. A dancer, 25-year-old Buddy Schwab, also was struck on the shoulder as he was coming on stage. He was bruised but completed his act.

At the hospital, preliminary X-rays indicated there was no concussion or skull fracture. Doctors said the dark-haired actress would be kept in the hospital several days for observation.

Lie Detector Tests 'Out' In Wolf Trial

PORTLAND (U) — Circuit Judge James W. Crawford said Monday he would not admit lie detector test results as evidence in the first degree murder hearing of Victor Laurence Wolf.

Wolf, who has confessed the car-bomb slaying of Portland attorney Kermit Smith, has pleaded guilty to the murder charge in open court. The court will hear evidence on the case beginning next Monday and will decide upon the degree of guilt and the punishment.

Wolf contended that he killed Smith at urging of the attorney's wife, Mrs. Marjorie Smith. She was tried on a first degree murder charge recently, and was found innocent. Wolf was the chief prosecution witness at her trial.

Sheriff's Unit Forms Plans For Recruiting

A recruiting program for 50 new members and a program of centralized training for the Marion County Sheriff's Reserve were announced at the first full meeting of the organization Monday in the County Courthouse.

The additional manpower is needed for expanding civil defense activities, especially traffic control, Sheriff Denver Young explained.

Capt. Wallace S. Wharton, county civil defense director, pointed out that the traffic problem in Marion County will be "tremendous" in case of evacuation of Portland.

Training meetings will be held the second Monday of each month in the courthouse. Formerly, ever since the 150-man Reserve was organized four years ago, monthly sectional meetings were held in each of five Marion County cities. Separate meetings will continue to be held in the five cities the fourth Monday of each month for firearms instruction, Young said.

In the central meetings, Reserve members will be trained in traffic control, laws of arrest, search and seizure, panic control and first aid by representatives of the sheriff's and district attorney's offices and state and city police.

Ike Decrees Set of Ethics For Advisers

GETTYSBURG, Pa. (U) — President Eisenhower issued a conflict-of-interest order Monday requiring "high standards of ethical conduct" for government "WOCs" — business and industry experts serving the government without compensation.

The order follows up legislation passed by Congress last August requiring such defense production specialists to file information on their financial connections, and to keep the file up to date.

There are about 1,000 WOCs in the government, working on defense contracts and the like. Several cases alleging that some of them had conflicts of interest between the government and their private employer have come before congressional committees.

Generally, the WOCs have continued to draw pay from their private connections, while not accepting any from the government. They are a latter day counterpart of the dollar-a-year men of World War I.

County Road Pave Request Turned Down

A petition seeking blacktopping of County Road 433 was presented Monday to Marion County Court, but commissioners said the road isn't wide enough for the job. The petition carried some 70 names.

The road in question lies north of Broadacres and extends from the Donald Road to Boones Ferry. Stretch for which hard-surfacing is sought, rests between the Portland-Salem freeway to Boone road.

The court and County Engineer John Anderson said the stretch to which the petition applies is 40 feet in width. It was pointed out that for a paving project at least 50 feet of rights-of-way is needed so that there may be allowance for shoulders and drainage ditches.

Petition signers said the road was damaged by heavy use during construction of the expressway.
