 Trying to "solve our problems in an atmosphere of fear and distrust" is a major factor in failure to find a solution, according to Dr. James Millar, who spoke before the Salem A.A.U.W. branch meeting on Saturday at the Marion hotel.
 Dr. Millar, in his discussion of "Vitamins for Our Democracy" at the luncheon meeting, pointed out that intelligence, imagination, initiative and industry, and integrity are needed for present day realization of a satisfactory way of life in our democracy. We need to "profit by experience . . . and to see the ultimate outcome of a present course of action" in meeting each crisis as it comes, he contended.
 Practicing self-control as well as vicariously understanding both sides of a problem will do much to further the aims of democratic understanding, he added. Dr. Millar stressed the importance of trust and of confidence in possible success, both within the family and in other relationships, local, national and international.
