## Rural School Areas Share \$29,494 Sum

Apportionment of first installment of rural school funds for Marion County was made Tuesday with 60 districts sharing in \$29,494.98.

Checks were made out to the districts, including six high school districts, by the Marion County school office and represent a portion of county property taxes and delinquent taxes collected this year.

Of the total, representing about one tenth budgeted for the school year, \$18,290.59 went to rural elementary schools and \$11,204.39 to the high schools. Elementary schools are scheduled to share \$162,563.39 and high schools \$94,964.36, according to Mrs. Agnes Booth, Marion County school superintendent.

## 7 Commodities Of Blue Lake Set Records

Of the 16 commodities processed by Blue Lake, seven set new records this year. N. M. Merrill, manager of the Blue Lake Packers, Inc., told the membership Tuesday. The seven commodities are beans, corn, squash, soybeans, logan raspberries and strawberries. Merrill pointed out that while the nation's average production of graded beans per acre was only 2 1/2 tons, Blue Lake growers averaged 3.85 tons this past year. The manager also told of the expanding market of the Oregon bean under the "Jack the Beanstalk" label, with the product now available in New York for the first time.

In addition to the new warehouse, the cooperative purchased an adjoining 1 1/2 acre. Merrill said that it was the "only remaining available land in the area," and the directors thought best to guard against possible future expansion.

While packers took substantial losses in the corn pack in 1954, Merrill saw no repetition of this situation this year. He believed that 1955 would be "a good year in the food industry," but warned that competition would be keener than ever before. He pointed out that employment is at a record high, however, with many women working and "looking for food easily prepared."

Russell Cohn, president of the big cooperative, directed the day's program and also discussed the expansion of the cooperative.

## Control Board Turns Down Property Sale

The State Board of Control refused Tuesday to accept a proposal by Pendleton school district to buy eight acres of Eastern Oregon State Hospital land for \$2,500.

The district wants the land for a new high school. The board said two appraisers had appraised the land at \$11,700. The school district says the property is wasteland, and worth only \$2,500.

"It would be dangerous," Gov. Paul Patterson said, "for this board to sell land at less than 25 per cent of the appraised value. We have no desire to hold up the school district."

The board said it will try to make a trade with the school board, which now owns some land on which the board might wish to build houses for staff members of the hospital.

## County Orders Stop Signs

Stop signs were ordered for four intersections by the Marion County Court Tuesday after it gave approval to recommendations by County Engineer John Anderson for placement.
