Demo Trio Raps Video Set Makers

WASHINGTON (AP) — A trio of Senate Democrats lit into radio advertisers and television set manufacturers Tuesday at a Senate Commerce Committee hearing.

Chairman Magnuson (D-Wash.) accused some radio advertisers of engaging in "false and fraudulent" practices by which, he said, "the public is bilked."

Sen. Monroney (D-Okla.) assailed TV manufacturers, claiming their practices in making TV sets indicate they have no "sense of public service at all."

Sen. Pastore (D-R.I.) joined in the free swinging criticism as the committee questioned members of the Federal Communications Commission (FCC) on their methods of dealing with radio and TV problems.

Much of the session was devoted to the question of something called "deinterference."

Some persons contend this is the only way to solve the problems brought about by the advent of UHF — ultra high frequency signals.

In the earlier days of television, there were only 12 channels, numbered from 2 to 13. These were VHF — very high frequency channels.

But since then, UHF has come into the picture with 70 additional channels. A number of UHF stations have gone broke, however, since the majority of TV sets are not equipped to receive UHF signals.

Cobbler Wins \$32,000 Sum On Quiz Show

NEW YORK (AP) — Cobbler Michael Della Rocca won \$32,000 on a television quiz show Tuesday night by showing easy familiarity with six operas from six different nations.

In what the master of ceremonies on "The \$64,000 Question" called "the most fantastic display of knowledge I ever saw in my life," the 54-year-old Italian shoemaker quickly supplied names of composers and characters in German, Russian, Irish, Czechoslovakian, French and American operas.

He then gave a hint that he would seek the help of another Italian shoemaker, who also won the \$32,000 prize on the same program, and might try next week for \$64,000.

R. Frank Tucker, Klamath County chamber manager, was elected to the post of secretary after Ken Reckard, 48, Springfield, died of a sudden heart attack shortly before being elected to the post.

Tuition Hiked by Portland College

PORTLAND (AP) — Lewis and Clark College announced Tuesday that tuition and student fees will go up about \$75 a year next September.

The student payment will be \$650 a year. President Morgan Odell said he said the increase will go into staff salaries. The college will increase starting salaries for instructors to \$3,800. Full professors will go up to \$6,500.

San Joaquin Water Not Solely U.S.'s

LOS ANGELES (AP) — A federal judge, in a decision that could affect federal irrigation projects across the nation, ruled Tuesday that the U. S. government has no sovereign title to water flowing from the Sierra Nevada to the San Joaquin River.

Judge Peirson M. Hall further ruled that water at the government's Friant Dam in Central California is illegally impounded. He held that the water rightfully belongs to owners of some 300,000 acres along or near the river.

Friant Dam is the key southern installation of the federally-developed Central Valley Project, the most extensive irrigation project ever built.

Attack Count Against Texas Man Dropped

A charge of rape against a Scio man was dismissed Tuesday by Marion County District Judge Edward O. Stadter Jr., who ordered the man bound over to the grand jury on an assault and battery count instead.

The action came in a preliminary hearing for Daniel Paul Parker, 26, recently arrived in the Willamette Valley from Texas, who was charged with assault on a Marion County housewife after an Aumsville dance ten days ago.

Judge Stadter ordered the rape case dismissed, stating he could see nothing in the testimony of the complaining witness and others to bear prosecution.

Parker was held in lieu of \$500 on the assault and battery charge.

Street Repair Fund Formed At Woodburn

WOODBURN — The City Council, in authorizing payment Tuesday for the new Southeast Sewer, held back \$500 for future street repairs.

Council action followed a meeting two weeks ago in which several property owners complained of un-repaired damage to streets and curbs. Contractors George W. Lind Construction Co. of Portland have been unable to do satisfactory street repair because of rain and cold weather during the winter, it was explained.

The council also adopted an ordinance authorizing public auction of abandoned and seized property. An existing ordinance covered only automobiles, and a backlog of other items, especially bicycles, was building up, it was explained.

The city engineer was authorized to prepare plans and specifications for street improvements in recently-annexed Johnson Addition.

The council also moved to request from the state a new population estimate as basis for allocation of state funds.

Portland Eyes \$6 Million Sewer Project

PORTLAND (AP) — A proposal for a five to six million dollar bond issue to rebuild part of Portland's sewer system was outlined Tuesday before a meeting of the Legislative Interim Committee on Local Government.

William A. Bowes, Portland commissioner of public works, said he was advancing the proposal because he didn't think "we can go back to the property owners who have already paid for the present sewer system."

Lee Sludd, mayor of Oswego, recommended that county planning commissions be given authority to zone certain areas for industrial development.

Darrel Jones, Clackamas County commissioner, asked modifications of the state law which he said permits a promoter to dedicate a cemetery by merely filing a map with the county clerk. He said approval of the county health department or planning and zoning commission should be required.

J. A. Hunt, Wasco County commissioner, urged legislation to simplify procedures for organizing drainage and sewer districts.

Young GOP Club Seeks to Add Members

Aims to increase membership five-fold were discussed by Marion County Young Republicans in a meeting Tuesday in Senator Hotel.

Bob Carey, membership chairman, was named director of the drive to raise membership from 120 to 600 by March 8. Higher membership is needed for increasing activity and raising funds for political campaigns this summer, President Walter Foster explained. Recruiting is to be done largely by personal contact by members of Carey's committee, he said.

The club will elect officers at its next monthly meeting 8 p.m. March 13 in Senator Hotel. Some 40 members of the club state executive board will have their regular monthly meeting Sunday in Salem.

Big 3 Plan Middle East Talks Today

WASHINGTON (AP) — The United States, Britain and France begin a joint search Wednesday for a way to keep peace in the Middle East.

The meeting will bring together Deputy Undersecretary of State Robert Murphy, who will be chairman, and Ambassadors Roger Makins of Britain and Maurice Couve de Murville of France.

Ambassador Abba Eban of Israel and Syria's Ambassador Farid Zeiniddine, who generally acts as spokesman for the Arab embassies, are expected to keep their viewpoints carefully before this working committee.

For Israel the No. 1 question was put, unanswered, on a shelf. This is whether the United States will approve Israel's two month old request that the United States sell some 50 million dollars in defensive weapons to Israel to counter Egypt's purchase of 80 million dollars in Soviet bloc weapons.

Ike Message Postponed; Due Today

WASHINGTON (AP) — The White House announced Tuesday that President Eisenhower's twice delayed message on revision of the immigration and nationality laws will go to Congress Wednesday.

The message reportedly will call for some radical changes, and a revision of the present immigration quota system.

The document first was scheduled to go to Congress Monday, then the time table was changed to call for its submission Tuesday. Late Tuesday, delivery was put off indefinitely, then it was rescheduled for delivery Wednesday.
