

Ike May Counter Bulganin Note With Disarmament Plea

WASHINGTON (AP)—Diplomatic authorities speculated Friday that President Eisenhower may answer the Bulganin proposal for an American-Soviet friendship treaty with a new appeal for Russian cooperation in working out a disarmament program.

Labor Dispute Idles Newport Dock Activity

NEWPORT, Ore. (AP)—This Oregon coastal port was idle Friday for the second straight day as a result of a dispute between the local of the Teamsters Union and lumber companies and haulers.

Also involved is the Yaquina local of the independent Longshoremen's and Warehousemen's Union.

The Teamsters are trying to unionize drivers and haulers' employees in the area. Their efforts finally led to a picket line at the Yaquina docks.

Longshoremen refused first to unload lumber trucks. Then, when the employers involved forced the Teamsters' pickets from the docks to incoming roads, the longshoremen left their jobs on a ship, saying they refused to work behind a picket line.

Guy Robert Lumber Co., Triangle Pacific Lumber Corp. and two haulers, Louis Jansen and Leonard Avery, obtained an injunction from Circuit Judge Fred McHenry. It directed the two unions to "cease and desist in acts resulting in refusal to handle lumber."

The injunction was served Thursday but work stopped and the Kalmr, the only vessel at the dock, sailed Friday with only half a cargo.

William Holland, attorney for the companies, said an effort will be made early next week to bring contempt proceedings against the unions.

Tom Lashbaugh, longshoremen's spokesman, said his union had nothing to do with the dispute but that it has a contract allowing it to recognize the picket line of another union. He said longshoremen would return to work when the picket line was withdrawn.

Rainstorms Come to End In California

The rains stopped in most parts of California Friday after a near-record 48-hour drenching. Heavy snow hit some of Colorado's mountain region.

Much of the nation's mid-sector was sprayed with drizzle or new snow. A 30-inch fall of snow closed U. S. Highway 160 on the west side of 10,850-foot Wolfe Creek Pass in southwestern Colorado. Red Mountain Pass, in the same general area was closed, also, by a snowslide as snowfall and high winds continued over the western part of the state.

Other new falls in southwest Colorado measured a foot at Lizardhead and 10 inches at Rico.

Extension of Polio Shots Project Voted

WASHINGTON (AP)—The House Commerce Committee Friday voted to extend the present anti-polio vaccination program from this Feb. 15 until July 1, 1957.

A similar bill has been approved by the Senate Labor Committee. A House committee spokesman said a speedy vote on the measure would be sought in the House.

The program provides for federal aid to states in buying polio shots for children and pregnant mothers. Congress last year appropriated 30 million dollars for the program.

Western Air Lines Strike Talks Fail

LOS ANGELES (AP)—Another effort to settle the Western Air Lines strike failed Friday.

Chairman Everett Edwards of the National Mediation Board, who had been conferring separately with the disputants this week, checked out of his hotel to return to Washington.

"Apparently neither side is ready to settle yet," he told a newsmen.

Edwards talked with company officials and with representatives of the Brotherhood of Railway Clerks, whose 850 employees members walked out Jan. 9 in a wage dispute. A company spokesman said there were no joint company-union meetings this week.

Meantime, WAL's 257 pilots, furloughed because of the clerks' walkout, were notified today that the Air Line Pilots Assn. will pay them \$300 to \$500 a month benefits during the layoff. Payments will start immediately.

Free Chinese Exchange Fire With Commies

TAIPEH, Formosa (AP)—The Nationalists said their Quemoy artillery fired a heavy duel with Red Chinese guns at Amoy and Tamsui Island Friday. They reported also that two Nationalist warships sank one of a Communist gunboat flotilla in a sea clash.

The Nationalist warships met the Red flotilla west of Wuchiu Island, about 100 miles north of Quemoy and 25 miles from the mainland. The Nationalist navy said the communists fled without damaging its ships.

Communist guns fired 785 shells at Quemoy, close offshore the Red China port of Amoy, the Nationalist defense ministry said.

Radio Says Saudi Arabia Masses Army

AMMAN, Jordan (AP)—A new short wave radio station opened in Jordan Thursday night. It broadcast a claim that Saudi Arabia massed troops along Jordan's frontier during recent disturbances in this country.

The commentator was Younis Bahri, Hitler's Arabic announcer at Radio Berlin during World War II. The new station is reported to be under government control.

Bahri said the Saudi Arabian troops were concentrated at Tebuk, and that there were no indications they have yet been withdrawn. (The British War Office Thursday reported a massing of about 3,000 Saudi troops at Tebuk.)

The station, which ended its transmission with the Jordan national anthem, said it stood for "Arab unity."

Lumbermen Elect New President

PORTLAND (AP)—The new president of the Lumbermen's Industrial Relations Committee is Judd Greenman, Portland, a retired executive of the Long-Bell Lumber Co. and chairman of the board of the National Lumber Manufacturers Assn.

Peaks Hold Fate of Plane

SAN BERNARDINO, Calif. (AP)—Air rescue planes dived Friday over the rugged San Bernardino Mountains, searching for an Air Force B25 medium bomber reported missing during Thursday night's rainstorm.

The air force said the twin-engine plane was on a flight from Goodfellow Air Force Base, San Angelo, Tex., to nearby Norton AFB. The pilot radioed for approach instructions before disappearing into the rainy darkness at 7:29 p. m.

The air force said those aboard included Capt. Bill F. Shotwell, Vancouver, Wash.

