

### Sister De Sales Of Mt. Angel Dies at Age 90

MT. ANGEL—Sister Mary De Sales, of Convent Queen of Angels, died Monday after an illness of two years at the age of 90.

Born in Ippingen, Germany, in 1865, she came to this country as a religious novice in 1887 when the convent was moved from Germany to Gervais. A year later the convent was moved to Mt. Angel. She took her vows as a nun Jan. 6, 1889.

She spent many years teaching at St. Mary's School, Mt. Angel, at St. Agnes' and Sacred Heart Schools in Portland, St. Mary's Academy in Albany, and St. John's School at Oregon City. She also served as superior and principal in several of these schools, and was sub-prioress at the convent in Mt. Angel from 1940 to 1946.

Requiem mass will be 9:30 a.m. Wednesday in the convent chapel. Burial will be in the convent cemetery.
