Atomic Power, Light Urged at U.S. Capitol

WASHINGTON — A bill authorizing an investigation of the possibility of using atomic energy to light, heat, power and air condition the capitol and adjoining buildings was introduced Monday by Rep. Cole (R-N.Y.).

The study would be undertaken by the architect of the capitol. He would be authorized to engage such professional services as would be necessary.

Cole is a former chairman of the House Senate Atomic Energy Committee. A similar bill is to be introduced in the Senate by Sen. Anderson (D-N.M.), present chairman of the joint committee.

Other buildings beside the capitol that would be effected by the proposed study include:

The Senate and House office buildings, the capitol power plant, the Supreme Court building, Congressional Library, the Botanic Garden, legislative garage, Government Printing Office, Washington City Post Office and the Folger Shakespearean Library.

All these buildings are now connected with the capitol power plants.

Burglars Hit Silverton Firm

SILVERTON — A weekend burglary resulted in theft of about \$25 from the Pacific Handle Co. of Silverton, the Marion County sheriff's office said Monday.

Deputy Amos Shaw said the cash was taken from a metal box in the firm's office. Entry was made by first cutting a mesh fence about the building and then going through a trap door, Shaw indicated. Filing cabinets in the office were found rifled.

The burglary was the third to happen within a week to Silverton business firms and apparently occurred either Saturday or Sunday nights.

Demos Okeh Highway Plan

WASHINGTON — Democratic House leaders gave clearance Monday to a pay-as-you-go financing plan calling for \$12,000,000,000 of new gasoline and highway use taxes for federal highway construction.

The tax program was immediately introduced in the House by Rep. Boggs (D-La.) and hearings were scheduled to start Feb. 15 before the House Ways and Means Committee.

The bill provides for increased fuel, truck and tire taxes to pay the federal share of an interstate super-highway program costing a grand total of some \$14 billion dollars in federal and state funds.

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East Side Petition For Sports Center Gets 5,000 Names

PORTLAND — The drive to force location of Portland's proposed eight million dollar sports center on the East Side got underway officially Monday with the filing of 5,000 signatures on an initiative petition.

The signatures of 18,316 voters are necessary if the measure is to appear on the May election ballot. Deadline for the signatures is Feb. 27.

The measure is aimed at overturning plans of a city commission to locate the sports-recreation center in Portland's west side, downtown district.

Westinghouse Strike Negotiations to Resume

PITTSBURGH — The AFL-CIO International Union of Electrical Workers—on strike for 113 days against Westinghouse Electric Corp.—Monday agreed to a new pattern for negotiations—resuming Tuesday with one major issue temporarily sidetracked.

The thorny issue of the company's right to make efficiency or time studies of certain jobs will be temporarily shelved.

Instead, the negotiators will concentrate on wages, arbitration proceedings and length of contract.

Architectural Bureau Proposed For Salem Office

PORTLAND — A legislative interim committee schools Monday discussed the possibility of establishment of an architectural department in the State Department of Education.

Sen. Lowell Steen, Umatilla Republican, proposed the plan because, he said, some architects are designing schools according to the district's ability to pay instead of the district's needs.

A plan for a multi-county metropolitan taxing district for the Portland area was discussed at the afternoon session, C. E. Zollinger, Portland school board member, supports the plan as a means of aiding districts which have used up their bonding authority.

Russ Object to U.S. Balloons

MOSCOW — The Soviet Union demanded Monday that West Germany lake measures "to prevent U. S. organizations from launching balloons" in German territory. A note said the U. S. S. R. considers the West German government responsible for actions of U. S. organizations on its territory.

The note, handed to the West German government at Bonn, was a followup to protests Sunday night by Moscow to the United States and Turkey. The Russians charged U. S. military forces sent aloft huge fleets of balloons carrying cameras and equipment over Soviet territory, menacing planes, and that some balloons launched in Turkey came down in Soviet Armenia.

Redmond Man Electrocut

PRINEVILLE — A lineman was killed by electric shock Monday afternoon when he accidentally made contact with a 12,000-volt circuit.

He was Charles Clark, 51, Redmond, who was working with a Pacific Power & Light Co. crew out of Bend.

Clark was atop a pole near Powell Butte, 10 miles west of Prineville, when the accident happened. A fellow worker lowered him to the ground in a sling but efforts to revive him failed.

Truman Won't Be Demo Delegate To Convention

ST. LOUIS — Former President Truman said Monday he would not be a delegate to the Democratic National Convention this year.

Truman, here briefly between trains on his way home to Independence from the East, told newsmen he thought someone else should have the honor. But he added:

"I'm going to be there anyway so what's the difference."

General Services Administrator Resigns Position

WASHINGTON — Edmund F. Mansure, under fire in Congress in connection with the 43-million-dollar expansion of a government nickel plant, resigned Monday as General Services administrator.

