

Britain, Russians Accuse Each Other Of Diplomat Slurs

LONDON (U) — Britain and the Soviet Union swapped protests Tuesday — each complaining that the other had slurred its prime minister.

The exchange appeared designed largely for the public record, but was nonetheless serious.

Soviet Premier Nikolai Bulganin

has been charged with expressing "hypocritical" views by a British spokesman. Prime Minister Eden has been pictured by implication in a Soviet leader's speech as one of the Western "gentlemen" who helped trigger Nazi Germany's assault on the Soviet Union in 1941.

Made During Tour

Both assertions were made during Bulganin's tour of India with Communist Party Chief Nikita Khrushchev.

Bulganin told the Indian Parliament in New Delhi that Russian foreign policy is based on non-interference in the affairs of other countries.

Peter Matthews, 45-year-old British Foreign Office spokesman, described Bulganin's statement as "thoroughly hypocritical," at a daily news conference.

Under the British system, personal criticisms of foreign government chiefs usually are made in Parliament by responsible ministers.

Matthews' statement embarrassed the British government as Eden has invited Bulganin and Khrushchev to visit this country next spring and hopes to negotiate on some of the major problems of Europe, the Middle East and Asia.

The Commons Security Unit To Conference

GETTYSBURG, Pa. (U) — President Eisenhower shifted his attention back to defense planning Tuesday by summoning the National Security Council to a meeting Thursday and his two top military strategists to Gettysburg Friday.

The wave of reaction stirred up by Republican Chairman Leonard W. Hall's prediction Eisenhower will run again "if he feels he is able" was pointedly ignored by a presidential spokesman.

Asked at a news conference whether the President had "any reflections" on what Hall said after his 45-minute political conference with the President here Monday, White House Press Secretary James C. Hagerty responded with a "no."

Secretary of Defense Wilson and Admiral Arthur W. Radford, chairman of the Joint Chiefs of Staff, will meet with the President Friday.

Wilson will return to Gettysburg again Dec. 6 with Budget Director Rowland R. Hughes for the obvious purpose of working out details of the military budget the President will submit Congress in January. Friday's conference, a renewal of regular meetings of Wilson and Radford with the President, will go into preliminary details.

Hanna Nickel Strike Ends

RIDDLE, Ore. (U) — The strike of workers at the Hanna Nickel Smelting Co. ended Tuesday.

Union and management officials announced agreement to settle through grievance machinery the dispute that led to the walkout a week ago by CIO Steelworkers.

AFL craftsmen engaged in installing new smelter furnaces observed the picket lines, and only office workers and maintenance men reported for work until the strike-settling agreement Tuesday afternoon.

The dispute started when four men, ordered to perform some clean-up work, walked off the job. When they returned for their next shift, they found their jobs taken.

Robert S. Taylor, personnel manager at the plant, said the four would not go back to work, pending settlement of the dispute in grievance procedure.

Taylor said the first work crew began reporting for work at 3 p.m., but he said it will take several days to resume full production.

Solons Hear Of Threats on Car Dealers

WASHINGTON (U) — Senators heard testimony Tuesday that threats and pressure from auto manufacturers force car dealers to engage in "unwise" practices.

The testimony was given by Frederick J. Bell, executive vice president of the National Automobile Dealers Assn. He was a witness before a Senate antitrust and monopoly subcommittee, which is looking into the operations of General Motors Corp. and the effect of its size on the rest of industry. Bell noted that his statement was not confined to GM.

He said the pressures of which he spoke "very frequently take the form of veiled threats, innuendo and subtle inferences of reprisal, all of which tend to generate fear."

Earlier in the hearing, Acting Chairman O'Mahoney had commented that pressure from manufacturers on retailers to accept automobiles has resulted in more liberal sales plans. He contends that in many cases down payments are too low and payment periods too long.

"Many people in the United States now driving automobiles they will never own," he said.

Marine Hurt In Car Crash

DALLAS, Ore. — A Marine from Camp Pendleton was treated at Dallas Hospital for a forehead cut received late Tuesday night when the car in which he was traveling left Highway 99W and rolled over a short distance north of Rickreall, state police said.

The man was listed at the hospital as Robert Gutierrez of Detroit, Mich. The name of a companion, who was not injured, was not obtained, hospital attendants said.

Army Armory at
Milwaukie Site

U.S. Rep. Walter Norblad served notice Tuesday that he opposes construction of an army armory in the Kellogg Park district at Milwaukie.

Norblad, a member of the House Armed Services Committee, notified Chairman Carl Vinson of the committee that there are many cheaper sites in the Portland area which would be just as good.

Milwaukie officials have opposed use of the site on grounds it is valuable for industrial plants.

Norblad said that his opposition means that the full committee must hold hearings on whether the Army shall be allowed to acquire the site.

Japan Group Plans to Defy Rhee Warning

TOKYO (U) — The newspaper Yomiuri said Wednesday a Japanese fishing association at Tottori, Southwest Japan, has decided to send "a huge fleet with coast guard patrol escort" inside the Rhee line next month in defiance of South Korea's recent "shoot to sink" warning.

The paper said at least 10 trawlers with three 300-ton patrol boats would leave the Japan seaport of Sakai for the area early next month.

It said the patrol boats plan to warn the trawlers by radio when ROK gunboats are sighted and that the boats would then attempt to "flee outside the Rhee line."

The fishing association was reported as saying that their fishermen "must dare or starve." Inside the Rhee line are some of the richest fishing grounds of Asia.

The Rhee line is a sea-belt extending some 60 miles off the Korean Peninsula. It was unilaterally proclaimed by ROK President Syngman Rhee just before Japan regained sovereignty in 1952.

In proclaiming his fishing demarcation line, Rhee said it was "to protect South Korea's natural resources."

South Korea's defense headquarters threatened Nov. 17 to shoot, and if necessary sink, Japanese boats "if they persist in violating the Rhee line."

Morgan, Merrifield Debate Previews Vote Campaign

Whether the 1957 legislature will be Republican controlled again, or Democrat will still have to be decided at the polls, but a pair of prominent political foes previewed the issues in a Willamette University convocation debate on the subject Tuesday.

Howard Morgan, state Democratic chief, and Sen. John Merrifield, active leader in the Republican party, engaged in the battle of words over whether the Republicans should be returned to control of the Oregon Legislature.

Merrifield said the fact that Oregon is first in secondary education in the nation, first in hourly wages paid to workers, had the finest state institutions, civil service, retirement plan and highway program should be sufficient proof of the Republican effort.

Morgan quoted newspaper disappointment in the 1955 legislature for "lack of leadership" and blamed Republican Gov. Paul L. Patterson. He accused the Republicans of shunning experienced Democratic leadership because of partisanship, citing failure to name Sen. Robert Holmes to the chairmanship of the Senate Education Committee which he had headed in the 1953 session.

The Polk County farmer, who is state chairman of the Democratic Central Committee, hit the Republican stand for the sales tax and memorial to congress in support of partnership power development.

He admitted that hourly pay rates were fine, but contended that Oregon was a distress area much of the time because of unemployment due to seasonal industry. The solution is new industry which he said would come to Oregon only if low-cost power was available.

Merrifield, who succeeded Holmes as head of the education committee, said he leaned heavily on Holmes during the Legislature. He noted that congressional practice is to give chairmanships to the party in power without exception.

Jet Bomber

LAREDO, Tex. (U) — A B57 jet bomber, working as a part of Exercise Sagebrush military maneuvers in Louisiana, crashed in Mexico Tuesday, Laredo Air Force Base reported.
