

Council Considers 57-Acre Annexation To West City Limits

A 57-acre annexation to Salem's west city limits was set in motion by Salem City Council Monday night in a half-hour meeting of mostly routine business.

But introduction of 10 bills dealing with a special election May 15 gave indication that the going might not be so speedy at the next council meeting, Jan. 23.

North Africa Rebels Pester French Troops

ALGIERS, Algeria (U) — Nationalist rebels made more trouble for France Monday throughout North Africa.

Main center of rebellion remained the Eastern Constantine section of Algeria, where 26 Frenchmen or Algerians friendly to them were reported killed or kidnapped during the weekend. Fifty-six rebels were reported killed and 62 captured by French forces.

Fighting in the Rif Mountains of Northern Morocco, to the west of Algeria, slackened off during the weekend, but eight tribesmen were killed in one clash.

A strong band of Algerian rebels crossed Algeria's eastern frontier into Tunisia and attacked party headquarters of the moderate nationalist Neo-Destour Party at Sidi Aich, near Gafsa.

It was the first attack Algerians have made on the party led by Habib Bourguiba, which is now for the most part cooperating with France following the agreement which gave Tunisia partial home-rule.

Water Floods Road Area

The State Highway Department Monday was planning to pump out eight inches of water on Wallace Road, about a mile and a half north of West Salem, from a spot which residents of the area said had not been flooded in 65 years.

The water, which rose to the highway from a low spot west of the road which has often contained water, will be pumped out Tuesday and the road bed will be raised in the near future, Highway Department officials said.

AGREEMENT DUE
WASHINGTON (U) — The United States expects to conclude in about a month a new agreement with the British stretching this country's proving ground farther into the South Atlantic so the Air Force can test a new long range guided missile.

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New Regime Takes Over Jordan Reins

AMMAN, Jordan (U) — A new government took over in Jordan Monday under royal injunction to stamp out disorder and clean up "disturbing elements," including Civil Service employees, which have kept the country in an up-roar over the Baghdad Pact.

American and official sources said the 14,000-man Arab legion, Jordan's crack army, was in firm control and the country calm after a weekend of rioting and demonstrations.

Only minor demonstrations were reported Monday. One included the stoning of an American Quaker hospital at Ajloun in Eastern Jordan.

Mob Attack Repelled
(During the disorders, the State Department in Washington reported, the U.S. Marine guard fired in the air Saturday and with other personnel repelled a mob attack on the U.S. Consulate in the Jordan-administered section of Jerusalem.)

(Washington officials and a British Foreign Office spokesman charged that money was paid by Communist sources to foment the anti-pact disorders and that there were indications Egyptian and Saudi Arabian sources had a hand in encouraging them.)

Prince, Grace Said Planning April Vows

MONTE CARLO, Monaco (U) — Prince Rainier III and Hollywood star Grace Kelly will be married in Monaco in April, the chief of the prince's private Cabinet announced Monday.

Paul Neghes, the official, said there will be two ceremonies, civil and religious. He did not give the exact dates.

Back in the United States, Prince Rainier's personal chaplain, Very Rev. J. Francis Tucker expressed doubt, however, that the sovereign had given anybody authority to speak for him on the matter of his forthcoming marriage. He also hinted that the prince would prefer a wedding in the U. S.

W. B. Phillips, 88, Succumbs

Ike Puts in Regular Work Day Monday

WASHINGTON (U) — President Eisenhower put in a regular working day Monday—and then took some work "home" with him.

Closing out his first full day at the presidential desk since his Sept. 24 heart attack, Eisenhower also scheduled for 9 a. m. (EST) Tuesday a resumption of his weekly meetings with Republican congressional leaders.

Press Secretary James C. Hagerty said the President knocked off work on printers' proofs of his economic message to Congress—to be delivered Jan. 23—about 4 p. m. and returned to the living quarters of the executive mansion.

Hagerty said he took some of the proofs with him for further study in the evening.

In his fairly busy day in the executive wing of the White House, Eisenhower also sandwiched in the sending of greetings to Vice President Nixon on his 43rd birthday.

He sent to Congress by special message his already controversial "soil bank" plan for farmers and dispatched 155 nominations to the Senate.

Eisenhower also called his appointment secretary back on the job "indefinitely." Bernard Shanley, who resigned Nov. 15 for lack of work, was at his desk as Eisenhower resumed "the full duties of the presidency," as he put it, after a 12-day rest in Key West, Fla.

Ike Back at Desk, Adlai Shuns New England Race

President Eisenhower's return to his White House desk, his farm message to Congress, a birthday party for Vice President Nixon, and further shaping up of Adlai Stevenson's campaign plans, topped the political news Monday.

Eisenhower, back in the White House after 12 days in the Florida sunshine, called his appointment secretary, Bernard Shanley, back on the job from which he resigned Nov. 15 for lack of work.

Press Secretary James C. Hagerty gave a "No comment" reply to questions about a magazine poll of 246 heart specialists indicating that three out of five believed Eisenhower sufficiently recovered from his heart attack to seek a second term.

On the same question, Rep. Cole (R-N.Y.) said "It is not in the best interest of the country" that Eisenhower seek another term. He said "It is not fair to Dwight Eisenhower to appeal to his sense of duty by urging him to run again."

Meanwhile, there was word that unless Eisenhower declares his second term intentions by Jan. 20 Sen. Knowland of California may become an active entry in the race for the Republican presidential nomination.

In the Democratic presidential nomination race, Stevenson asked that his name be withheld from the New Hampshire primary March 13.

He said he has entered the March 20 primary in Minnesota and "to enter both would mean that I could not do in either what I think ought to be done to make a primary election really meaningful."

However, Stevenson's supporters announced they will enter a slate of convention delegates favorable to his candidacy in the New Hampshire race.

In the Senate, Vice President Nixon got plaudits from Republicans in a brief salute to his 43rd birthday. Democratic reaction was polite but cool.
