

Uneasy Quiet Settles On Alabama Campus In Segregation Row

TUSCALOOSA, Ala. (AP)—A personal appeal by University of Alabama President O. C. Carmichael quieted undergraduates demonstrating against enrollment of the school's first negro student Saturday night. An uneasy calm gripped the campus Sunday.

Hundreds of students paraded around the campus and rode and walked downtown for the second night in a row. They sang "Dixie" and in some instances waved Confederate flags and chanted "Keep Alabama White."

Westinghouse Accepts Offer Of Mediation

PITTSBURGH (AP)—Westinghouse Electric Corp. Sunday telegraphed its acceptance of a Federal Mediation Service proposal aimed at ultimate settlement of a 112-day-old strike by the AFL-CIO International Union of Electrical Workers.

An IUE spokesman said the union's negotiating committee will meet here Monday morning and will hand down its decision on the proposal at that time. The union has 44,000 members on strike at 30 plants across the nation.

The proposal was presented to both sides Saturday by Joseph F. Finnegan, director of the Federal Mediation and Conciliation Service.

The plan calls for the company and IUE to put into a temporary "deep freeze" a dispute over the company's right to make efficiency studies of certain workers' jobs.

Both sides would then go ahead and negotiate the other issues in the strike, such as wages, arbitration proceedings and length of contract. Upon settlement of these issues, workers would return to work. Ninety days after the return to work, negotiations on the time-study issue would resume.

If the issue is not fully settled then, the Mediation Service proposes that the unresolved facets of the issue be submitted to a fact-finding board, which would make recommendations.

Mother, Three Tots Found Shot to Death

GARDINER, N.Y. (AP)—A 28-year-old mother and her three children were found shot to death Sunday in what state police tentatively listed as a case of murder and suicide.

They were unable to establish immediately any motive.

The victims were Mrs. Alma Tattersall, wife of a town street department employee; Robert Jr., 3, Alma, 5, and Veronica, 4.

State Police were notified by the woman's husband, who said he got home from work about 1 p.m., and found the children's bodies in the living room of the family's frame bungalow, and his wife in a bedroom.

Tattersall, 34, said he had left the house about 5 a.m., to operate a highway sanding machine on town roads made slippery by a snowstorm.

C. R. Schwartz Rites Tuesday

Funeral services for Charles R. Schwartz, who died Saturday in a Salem rest home at the age of 79, will be 1:30 p.m. Tuesday in Clough-Barrick chapel, the Rev. Oscar A. Olsen officiating. Burial will be in City View Cemetery.

Schwartz, a retired carpenter who had been a Salem resident since 1909, leaves two daughters, Mrs. Florence Fox and Mrs. Mary Castle, both of Salem; son, Dell E. Schwartz, Seattle, Wash.; sister, Mrs. Emma White, Edmond, Okla.; five brothers, Frank and Grover Schwartz, both of Dallas; Ed Schwartz, Little Rock, Calif.; L. D. Schwartz, Pasadena, Calif.; and George Schwartz, Detroit Lakes, Minn.; and eight grandchildren and one great-grandchild.

Airline Claims Pacific Record

SEATTLE (AP)—A Northwest Orient Airlines record was claimed for a Tokyo-to-Seattle flight by a Lockheed Turbo Constellation plane Sunday.

Aided by tailwinds ranging from 90 to 130 miles per hour, the plane made the Great Circle route from Tokyo via Alaska in 14 hours, 32 minutes. The former mark, set in March, 1954, was 16 hours, 48 minutes.

The Great Circle Tokyo-to-Seattle route distance is 4,990 miles.