"Due to personal obligations," he wrote President Eisenhower, "I must return to private life."

The President made the resignation effective "on or about Feb. 10" and appointed Franklin G. Floete acting head.

City Employee Files For Portland Mayor

PORTLAND — George C. McAdams, an employee of the city Public Works Department, Monday filed as a candidate for mayor of Portland.

Mayor Fred L. Peterson has said he expects to be a candidate for re-election and Commissioner Ormond R. Bean announced some time ago that he intends to file for the office.

Priest, Woman Found Dead of Asphyxiation

HERNANDO, Miss. — A 45-year-old priest and a woman about the same age died in a motel bed Monday, victims of accidental asphyxiation.

The dead man was identified by the Roman Catholic diocese chancery office in Springfield, Ill., as the Rev. Thomas Connolly, pastor of St. Stanislaus Church in Macon, Ill., and the mission of St. Francis de Sales at Moweaqua, Ill.

The woman was identified here by DeSota County Sheriff W. A. White as Mrs. Edward Minor of Springfield, Ill.

White had identified the priest only as Thomas Connolly of Macon, Ill.

In Nightclothes
White said a motel attendant found the bodies, clad in nightclothes, in bed about noon. He said Coroner J. E. Gore ruled death accidental and due to gas escaping from a heater in the closed room.

He said the motel reported they checked in about 11 p. m. Sunday night and registered as "The Connollys". Motel employees opened the room about noon when they failed to respond to a knock at the door.

Inspection Due
White said he was unable to say why they had come to Hernando or where they were headed. He said he planned to inspect their luggage Tuesday.

In Springfield, Ill., the Sangamon County sheriff's office said the woman was Mrs. Ethel Minor, about 45, until recently a resident of Stonington, Ill. The office said she had been a widow about a year and is survived by a 22-year-old daughter who is in a convent preparing to become a nun.

Couple Flees Fire in Home

OREGON CITY — Mr. and Mrs. Gordon Holmberg escaped Monday night from a fire which destroyed their dwelling here.

Firemen said the blaze apparently started when an oil heater in the living room of the structure, which once was a store building, backfired.

Episcopal Church Bishop Coadjutor To Be Consecrated

PORTLAND — The Very Rev. James W. F. Carman, former dean of Trinity Cathedral at Phoenix, Ariz., will be consecrated Tuesday bishop coadjutor of the Episcopal Diocese of Oregon.

The Rt. Rev. Henry Knox Sherrill, presiding bishop of the Episcopal Church of the United States, will preside at a service at Trinity Church here.

Carman will aid Bishop Benjamin Dagwell in administrative work of the diocese and will succeed Dagwell upon his retirement in July, 1958.

Carman was a great American president and I felt that I would be honored to go through the rest of my life bearing that name," Truman said.

Name change petitions are considered prior to naturalization ceremonies, and Judge Irving R. Kaufman granted the Polish-born electrician's request.

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Heart Attack Kills Witness Driver Cited After Wreck

WASHINGTON — Randolph E. Paul, 65, a chief tax adviser to President Franklin D. Roosevelt, died of a heart attack at a Capitol Hill hearing Monday.

Paul slumped forward in his chair while answering a question put to him by Rep. Mills (D-Ark.) at a hearing of the Senate House Committee on the Economic Report. He was pronounced dead 20 minutes later.

When he collapsed, Paul had just finished reading a 31-page statement in which he set forth a detailed plan aimed at correcting tax inequities.

He was testifying as a rebuttal witness to Secretary of the Treasury Humphrey, who said last week that "our present estimates do not give any grounds for tax reduction." Paul agreed that this is no time to cut taxes but then laid down a program of cutting taxes in some areas and raising them in others.

Paul did not appear excited by the friendly questions of Mills which followed his prepared remarks. After about eight minutes of answering, Paul began this reply to a question:

"Yes, I can see that implication. . . ."

Then he heaved a deep sigh and slumped forward. His wife, who was in the hearing room, hurried to his side. Doctors were called and the room was cleared of spectators by acting Chairman Bolling (D-Mo.).

MIAMI BEACH, Fla. — The AFL-CIO Executive Committee Monday opened a seashore winter meeting with union leaders intent on building their combined labor movement into a more potent political force.

The AFL-CIO chiefs are going right ahead with plans to make the most of their combination of the former AFL and CIO into a single labor movement. They privately made it clear they want to achieve a maximum degree of consolidation ahead of next fall's presidential election.

George Meany, AFL-CIO president, told a news conference the 29-member policy-making executive council probably will decide during the 10-day session here at the Monte Carlo Hotel whether to schedule a convention late in the coming campaign.

Meany responded with a wink when asked whether politics would be the reason for such a special meeting. "Oh, no, none at all," he laughed.
