Petitions to place the name of President Eisenhower on the presidential preference ballot are now in circulation throughout the state, it was reported Sunday at a meeting of the executive board of the Oregon Young Republicans Federation in Salem.

Members of the federations are playing a prominent role in circulation of the petitions. Response reportedly has been even more gratifying than originally anticipated.

The Republican College League Executive Board, including young Republicans at various Oregon colleges and universities, took part in the Sunday meeting held at the Senator Hotel. The league proposes to organize Young Republican Clubs in all schools which now have no such representation.

Plans for participation in the national Republican convention in San Francisco in August were discussed and several members of the Federation said they expected to attend either in the role of delegates or spectators.

The Executive Board announced that on April 13 to 15, inclusive, a policy meeting would be held at Eugene to which all Republican candidates will be asked to appear. Several important resolutions will be adopted at the policy meeting, Executive Board members said.

A resolution memorializing the late Gov. Paul L. Patterson was approved by the Federation directors.

Limited to nine minutes on the air, the television show caught close-ups of only a fraction of the participants in the parade that ended Forest Grove's portion of the program.

But the cameras continued to grind and the long entourage of old autos, horse-drawn vehicles, floats and smoke-belching fire engines swept through town as the crowd continued to cheer and throw confetti.

No Announcement
Everyone thought the show was still on the air and there was never an announcement to the contrary.

Nerve-center for the Forest Grove show was a mobile television transmitter that was parked beside the main intersection of the business district, focal point for the show.

A producer-director team from Hollywood staged the show, assisted by a crew of 15 cameramen and technicians from station KPTV, the NBC affiliate in Portland.

At one point, Mrs. Elsie Cook of Forest Grove conducted a conversation with Dave Garroway, master of ceremonies in New York. Like most dialog in the show, it had been rehearsed carefully.

Streets Blocked
Streets were barricaded for a block in each direction from the cameras and there were no unauthorized persons in that area who were not attired in appropriate costumes. Everyone properly dressed was welcome to be in the street scenes and estimates were that nearly 500 participated.

Four cameras recorded the entire show from various vantage points and the director, from the control truck, selected the picture that was used.

From Forest Grove, the picture was micro-waved to Portland, from where it traveled by cable to Los Angeles and on to New York. From there it was transmitted to over 100 television stations in North America.

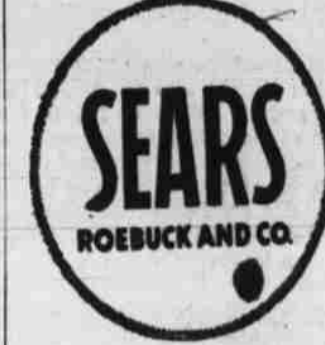
Death Claims Mrs. Williams
