Credit Curbs Expired in '52

WASHINGTON — Federal controls on consumer credit, when they expired on May 7, 1952, required a one-third down payment on automobiles and full payment within 18 months.

If adopted by Congress, President Eisenhower's suggestion Tuesday that standby control authority be restored would reinstate the power of the federal reserve board to invoke — when and if necessary — the old "Regulation W." Used in World War II and revived in the Korean War, Regulation W specified down payments of not less than 15 per cent and installment payments running not longer than 18 months for furniture, floor coverings, and major appliances like refrigerators and washing machines.

These were the terms in the final eight months of the regulation. They had been altered from time to time earlier.

France Assembly Speaker Elected

Polk Shooting Case Due for Jury Debate

DALLAS, Ore. — State and defense concluded testimony Tuesday in the assault trial of Mrs. Beulah Ethel Story and the case was expected to be given to the jury Wednesday.

The charge was changed to assault with a deadly weapon, after a ruling that Legislative action last year left no penalty for "intent to kill," as stated on the original charge. The new charge was allowed to be substituted on the grand jury indictment.

Mrs. Story, who has regained her former name of Jones in a divorce action, is accused of shooting and wounding her husband, James Story, Nov. 3.

State witnesses called Tuesday were James Styles, logger who was near the scene; State Patrolman Lloyd Riegel; and William Brown, who took Story to the hospital.

The defense called several witnesses in an apparent attempt to establish Mrs. Story's contention that she was in fear for her life.

Strange Voice Startles City Policeman

A Salem Police radio operator was startled to hear a strange voice from his speaker Tuesday evening.

Identifying himself by call letters unknown here, he explained that he was a Missouri police officer in Albany on official business and requested directions to the Albany police station.

He was told how to get to the station, only a few blocks from his position at the time. It was believed here that he made it as no further calls for aid were received.

Sewage in Well Water Worries Corvallis Areas

CORVALLIS — Sewage water is seeping into the drinking water supplies of South Corvallis fringe areas.

Robert Zimmerman, Benton County health sanitarian, told the Legislative Interim Committee on local Government Monday night that "we put dye in the toilets and it shows up in the wells."

J. M. Stewart, representing the Corvallis Central Labor Council, urged that sub-dividers be required to provide utility services such as water, sewers and streets, adding the price of these to the price of the lots.

Skipper Gets Blame for Shipwreck

BALTIMORE — The U. S. Coast Guard Tuesday placed the blame for the Levin J. Marvel shipwreck tragedy squarely on the shoulders of the skipper, John H. Meckling, and recommended his prosecution.

The Marvel, an ancient three-masted cargo schooner which had been converted to the tourist trade, broke up in the heavy seas of Hurricane Connie last Aug. 14. Fourteen lives were lost.

The tragedy occurred in Chesapeake Bay off North Beach, Md., a summer resort 30 miles southeast of Washington. Nine passengers and all four crew members, including Meckling, survived.

Adm. A. C. Richmond, Coast Guard commandant in Washington, said the hearing record supported evidence of probable violations of certain maritime statutes by Meckling.

Southeast U.S. Snowstorm Heads for Sea

The southeast's worst snowstorm of the winter moved out to sea Tuesday—but a new storm appeared to be heading for the area.

The storm dumped up to 12 inches of snow on North Carolina, Tennessee and Virginia Monday and Tuesday. Many highways, especially in the mountains, were too slick to travel. Many public schools were closed.

The weather bureau said the low pressure area crossed southern Georgia and northern Florida late Monday night and moved on into the Atlantic.

This left cloudy skies over most of the United States Tuesday.

Allies Fail to Find Way to Ban A-Tests

WASHINGTON — Secretary of State Dulles said Tuesday two years of allied searching has failed to produce any workable formula for banning or limiting atomic bomb tests.

He told a news conference "technical difficulties" have blocked formulation of any plan which could be presented to Russia with assurance it would protect the interests of both sides.

The whole question, he said, is highly complex and "very much a mystery to me" — one for the scientists and engineers to wrestle with. But he conceded it probably will come up in his and President Eisenhower's talks with British Prime Minister Eden beginning Jan. 30.

Valsetz Records 3 Inches of Snow

VALSETZ — A new storm draped three inches of snow on Valsetz Tuesday.

The wet snow fell throughout the day as temperatures here fluctuated between 31 and 38 degrees during the 24 hours ending Tuesday night. Weather observer Teddy Goodell said the three inches of snow was recorded as an inch of precipitation, bringing the total this month to 31.53 inches.

Dormitories at State Schools To Hike Rates

PORTLAND — The State Board of Higher Education meeting here Tuesday approved room and board increases in dormitories at the state schools for next year. Room rent for multiple occupancy will go up from \$68 to \$75 a term at the university and OSC and from \$63 to \$68 at the colleges of education. Board will go up from \$47 to \$48 a month.

Officials said the increase was necessary because the recent Legislature ruled that utilities costs in dormitories, previously paid from board funds, now must be paid from dormitory fees.

Tire Pump Saves Life

TERRACE, B. C. — An automobile tire pump was credited Tuesday with saving the life of a motorist who had been left for dead in his car.

Mounted police reported passers-by thought Graham Whatman, 34, of Prince Rupert, and Mrs. Ann Ezilda, 36, were both dead of carbon monoxide fumes when they found the couple in a car stalled in a snowbank Monday. They hurried to notify authorities here and Mr. and Mrs. William McRae, who lived near the scene.

The McRaes revived Whatman by forcing air into his lungs with a tire pump. His woman companion, however, was dead.

Hydro Project Vote in Eugene Due March 27

EUGENE — Eugene residents will vote March 27 on municipal construction of the Beaver Marsh hydro-electric project.

The City Council set the special election date Monday night. The charter amendment, on which residents will vote, would give the city authority to build the project on the upper McKenzie River and to sell 8½ million dollars in bonds to finance it.

State and federal licenses have been granted for the project, to be located about 75 miles east of Eugene.

However, Sen. Neuberger (D-Ore.) has a bill in Congress which would revoke the federal license.

Walkout Halts Ford Division

DETROIT — Production of the Ford Motor Co.'s luxurious Continental Mark II auto was halted Tuesday by a walkout of 60 workers.

A spokesman for the employees in the trim and final assembly department said they had complained of a production slowdown. The company did not comment.

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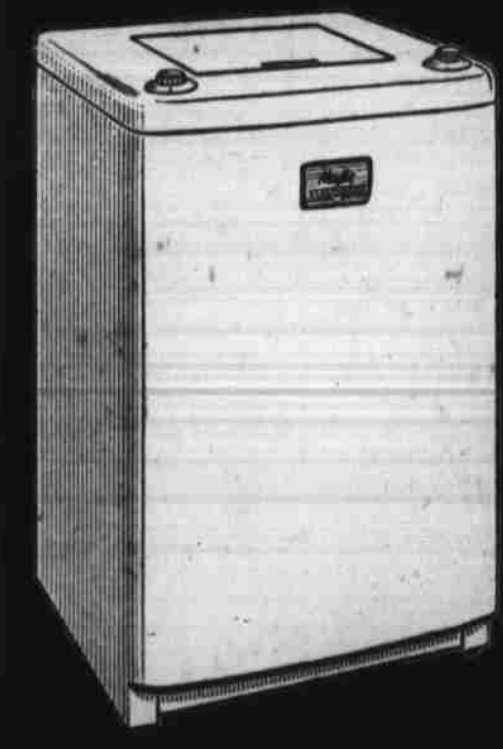
