Delaney Runs 4:06.3 Mile

Wes Santee Places Back in 4th Spot

BOSTON (U) — Lost in the shuffle some 80 yards behind the leaders halfway through the journey, fabulous Ron Delaney of Villanova streaked to victory in the Hunter Mile in 4:06.3 in the Boston A.M. Games Saturday night.

A screaming crowd of 12,000 in Boston Garden saw Delaney treat Wes Santee like a high school runner, passing the American hope for the four-minute mile like a jet overtaking a monoplane.

Santee could do no better than fourth in the jockeying battle. Len Truex of the Army was second about five yards back of Delaney, while Joe Deady of Washington, a Georgetown post-graduate student, finished third.

Pacemaker Drops Out

It was a fantastic race all the way, with Santee's personal pace-maker, Bill Taylor of the Quantico Marines, whipping to a 58.6 quarter, then dropping out. But Santee couldn't hang on.

This was Santee's first serious mile effort of the season, so he can be excused for his 4:08.8 clocking.

Delaney's unofficial final quarter was 57 seconds which was more than fantastic—it's near unbelievable.

"I have no excuses," said Santee. "He just beat me. I guess I have to practice more."

Lee Calhoun, a gangling lad from North Carolina College who is fast becoming a prime Olympic hope, won the 45-yard high hurdles in 5.6.
