Death Takes Ex-Polk Co. Welfare Chief

PEDEE—Richard Van Den Bosch, former Polk County welfare commission chairman and lumberman, died Sunday at the age of 87.

Death came at a Dallas hospital, where he was taken shortly after he was unexpectedly stricken Saturday night.

He operated lumber mills in Washington and at Falls City and Peede before he retired nearly a dozen years ago. He served for seven years as head of the Polk welfare commission, retiring from that position four years ago.

He was born Nov. 8, 1889, at Seeland, Mich. He was married in 1899 at Aberdeen, Wash., to Wilda Wentworth, who survives. They came to Peede more than 30 years ago from Falls City. He was a member of the Masonic lodge and Order of Eastern Star of Falls City.

Survivors, in addition to the widow, include sons, Richard of Dallas and Wentworth of Tigard; four brothers in Michigan, five grandchildren and two great-grandchildren.

Funeral services will be held Wednesday at 2 p.m. at the Bolman Chapel in Dallas with the Rev. Fremont Paul officiating. Graveside Masonic services will be held at Fir Crest Cemetery at Monmouth.

Mrs. Swain, 88, Succumbs

Chamber Told Oregon College Enrollment Will Nearly Triple

Enrollment in colleges and universities in Oregon will increase at 3½ times the national rate in the next 15 years, almost tripling by 1970, Dr. Morgan S. Odell, president of Lewis & Clark College, told the Salem Chamber of Commerce Monday.

"These western states of ours, due to their growth, will be in the lead in trying to provide this tremendous increase in education," he said.

"But if we follow present practices in this state it seems to me the quality of education will be poorer," he added.

Four Suggestions

He listed four suggestions to preserve quality of education in the face of increasing enrollment, emphasizing that he was speaking for himself and not for any organization with which he is associated.

The first two directly concern independent colleges such as his own school in Portland, Willamette University in Salem and Linfield College in McMinnville.

One is increasing endowments and the other is gifts from business corporations, a recent nationwide development prompted, Odell said, by growing awareness that large businesses recruit many graduates from independent colleges.

'Screening' Possible

"Screening" of high school graduates as in California, where a B average in high school or a C average in a state or junior college is required for college entrance, may become necessary in Oregon as college enrollment grows, Odell said.

And the fourth step would be establishment of junior colleges. These should be in areas where they will not compete with independent colleges for local students, Odell said.

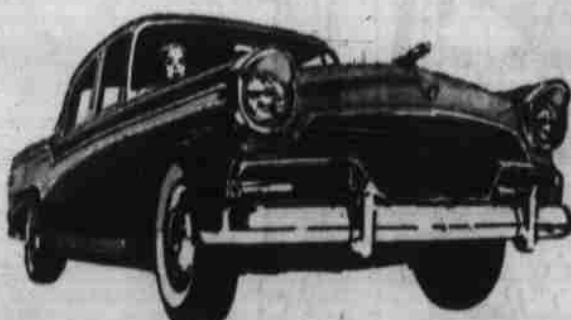

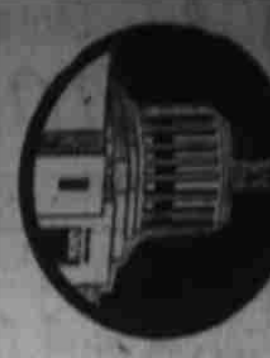
