

Maryland Chief Seeks Bill to Make Strikers Arbitrate in Bus Tieup

BALTIMORE (U) — Maryland's Gov. Theodore R. McKeldin said Monday night he will propose "remedial legislation" to the Legislature which convenes in Annapolis Wednesday unless strike-disrupted bus and streetcar service is restored in Baltimore "immediately."

Brazil Chief's Cabinet Said Conservative

RIO DE JANEIRO, Brazil (U) — President-elect Juscelino Kubitschek has picked a predominantly conservative cabinet to help him run South America's biggest and most populous nation. He announced his selections Monday night, on the eve of his inauguration.

"Respect for law will be the religion of my government," he told a news conference.

Five of his 11 cabinet ministers are holdovers from the interim government which has held office pending his inauguration Tuesday. These include Foreign Minister Jose Carlos Macedo Soares.

An indication of the group's conservative tone was the appointment of Parsifal Barroso, a staunch Roman Catholic, as labor minister. Observers interpreted his selection as a barrier to any campaign by the Communists to win greater support within Brazilian labor unions.

The 33-year-old president-elect devoted most of the news conference to a discussion of Brazil's economic problems. He said he planned to work for an increase in facilities for transportation, electric power and production in general.

Kubitschek flew to the capital earlier Monday.

Guard Day Proclaimed For Feb. 19

Gov. Paul Patterson Monday proclaimed Feb. 19 as Oregon National Guard Day and Major Gen. Thomas E. Riley, state adjutant general, announced a statewide one-day recruiting drive on that date.

Although United States National Guard strength is at an all-time high, it falls short of the goal set by Congress, Riley said. Present Oregon membership is 5,922 and an increase of 1,200 is needed to meet the state's quota, he said.

Each unit in the state will be given a quota and plans are being made for drills, open houses, parades and aerial exhibitions, he said.

Arguments in Smith Custody Case Halted

SAN JOSE, Calif. (U) — Judge M. G. Del Muto halted arguments in the Susan Smith custody case Monday and told attorneys to bring in law citations Tuesday bearing on whether his court has jurisdiction.

He also told the court reporter to transcribe Mrs. Ellen Hightower's testimony about how she brought Mrs. Marjorie Smith's 3-year-old child to nearby Los Gatos from Oregon without the mother's consent.

Mrs. Smith was acquitted of a charge in Oregon that she conspired to murder her husband, Kermit. Victor Wolf, who described himself as a "love slave" of Mrs. Smith, was convicted of second-degree murder.

Mrs. Hightower, who seeks custody of the youngster, was the sister of Kermit Smith.

Mother, Going To Meet Son, Finds Body

BRUNSWICK, Ga. (U) — A mother driving to meet her son in Jacksonville, Fla., found his body in a parked car on U.S. 17 some 25 miles south of Brunswick Sunday.

Dr. J. O. Simmons, Camden County Coroner, said Thomas Peter Edgy, 36, apparently died accidentally of carbon monoxide fumes leaking from the exhaust of a 1949 Chevrolet convertible he purchased Saturday.

Mrs. Wilder told police that her son left home Sunday to return to Jacksonville where he had been working. She said he was in the habit of stopping along the road for a nap when he became sleepy. He apparently left the motor running to keep warm.

Burglar, 7, Shoots Woman

MEMPHIS (U) — Faced with capture, a 7-year-old "burglar" shot a woman pursuing him Monday.

Mrs. Joan Miller, 21, received a .32 bullet wound in an arm.

Police said the Negro lad, whose name was not revealed, was the youngest gunman ever heard of around these parts.

L. H. E. Lux said it all started when Mrs. Donna Estep arrived home to find the place ransacked. She saw the boy running and shouted "stop him" at two of her friends.

Mrs. Miller, with the aid of a car, caught up with the fleeing boy. She told police that he said: "Don't come up on me or I'll shoot."

Builder of 1st U.S. Plane Motor Dies

SAN FERNANDO, Calif. (U) — Death has taken Charles Edward Taylor, 67, who built the country's first aircraft engine. He died Monday night in Foothill Sanitarium of an asthmatic attack, less than two months after a special fund had been created by the aircraft industry to maintain him for the rest of his life.

'State Wouldn't Benefit From School Bill'

WASHINGTON (U) — Rep. Ellisworth (R-Ore.) does not believe Oregon would benefit financially from the school construction bill approved by the House Education Committee.

The measure would provide the states with funds based on a formula of multiplying the number of children between the ages of 5 and 17 by \$11.30. The state would be required to put up an equal amount.

