Fire Runs Up, Loss Down at Four Corners

FOUR CORNERS—Volunteer firemen of the Four Corners Rural Fire Protection District answered 60 calls for the year of 1955.

This was an increase over the preceding year but many of the calls were small grass and brush fires. There were three false alarms and one search for two lost small boys.

The property loss was \$10,530 which was less than 1954, and the value of property involved was \$276,150 which was \$46,700 less than the 1954 estimate.

There were 29 structural fires, and one mutual aid call to the State of Oregon. Total number of men answering calls were 655 with an average of nearly 11 men per call.

The equipment now includes three pieces of apparatus with one more in the planning stage to be stationed in the recently formed Middle Grove Fire District.

Expansion of the fire hall building included a 30 by 40 foot extension of the equipment building on the north and a recreation and storage space on the east, adding 2400 square feet of floor space to the building. The construction was of cement blocks.

Automatic doors were installed on the front of the units that house the fire apparatus adding much to the facility of getting off to a quick start when the siren blows.
