At Bush House
Collection of Oregon Artists On Exhibit

First showing from a private Portland collection of works by Oregon artists opened at Salem Art museum (Bush house) Monday. Thirty-six artists are represented by oils, drawings, watercolors, prints, a monprint and a collage. All except the late C. S. Price are living. The exhibition continues through April 8.

This collection was started in 1949 by Louise Aaron Buhmann and with exception of the 1906 Price drawings have been executed since that time. Here one might see a cross section of Oregon art. While most of the artists are established professionals, included in this collection are some frank "Sunday" painters such as Stewart Holbrook, the author, and E. B. MacNaughton, banker and former newspaper publisher and Reed College president.

Among the pictures exhibited are a number which have been exhibited previously — at Portland Art museum, Colorado Springs Fine Arts center, Seattle Art museum, Reed college, Harvey Welch's in Portland, Oregon Journal and the former Kharouba gallery in Portland. Some came to the collection direct from the artists' studios.

Included is a plaster cast of the head of the collector, Mrs. Max W. Buhmann, executed by her husband. In public life she is Louise Aaron, art editor of the Oregon Journal.

The public is invited to view this collection daily, except Mondays, at the Bush House.

After completion of her degree work at Willamette, Miss Stout plans to teach vocal music in the public schools.

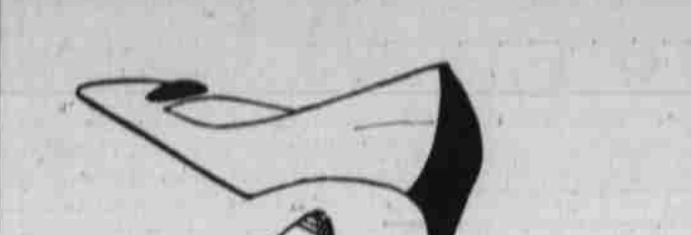
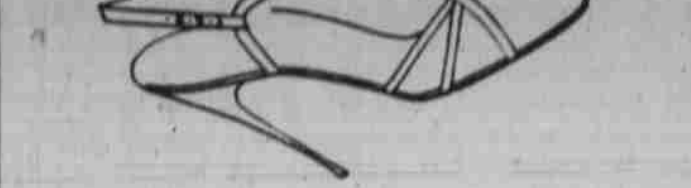