Actually, Ellsworth said, Oregon probably would be "just a little better off if money to be paid by Oregon taxpayers to support the program could be kept in the state."

He said he favored an administration plan under which grants to the states would be made on a basis of need in relation to population. This bill also would take into account the effort made by the state to meet its own requirements.

Box of Deadly Poison Stolen

NEW YORK (U) — A box of the rare metal, thallium, has been stolen from a Staten Island plant, police said Monday night. They warned that it is deadly poison.

The metal, in 90 peach-shaped bars, was stolen over the weekend from the Nassau Smelting & Refining Co. in Tottenville, police said. It is used in telephone research.

The lightweight metal dissolves in water to form poisonous compounds.

Train Goes 160 Miles on \$10 Worth of Fuel

PEORIA, Ill. (U) — The Rock Island Railroad's new Talgo type train made a 160-mile Chicago-to-Peoria run on \$10 worth of diesel fuel Monday, and President Dwight D. Eisenhower said such economies ultimately might lead to lower fares.

Downing in a news conference during the special press run of the lightweight, low-slung train, said a recent study by another railroad showed that lower fares tend to attract more passengers.

The train, maintaining the schedule it will follow when it goes into regular service Feb. 11, made the trip in 2 1/4 hours.

It hit top speed of 90 miles an hour on straight stretches.

The only stop was at Morris, where Gov. William G. Stratton boarded the train for the remainder of the trip to Peoria.

Downing said he expected operating costs with the new train to be only 60 to 70 per cent of those for conventional equipment.

Balloon Sets Sail; Science Must Wait

OPPAMA, Japan (U) — A huge U. S. weather balloon Tuesday was speeding across the Pacific in unscientific silence.

The U. S. Navy said the big plastic gas bag was launched at 7:19 a. m. (5:19 p. m. Monday, EST) the third in a 20-balloon Navy weather experiment.

But for some reason its radio, supposed to send out periodic reports on what the balloon's instruments discover at high altitudes, quit working immediately.

Navy radar tracked it for 88 miles toward the United States before it got out of radar range.

Baltimore Fire Clues Lacking

BALTIMORE (U) — Investigators combing through the charred shell of a social hall reported Monday they found no positive clues as to the cause of the flash fire that snuffed out the lives of 19 women.

The 19 were among the thousand or more attending an oyster roast Sunday sponsored by the St. Rose of Lima Catholic Church at Arundel Park Hall in South Baltimore. About 200 were injured.

An oyster roast is a social affair identified with the Chesapeake Bay area. Oysters are prepared and served in virtually every form — except roasted. Normally held on Sunday afternoons, it is a popular method of fund-raising for charitable, political and social organizations.

Rood to Become School Chief of Clackamas Area

OREGON CITY (U) — Leslie G. Rood will succeed E. A. Woodworth as Clackamas County school superintendent April 15.

Rood, principal of Canby Grade School, was selected for the post by the County Court to replace Woodworth who is quitting because of ill health.

PITTSBURGH (U) — A divorced mother of 12 children, who gave birth to twins last year, became the mother of triplet sons Monday.

The new arrivals brought the family of Mrs. Hilda Vos, 39, to 11 boys and three girls. One girl died of pneumonia at the age of eight months 13 years ago.

Mrs. Vos said she and her husband, Peter, were divorced last Nov. 25.

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Adlai Lashes 'Bluff, Bluster' Of GOP Party

PHOENIX, Ariz. (U) — Adlai Stevenson said Monday one of the fundamental issues of the 1956 presidential campaign will be the Republican practice of "misrepresentation, misleading people and moral duplicity."

The Democratic presidential aspirant spoke at a Phoenix Press Club forum. He said that campaign discussion also will center on the problem of "special interests" and "an erratic foreign policy of slogans, bluff and bluster."

He said it made for bad communications "with the American people when 'one day a man resigns, and the next day you decorate him.' Presumably Stevenson was referring to Air Force Secretary Harold Talbott, who resigned under fire.

McCarthy's Aide Admits Forgery Count

NEW YORK (U) — Paul H. Hughes Monday admitted he forged his credentials as a McCarthy committee investigator, but contended he was pushed into the deception by Clayton Fritchey, deputy chairman of the Democratic National Committee.

Hughes is charged with perjury. Among other things, he is accused of having used forged documents to pass himself off as an investigator for Sen. Joseph R. McCarthy's (R-Wis.) Senate permanent investigating subcommittee.

Hughes went to McCarthy's enemies and sold alleged inside information on "illegal activities" of McCarthy's committee, the government says. It called this "one of the most fantastic schemes ever conducted in the annals of political intrigue."
