

U.N. Countries Ask Security Council to Admit 18 Members

UNITED NATIONS, N.Y. (AP)—An overwhelming majority of the United Nations Wednesday approved a proposal which would bring 18 new members into the U.N. under a package deal.
By a vote of 52 in favor, two abstentions and five abstentions, the 60-member U.N. Special Political Committee called on the Security Council to consider favorably the applications of the 18 countries, including five Communist states.

Addie Pauline Hodges of Roseburg was charged Wednesday by a Marion County District Court warrant with obtaining property under false pretenses. Bail was fixed at \$1,000.

The warrant was served in Marion County Jail, where Miss Hodges had been held on a charge of parole violation. Police said the new charge involves a \$44.95 check passed at a Salem clothing store.

Baseball Loot Recovered by Salem Police

The Salem Senators Wednesday recovered a dozen baseballs, two bats and a catcher's mask, all new, that they did not know they had lost.
The articles were recovered by police from two 14-year-old boys who said they had taken them from a storage room under the grandstand shortly after the end of the baseball season, according to a police report.
Mr. Hugh Luby said that no complaint will be filed as the equipment was recovered in good condition, the boys having hid the loot without using it for fear of discovery by their parents, and the boys had no previous offenses on record.

Reds to Seize U.S. Power in 'Class Battle'

CLEVELAND (AP)—A Federal Court jury was told Wednesday that Communists planned to seize power by leading American working classes "in a final conflict over the capitalist state."

The witness was Mrs. Barbara Hartle, 47, former Communist leader of Seattle who joined the party in 1934 after being a college honor student.

She testified at the trial of 11 alleged Ohio Communist leaders charged with conspiracy to teach or advocate the violent overthrow of the United States government.

Mrs. Hartle, one of 30 Communists convicted of conspiracy throughout the country, is the government's star witness in its attempt to prove the charges.
"I was taught in the Communist Party," she testified, "that the dictatorship of the proletariat is achieved by the violent seizure of power — by the overthrow of the bourgeois state."

Over defense objections, Judge Charles McNamee allowed Mrs. Hartle to testify as a student of Marxism-Leninism qualified to tell what she was taught.

She said that she was taught that the "Communist Party would be able to recognize the time (for revolt) and would take advantage of it at that time in leading the working classes to seizure of power."
Trained Communists like herself, she said, were to furnish leadership for the working classes.

The death last week of Miss Frances I. Gross was due to pneumococcal type of meningitis, not an epidemic type, Dr. William L. Lidbeck of the Salem Medical Laboratory said Wednesday after a study of the virus.

Republic Fund Criticized by Henry Ford

DETROIT (AP)—Henry Ford II said Wednesday he criticized some actions of the Fund for the Republic. The controversial fund is sponsored by the Ford Foundation, of which Ford is the chairman of the trustees.

Ford made his criticism "as a private citizen" in a letter.
"What effect my comments may have remains to be seen," said Ford, who also is president of the Ford Motor Co.

The fund previously has been criticized as left wing. It was set up in 1952 by a 15-million-dollar grant from the foundation to promote the Bill of Rights and principles of the Constitution.

A Ford spokesman said the letter was written two days ago to an unidentified "private citizen" after the correspondent had written to Ford complaining of activities of the fund.

"No Voice"

Ford's letter said "neither I nor any of the other trustees of the foundation has a voice in the fund's activities or projects. We have had no control over the selection of personnel for the fund's staff. As trustees of the foundation, we appointed the original board of the fund, consisting of 16 well-known and patriotic people, in 1951."

"These directors were given the authority to select other directors and their successors without reference to us. They have exercised this authority in seven instances and have carried out their program on their own responsibility," Ford wrote.

No Legal Right

"Despite the fact that I have no legal right to intervene in the affairs of the Fund for the Republic, I have exercised my right as a private citizen to question the manner in which the fund has attempted to achieve its stated objectives. Some of its actions, I feel, have been dubious in character and inevitably have led to charges of poor judgment."

"I am satisfied, however, that no public trust can expect to fulfill its responsibilities if it does not respond to intelligent and constructive public criticism."

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Solon Claims Reds Cocky About Future

TULSA, Okla. (AP)—Sen. McCarthy (R-Wis.) said Wednesday night Eisenhower administration foreign policies and what he called the Democrats' continued softness on Communism have helped make the Communists cocky about the future.

He said that creating the spirit of Geneva was "a great triumph for Communist diplomacy" and he again assailed a message President Eisenhower sent to Moscow a month ago on the anniversary of the Soviet revolution.

In an address at a public meeting, McCarthy also accused Democrats in Congress of trying to emasculate the government's security program without any condemnation from party leaders.

"After 20 years of being soft on communism," he said, "there are no signs that the Democrat leadership has improved — not the slightest hint of repentance or acknowledgment of past errors."

McCarthy pictured the Communists as "gloating" and "congratulating themselves on their smashing diplomatic victories and on their remarkable success in getting non-Communist Americans to wage their propaganda war for them."

Jury Named For Corvallis Murder Trial

CORVALLIS (AP)—A jury of nine men and three women was selected Wednesday for the first-degree murder trial of Martin B. Reyes, 23, Seattle.

The trial will begin Thursday morning with the state accusing Reyes of shooting James R. Appelgate, 39, Corvallis, as Reyes fled from police after breaking out of jail at Eugene, Oct. 24.

Rival attorneys questioned 51 prospective jurors before agreeing on the 12 selected. Once the jury was completed, Circuit Judge Fred McHenry recessed court, and sent the jury home to prepare for the trial. The jurors reported back later and went into the seclusion that will be theirs until the trial is over.

Mrs. Frances Appelgate, widow of the slain man, is scheduled as one of the first witnesses. Two daughters, Elaine, 16, and Susan, 9, also may be called.

Appelgate was slain as he tried to prevent an armed man from making off with the automobile in which the daughters were sitting. The man fled on foot after Appelgate fell with his wounds.

Reyes was arrested at Monmouth, north of here, the next day.