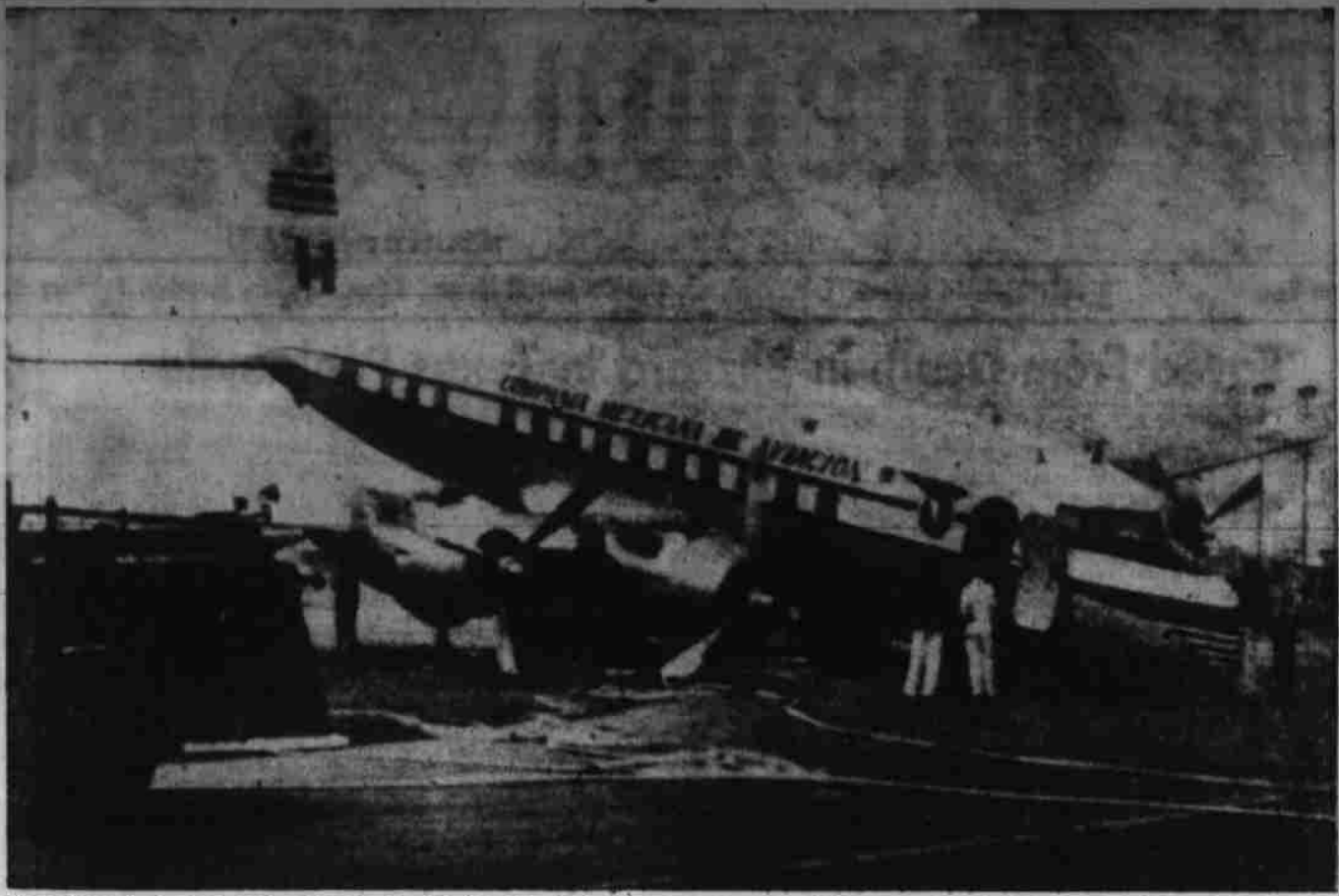

Soft Ground Quickly Halts Giant Airliner



LOS ANGELES—A DC-8 airliner leaving for Mexico City taxied over the edge of a ramp here Sunday, dug a wheel into soft ground, spun around and smashed its nose wheel and three propellers on the paved ramp. The tail was left 30 feet in the air. None of the 37 passengers and four crewmen were hurt. They left the plane through the cargo doorway in the nose. Damage was estimated at \$25,000 to the plane. 41 Escape in Plane Crash

LOS ANGELES (AP)—A DC-8 airliner leaving for Mexico City taxied over the edge of a ramp Sunday, dug its right wheel into soft ground, spun around and smashed its nose wheel and three propellers on the paved ramp. The nose-over left the tail 30 feet in the air.

None of the 37 passengers and 4 crewmen were hurt. They left the plane on steps brought to the cargo doorway in the plane's nose. A spokesman for the air line, Compania Mexicana de Aviacion, estimated damage to the plane at \$25,000.

WINCHESTER, Va. (AP)—Trygve Lie's daughter Guri and William Zeckendorf Jr., son of the real estate magnate, were married here secretly Saturday.

Later in New York, young Zeckendorf said they did it that way merely to save time and avoid complications.

The bride is the daughter of the former secretary general of the United Nations, and has been lecturing to American women's clubs on the life of a diplomat's daughter.

Zeckendorf, 27, said he met Miss Lie, who is the same age, through mutual friends more than a year ago.

They were married in a civil ceremony here Saturday afternoon by Norman E. Cooper, a court appointee. Cooper said the couple pledged him to secrecy about the marriage, which was performed in Cooper's home without attendants.

The elder Zeckendorf, who heads the real estate firm of Webb & Knapp and has been the promoter of big building projects across the country, first revealed the marriage at his home at Greenwich, Conn.

Later, young Zeckendorf, a vice president of his father's firm, said he and his bride had telephoned her parents in Norway, so the first announcement could be made there.

Young Zeckendorf said their parents on both sides of the Atlantic were "delighted" at the news, and they would go to Norway in the spring for a delayed honeymoon and visit the Lie family.

After a visit with his mother in New York Sunday, the couple left for Greenwich to visit his father.

\$1,100 Check Closes Case, Clears Old Embezzlement

BALTIMORE (AP)—Somewhere in this broad land, a man was \$1,100 poorer Saturday, but richer in spirit. And his bonding company of 29 years ago was happy, too.

The Fidelity and Deposit Co. received an unexpected check for \$1,100 last week which sent officials digging into files that had been closed more than 20 years to find the explanation.

They found it and a firm official said it helps illustrate the fact that many embezzlements are caused by basically honest people who momentarily succumb to the temptation to steal.

This, as it developed, was the story.

In 1921, the credit manager of a Minnesota wholesale grocery embezzled \$2,000 As insurer, Fidelity and Deposit reimbursed the employer and then tried to recover the money from the embezzler.

An agreement was reached by which the former credit manager would repay to the insurance company a little of the amount each month. But in 1927, after paying back about \$900, he suddenly disappeared.
