

4 Russian Scientists Plan Visit to U. S. to Study Polio Vaccine

WASHINGTON (U)—Four Russian medical scientists are coming to the United States next week for a month's study of Salk vaccine and American methods of treating polio.

The Public Health Service announced Sunday it had invited the

Soviet scientists at the request of the State Department. The Russians will visit seven American cities, including a trip to Pittsburgh to meet Dr. Jonas Salk, developer of the polio vaccine, and visit the Municipal Hospital.

Although no time table was announced, they also will visit Washington and the National Institutes of Health, Children's Hospital in Boston; the Yale University Medical School in New Haven; the University of Minnesota Medical School in Minneapolis; Children's Hospital Research Foundation in Cincinnati; and Johns Hopkins University in Baltimore.

Dr. Alexis I. Sholokov, a Russian-speaking virologist at the National Institutes, will accompany the Russians and act as interpreter.

The four Russians, all from the Academy of Medical Sciences of the U.S.S.R., are:

Mikhail P. Chumakov, director of the Polymyolitis Research Institute; Marina K. Voroshilova, senior research worker of the Polymyolitis Institute; Anatoli A. Smorodintsev, director of the department of virology of the Institute of Experimental Medicine; and Lev I. Lukin, scientist of the academy.

Big Narcotics Party Raided In California

CHATSORTH, Calif. (U)—In one of the largest narcotics raids on record in Southern California, peace officers early Sunday surprised 87 persons including 16 teen-age girls at an alleged marijuana smoking party. Six adults were arrested and 28 juveniles were cited and remanded to custody of their parents.

Police Det. Sgt. Dick Hill said 11 officers, acting on a tip, followed the cars of teenagers and young adults to their rendezvous at a home near the northwest corner of the San Fernando Valley. The officers blinked their lights as did the other cars on signal approaching the home, then forced their way into the party. Sgt. Hill said the home, just over the Ventura County line, belongs to Mr. and Mrs. Walter Bell who had given their sons permission to have "a few friends over."

Petticoat Feud Seen Cause of Eden Trouble

LONDON (U)—Could it be that a petticoat feud underlies Prime Minister Eden's troubles within his Conservative Party? Whispers in 'Mayfair' were brought out in the open in print Sunday, just as criticism of the Eden regime seemed to simmer down. Two young and attractive women, among others, have been mentioned in the gossip. They are Lady Eden, 35-year-old wife of the prime minister, and Lady Pamela Berry, 41-year-old wife of the editor-in-chief of the powerful conservative Daily Telegraph.

The "Eden Affair" swelled after the Daily Telegraph, always a staunch government supporter, joined in assailing the administration. Eden firmly denied a week ago that he had any intention of resigning in the face of criticism by members of his party—and some Conservative papers—that he was not providing bold leadership for the nation. Since then Tory politicians have been patching up differences that might have existed with public proclamations of loyalty.

But Lord Beaverbrook's Sunday Express, taking note of the harmony sounded by the males, remarked:

"And soon—who knows—the differences between their women-folk may be discreetly squared up too."

Slaying Victim Eliminated as Brink Suspect

GEORGETOWN, Mass. (U)—Police eliminated the possibility Sunday that the body of a man found slain in a cemetery here might be that of one of 11 men indicted in the \$1219,000 Brink's robbery. State police, including a fingerprint expert, a pathologist and a photographer, rushed to the scene directly after the body was found on the possibility it might be that of James I. Fabry, 44, of Boston, one of two alleged Brink's bandits still missing.

Banister Slide Kills Woman

PHILADELPHIA (U)—A socially prominent woman fell to her death from a stairwell at the Bellevue-Stratford Hotel Saturday night when she demonstrated to friends how "I use to slide down banisters when I was a kid."

Mrs. Louise White Schoettie, 44, who lived in the main line community of Wynnewood in suburban Philadelphia, was attending a dance at the hotel.

The tragedy horrified some 250 guests at the dance. It occurred on a winding marble stairway leading to the hotel lobby from a second-floor ballroom.

As Mrs. Schoettie descended the steps with two friends, she remarked: "This is how I used to slide down banisters when I was a kid."

Leaning over the circular railing, she started to slide, lost her balance and with a shriek toppled 37-feet to her death.

Mrs. Schoettie, a mother of four children, was the former wife of Ferdinand P. Schoettie, New York advertising executive and member of a socially prominent Philadelphia family.

The couple's children are two sons, Ferdinand Jr., stationed with the U.S. Navy at Bermuda; Michael, a student at Yale; and two daughters, Joan and Polly.

New Chandler Power Plant Operation Set

WASHINGTON (U)—Secretary of the Interior McKay announced Sunday that the new Chandler power plant on the Yakima reclamation project in Washington state will be placed in service this week.

McKay said testing of the two 6,000-kilowatt generators and synchronization with the Bonneville Power Administration's transmission system is now being completed.

Formal dedication ceremonies for the new plant will be held Feb. 1 by the Kennewick chamber of commerce. Reclamation Commissioner W. A. Deshaimey will attend.

The \$2,400,000 Chandler power plant and switchyard replaces the smaller Prosser power plant. McKay said the Prosser plant was retired last year after returning to the federal treasury about twice its cost during 23 years of operation.

Revenues from the new plant are estimated to pay its cost of operation and maintenance and repay its construction costs by 1965. After that year, the revenues will apply to unpaid portions of the irrigation allocation of the Yakima project. The whole project is expected to pay for itself by 2022.

Shots Cut Down Student in Ohio

CINCINNATI (U)—A high school sophomore strolling down a street with a friend was shot to death Sunday night.

The victim was Melvin Skinner, 15, hit above the right eye by one of seven bullets fired at him and a friend, John Wilhelm, 15.

Police said Skinner's cousin, Norman Kneipp Jr., 21, admitted the shooting because he wanted to "show off." Kneipp was held for further questioning without charge.

Middle West Frigid; Freeze Belts Florida

Icy winds raced across the Midwest Sunday but Florida warmed up a bit after a chilly night that dealt a knockout blow to thousands of acres of crops.

Winter returned to the Central Plains and the western portion of the Midwest with snow, 50 mile-an-hour winds and below zero temperatures.

Up to one inch of new snow peppered Minnesota, Eastern Iowa and Southern Wisconsin. Noon temperatures were below zero from northern Montana eastward across North Dakota and into Minnesota. Temperatures plummeted as far south as northern Texas.

The mass of Arctic air was moving fairly rapidly through the Ohio valley. Near blizzard conditions were predicted for Minnesota.

The Weather Bureau said Sunday was the beginning of more normal temperatures in Florida. But Saturday night was disastrous to Florida vegetable farmers.

Thousands of acres of crops that had escaped heavy damage in the past week of record length cold were badly damaged. Winds diminished for the first time, allowing frost and ice to form all the way to the southern tip of the state's vegetable belt.

In Dade (Miami) County alone, the loss which had been placed at 10 million dollars only Saturday now was estimated at 20 million dollars.
