

Americans Finish 29th . . . Russian Speed Skater Cracks World Record

DAVOS, Switzerland (U.P.)—Young Yuri Michailov of Russia streaked to a world record in the 1,500-meter race Friday to give the power-packed Russians their third straight championship in the Swiss International Speed Skating Tournament.

Americans burst loose with a performance that three times shattered the U. S. record for the distance, but they failed to finish higher than 29th.

Soviets Eye Sweep
The Soviet squad, bound for Cortina d'Ampezzo and the first Russian appearance in the Winter Games opening next week, is expected to make a clean sweep of this meet Saturday.

Veteran Oleg Goncharenko, who won the 5,000-meter race Thursday, is rated favorite in the 10,000-meter test—closing event of the four-day Davos meet, major preview to the big show at Cortina. The Italian sponsors of the Olympic Games plan a final pre-Olympic test at Lake Misurina, on Jan. 22.

Default Possible
The Russians, with several other stars entered Saturday, may win by default. Sigge Ericsson of Sweden, 1955 world skating champion, Knut Johannessen and Hjalmar Andersen of Norway will be on the sidelines resting up for the Olympics. Ericsson and Johannessen finished first and second in the 10,000 at the world championships in Moscow last February.

IBG Officers Deny Charges

3 Plead Innocent In Antitrust Suit

CLEVELAND (U.P.)—Three officers of the International Boxing Guild pleaded innocent Friday to an indictment charging them and the International Boxing Guild and the boxing guild of Ohio with violation of the Sherman Antitrust Act.

Released on \$2,000 bond each were Charles Johnston of New York, general president of IBG; William Daly of Englewood, N. J., IBG general treasurer, and Albert W. Del Monte of Cleveland, president of the boxing guild of Ohio.

The two guilds and three officers were among a dozen defendants named in a suit seeking \$450,000 in treble damages for alleged violation of anti-trust laws filed Thursday in federal court.

The suit was filed by Herman I. Spero of Warrensville Heights, producer of studio boxing shows televised by station WEWS here from April 2 to Oct. 1 last year.

He charged in his petition that the defendants combined to force him to discontinue producing the studio boxing shows by boycotting and refusing to permit their boxers to participate in the shows.

Spero seeks \$100,000 for loss of the boxing shows and \$50,000 for damage to his health, the amount to be tripled under anti-trust laws. He said damage to his health resulted from anguish and humiliation caused by the defendants.

Canadian Club Used as Lever

WINNIPEG (U.P.)—Harry Sonshine, team director of the Toronto Argonauts, said Friday some American college football players were using his team as a lever to get better pay from U. S. teams.

"One player—a quarterback—claimed we offered him \$17,000," Sonshine said. "He was just asking to further his own end. We're not even looking for a quarterback."

The player was not identified. Sonshine took time out to answer recent charges by Bert Bell, commissioner of the National Football League, and some Western Canada officials that he was hurting Canadian football.

He said his club has not talked to any NFL player this year who is under contract or option. Bell blasts Toronto.

He was commenting on a report from New York in which Bell criticized Toronto's raiding tactics. Bell said:

"Toronto has been the worst offender and still is the worst offender. I don't think Sonshine has done Canadian football any good."

"To which Sonshine commented: 'Apparently all Bell wants is for me to return Dubinski, Shipp and a couple other boys I picked up last year.'"

He was referring to quarterback Tom Dubinski and lineman Billy Shipp, whom he grabbed from NFL clubs for the 1955 season.

Canada Eyes Single League

WINNIPEG (U.P.)—A joint meeting of Canada's Western and Eastern pro football leagues Friday recommended the formation of a single Canadian football league, embracing both groups.

The recommendation, made at a closed session, will be brought up either Saturday or Sunday at separate annual meetings of the two leagues. If approved, it will mean the two leagues would operate under similar rules including the number of imports carried by each team. Last year the Western League permitted 12 players from the United States but was required to cut down to 10—the Eastern Big Four limit—for the Grey Cup playoff.

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Coach Blames Zone Defense

DAVIES CLAIMS CAGE SPORT BEING RUINED

GETTYSBURG, Pa. (U.P.)—"The zone defense is ruining college basketball," says Bob Davies, former college and pro star now coaching at Gettysburg (Pa.) College.

The 36-year-old Davies says basketball in the college ranks has deteriorated since he played at Seton Hall from 1928 until 1942. He says the zone defense is popular now because old coaches are retiring and the new mentors are former high school coaches who stressed the zone.

Davies says players who play zone defense in college never will be good pros. "You've got to be able to guard your man and switch properly to make the grade in the NBA. The greatest college player who is accustomed to guarding an area instead of a man couldn't even guard his little brother in the pro league."

Wants Zone Outlawed
"The zone is spoiling college basketball and college basketball players, and I'd like to see it outlawed for the benefit of the kids themselves."

Davies also thinks the colleges will come around to using some version of the pro's 24 second rule. The NBA players must attempt a shot at the basket within 24 seconds or lose possession. "If such a time limit rule ever does come, I think the college players should be allowed 34 to 35 seconds before having to take a shot," Davies said.

Former Rochester Star
Davies, who starred with the Rochester Royals in the National Basketball Association, says the zone outlawed the zone and "the game is better for it. Players who play zone defense are retrogressing because it discourages individual development, while man-to-man players are progressing because they are playing all-round basketball as it was intended to be played."

"Sure, I might be able to win more games by using the zone, but I believe a coach must first think of the individual development of his players. Man-to-man defense encourages individual development and that's the important thing," Davies says.
