Mrs. O. Williams will again be general show chairman. Primroses have shared the fate of most flowers in the recent freeze but hope is high that there will be sufficient comeback to warrant a good display.

The response of the primrose to warmth, sunshine and a little care is traditional. Some members reported as many as five plants in bloom, despite the weather's frosty reception.

Loretta Dehler was appointed to take care of the show, on Wednesday.

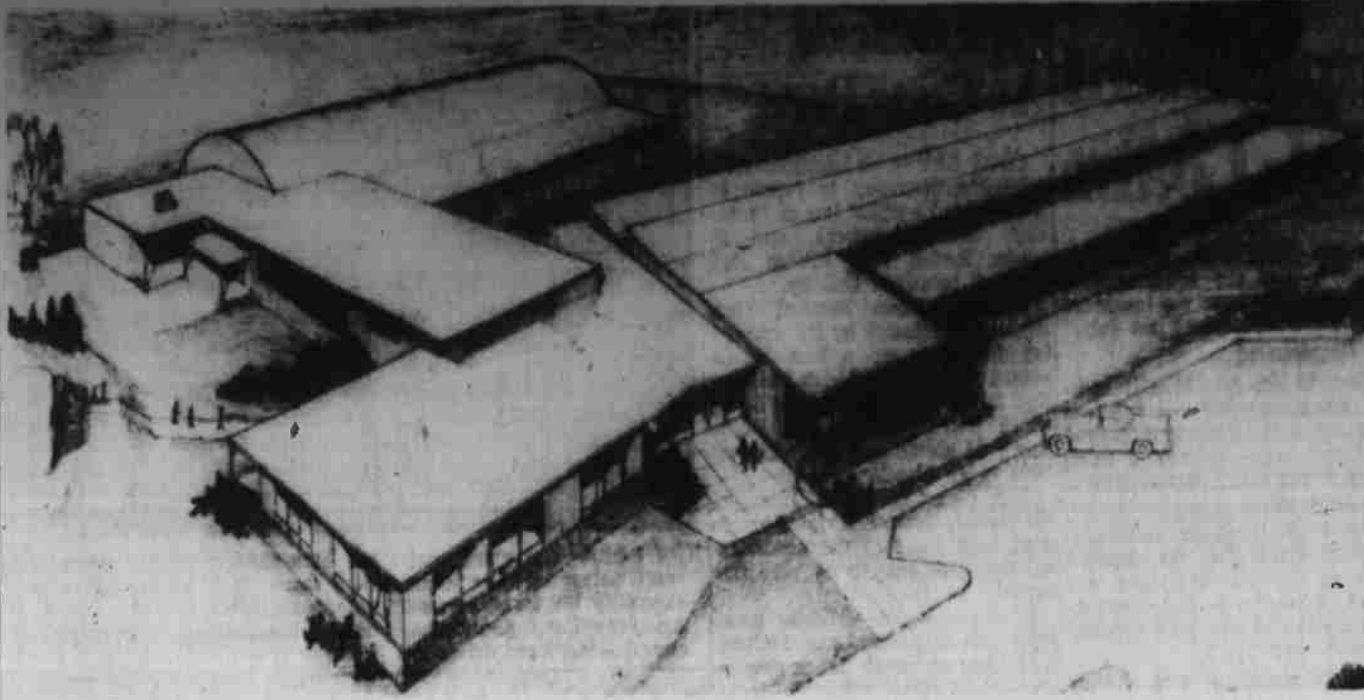

\$300,000 School Will Accommodate 270 Pupils

SILVERTON — Construction of Silverton's new junior high school may start as early as April 1, School Supt. Howard Balderstone said Thursday. Bids will be called after the school board approves plans for the building. The board will inspect the plans at its Feb. 22 meeting.

Balderstone said the new building might be ready for occupancy after Christmas vacation next winter.

The school will be constructed on a portion of DeGuire's pasture in East Silverton, about one-half mile from the present junior high. It will house pupils in the sixth, seventh and eighth grades and has room for 270.

Situated on an extensive slope, the school has three wings. The classroom wing will follow the land contour along Church Street. Other wings will house administration offices and a cafeteria-gymnasium.

30,000 Square Feet
Embracing 30,000 square feet of floor space, the new school also will contain eight classrooms, a library with workroom and storage, a lobby and display area, a combination arts and crafts-home economics room; a kitchen unit with serving corridor, a faculty