Egyptian Dam Aid Questioned By Neuberger

WASHINGTON (AP)—Sen. Neuberger (D-Ore.) asked Friday how the United States could afford to help pay for a dam in Egypt if it's "too poor" to finance the Hells Canyon project at home.

In a speech prepared for Senate delivery he called attention to the administration's apparent willingness to help Egypt finance the proposed \$1,300,000,000 Aswan Dam in the Nile River.

"Yet," he said, "this same administration has told the inhabitants of the Pacific Northwest that we are too poor to erect a dam costing 350 million dollars at Hells Canyon."

"Interior Secretary McKay told the residents of Oregon that, because of the federal debt, it was necessary to forego further federal dams. If it is our debt that keeps us from financing a high dam on the Snake River along the Idaho-Oregon border, how can we finance a still higher dam on the Nile River in Egypt?"

Neuberger proposed a resolution to require matching dollar-for-dollar spending for multi-purpose dams abroad with those in the United States.

Tax Hike for Road Users Wins Backing

WASHINGTON (AP)—Democratic and Republican leaders in the House reported agreement Friday on the need of raising highway user taxes for a huge road construction program.

The agreement could be a long step toward realization of a program advocated by both parties, but which fell by the wayside in Congress last year in a dispute over finances.

No exact figure was set on amount of new taxes needed, but the House Ways and Means Committee is already at work on proposals reported to be aiming at 14 to 17 billion dollars.

Friday's meeting was attended by House Speaker Rayburn (D-Tex.), House Republican Leader Martin (Mass.), Democratic Reps. Cooper (Tenn.), McCormack (Mass.) and Fallon (Md.), and Republican Reps. Jenkins (Ohio) and McGregor (Ohio). McCormack is the Democratic house leader.

Rayburn told reporters: "It was unanimous, or practically so, there would be some additional taxes on (highway) users, and what they use, to make up some of the money."

Martin was asked whether the administration would support increased taxes and replied he would think so.

Any tax-raising measure would be added to the 13-year, 51½ billion dollar construction bill introduced in the House by Fallon Thursday.

Nigerians Set To Receive Queen Today

LAGOS, Nigeria (AP)—Thousands of barefooted Nigerians trudged hot and dusty miles from the bush country into Lagos Friday to welcome Queen Elizabeth II, arriving Saturday for a 20-day ceremonial visit.

A million persons, including Lagos' 300,000 are expected to be on hand to cheer the first British sovereign to visit this colony.

Friday afternoon dusky squatters, many under umbrellas to protect themselves from the sun, staked claim to a yard of space on the 11-mile route from the airport to Government House, where the Queen and the Duke of Edinburgh will stay.

The royal couple will travel 2,300 Nigeria, a country the size of Spain with 32 million people. They left London late Friday night at Tripoli, Libya, completing the 1,400-mile first leg of the flight. Later it took off on the 1,900-mile jump across the West African hump from the Mediterranean to Lagos, on the Gulf of Guinea. It is due at Lagos Saturday forenoon.

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East German Army Asks to Join Alliance

BERLIN (AP)—Communist East Germany asked Friday that its new army be admitted to the Warsaw Alliance's military command, headed by Soviet Russia.

The official East German News Agency ADN announced this development at a "security conference" in Prague of the Warsaw Alliance members, Russia and its seven European satellites.

The conference opened with a charge by a Czechoslovak speaker that the United States and certain other Western powers are trying to revive the Cold War.

ADN said East German Deputy Premier Walter Ulbricht made the request for inclusion of the new East German "People's Army" into the Red bloc's military command.

'Baby' on Craft Really Burnt, Doctor Finds
MINNEAPOLIS (AP)—A garbled radio message from a Northwest Airlines plane produced a comedy of confusion Thursday—but not the new-born baby that doctors were all set to attend.

Operations officers received a message from Capt. John Bradshaw, pilot of a DC-6 en route from Chicago to Portland on a non-stop flight. They thought Bradshaw said he had a "birth" case aboard and had decided to land in the Twin Cities.

The message plunged NWA headquarters into a bustle of excitement. Dr. George Martin of Minneapolis was summoned and told to meet the plane.

Dr. Martin went aboard, and learned for the first time that Bradshaw actually said "burn" instead of "birth."

Stella Green, 30, Portland, had suffered burns about the stomach when a three-year-old boy jostled her while she was drinking coffee. The doctor gave her some minor treatment and left. So did the plane after 30 minutes on the ground.

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TB Patient Reunited With Mother, Dies

SAN FERNANDO, Calif. (AP)—Death claimed 48-year-old Kenneth Forney Friday night in a tuberculosis sanitarium a few hours after he had been reunited with his mother, whom he had not seen for 26 years.

He had been a patient in Olive View Sanitarium since 1934 and his mother, Mrs. Elizabeth Forney, 73, said she did not learn of his whereabouts until three weeks ago.

"Don't you know me, sonny?" she inquired as she reached his bedside.

Forney moved his head feebly and tried to nod, but he was too weak to speak. He suffered a stroke early this month.

Mrs. Forney, who was flown from her home in McGraw, N.Y., by contributions of the McGraw Chamber of Commerce, said her son had not written to her in all the time he had been away from home. "And when I did reach him he couldn't speak to me."

HIROSHIMA, Japan (AP)—A 26-year-old man reported to have been about 400 yards from the center of the 1945 Hiroshima atom blast died Friday.

The newspaper Asahi said Kiyoshi Takeguchi, a telephone and telegraph office worker, was the second Hiroshima citizen to die of "atomic disease" this year.
