

County Welfare Unit's Tentative Budget Asks Funds Hiked 7 Per Cent

A tentative welfare budget representing a 7 per cent increase over this year's budget has been adopted by the Marion County Welfare Commission for the fiscal year 1956-57, according to figures released by Kenneth Peterson, welfare director.

Next year's estimate of \$1,810,029 will now be submitted for review by the state welfare commission.

Senators Block Speedy Action On Farm Laws

WASHINGTON (AP)—Efforts to speed action on farm legislation were blocked Tuesday by senators who said they wanted more time to debate it.

Senate leaders lost an effort to choke off debate and begin voting next Wednesday. They planned to renew this move Wednesday.

Also Tuesday, Republican Senate leader Knowland of California told newsmen President Eisenhower is unwilling to compromise on the issue of rigid vs. flexible price controls.

"The President made it very clear that he has not changed his position," Knowland said after Republican congressional leaders visited the White House.

That sounded as though there could be a veto if the Senate and House insist on attaching a restoration of rigid supports to the soil bank proposal. This is proposed in the pending Senate bill.

Secretary of Agriculture Benson continued his crusade against rigid supports in testimony before the Senate-House Economic Committee.

He pleaded with Congress to cut out sections providing rigid mandatory supports and other features opposed by the administration but inserted in the soil bank bill by the Senate Agriculture Committee.

Timberline Lodge Snow Sets Record

The season's snowfall at Timberline lodge has been the heaviest since the Oregon highway commission began keeping records six years ago.

The commission said the snow was 296 inches deep Tuesday. The previous record depth of the past six years was 244 inches in 1952 and 1949.

Meanwhile snow depths in some of the passes were: Government Camp, 141 inches; Santiam Pass, 170; Willamette Pass, 151; Siskiyou Summit, 35; Green Springs Summit, 50; Meacham, 43; Austin, 57; Ochoco Summit, 16; Sunset Summit, 24.

3rd District Loses 2 GOP Candidates, But Adds Another

PORTLAND (AP)—Two prospective candidates withdrew and a new one appeared Tuesday for the Republican nomination as third district congressman.

Claude M. Snow, Portland insurance firm operator, and Tom B. Purcell, Gresham publisher, announced they were not going to seek the Republican nomination after all. Snow earlier had declared his candidacy, and Purcell had said he was thinking about it.

The new prospect is Phillip J. Roth, Portland attorney and former state representative, who said he was available.

No other Republican has announced.

The only Democratic candidate on the scene is the incumbent, Rep. Edith Green.

Government Of Austria Collapses

VIENNA, Austria (AP)—The 2-party coalition government which won Austria its independence from 4-power occupation collapsed Tuesday. The leaders disagreed over domestic policies, chiefly nationalization of industries.

New parliamentary elections were called for May 13 in the hope that one of the parties—the conservative People's Party or the Socialists—would win at least a margin of public support which would guide another coalition government. Neither party is expected to win an outright majority.

The breakup of the 10-year-old coalition, one of Europe's stabiliest governments, was caused mainly by disagreement over the future of the little country's rich oilfields and former German property in Austria. German of both was turned over to the government by the Russians under last year's independence treaty. Since then the partners have failed to agree on what to do with the properties.

Chancellor Julius Raab's conservatives want private capital to share in the oil fields. The Socialists want them wholly nationalized.

Detroit Dam Repair Job Bids Opened

PORTLAND (AP)—Inland Construction Co., Milwaukee, with a bid more than \$100,000 under the government estimate, was low of five bidders Tuesday for a Detroit Dam repair job.

Inland's bid was \$78,700. The government estimate on the project for repair of the lower re-regulating outlets and construction of steel liners for these outlets was \$122,950.

Army Engineers said the lower concrete outlets of the Santiam River dam have not been able to withstand jet action of the high head of water from the outlet gates. The proposed steel liners will extend 50 to 60 feet below the gates.

State Building Repair to Wait

No action will be taken toward making permanent repairs to the first floor of the state office building here, in which cracks recently appeared, until after the 1957 Legislature, Secretary Earl T. Newberry said Tuesday.

When the cracks were discovered it was necessary for the State Civil Defense Agency to vacate a part of the office building basement.

Temporary repairs, assuring the safety of the building, have been completed. Some estimates placed the cost of permanent repairs as high as \$70,000.

The 1957 Legislature will be asked to approve an appropriation covering the cost of permanent repairs.

Campaign to Seek Meat Consumption

WASHINGTON (AP)—The National Association of Food Chains is planning "three late spring merchandising campaigns to boost consumption of pork, beef and poultry."

The association says the campaigns were requested by livestock producer and farm organizations because of "the tremendous rate of meat production which is expected to continue during early 1956."

Webb 'Cannot Quit Race' for 'Emmy' Award

HOLLYWOOD (AP)—The Television Academy, with bruised feelings, informed Jack Webb Tuesday that he cannot withdraw from a nomination for an "Emmy" award.

Furthermore, the Sgt. Friday of "Dragnet" nominated himself for the possible award he now doesn't want, said Don De Fore, president of the Academy of Television Arts and Sciences.

Webb notified the academy Monday night that he was withdrawing from the nomination in the category for best director of a TV film series and would withdraw "Dragnet" from its category of best action or adventure series, except that he can't because it is owned by a corporation. He claimed "the categories are fouled up."

De Fore said a Hollywood committee headed by Johnny Mercer and a New York committee headed by Max Liebman drew up a list of shows and personalities as possibilities for "Emmy" awards. The committees and the academy membership of 2,000 sent out 20,000 preliminary ballots to the industry.

It was in this early stage, De Fore said, that Webb signed his own entry in the director category. Now the nominations have been made and the final ballots were mailed last Saturday for the awards, to be announced March 17.

Plans were moving ahead Tuesday for a nationwide prayer day March 28 in support of the Montgomery, Ala., Negro bus boycott while a calm Negro woman prepared to continue her fight for the right to study at the all-white University of Alabama.

The case of Autherine Lucy, 26-year-old former school teacher, was set for a hearing at Birmingham, Ala., Wednesday.

At stake was whether she should be permitted to return to the University's Tuscaloosa campus, where her presence sparked a series of violent riots early this month.

Miss Lucy was suspended Feb. 6 by the board of trustees after a mob objected violently to her presence at the school.
