

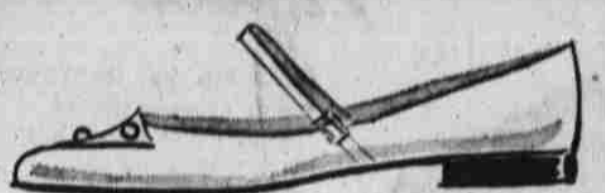

ROME (U)—Great Julius Caesar received another unkind cut Thursday — the City of Rome refused to celebrate this Ides of March as the 2,000th anniversary of his death.  
Some scholars argue this is only the 1,999th anniversary of the day Brutus and the conspirators plunged their daggers into Caesar at the foot of Pompey's statue.  
An official at Rome's City Hall conceded "this is the bimillenary" but said the city isn't celebrating. "We celebrate the deaths of saints, not of pagans," he explained.

However, a green wreath did decorate the brow of a bronze statue of the old emperor which gasses across Rome's broad Via Dei Fori Imperiali (Street of the Imperial Forum). At its feet was bouquet of red and white carnations.  
The municipal spokesman said the Neo-Fascist Mai Party (Italian Social Movement) must have put them there.  
"They asked the mayor for an official celebration, but he refused," the spokesman said.  
Mayor Salvatore Rebecchini is a staunch Christian Democrat.  
The only Rome newspaper that mentioned the anniversary was the Mai organ, Il Secolo. It protested Italy's neglect of the anniversary.  
Behind Caesar's statue, ruins of a forum erected to his honor long ago were empty today. It was too cold for sightseers.  
One Italian passerby, reminded of the date, commented: "I'll bet it wasn't this cold then."

**Cat Lovers Blast Critic**  
NEW YORK (U)—The American Feline Society is clawing back at book critic Gilbert Highet, who had harsh things to say about cats on his radio program.  
Highet, over station WQXR Tuesday night, contended that cats are ill-tempered and don't deserve sentimental ranking in literature. The feline agency yesterday asked for equal radio time to defend its favorite pets.  
WQXR has not decided what to do about the request.

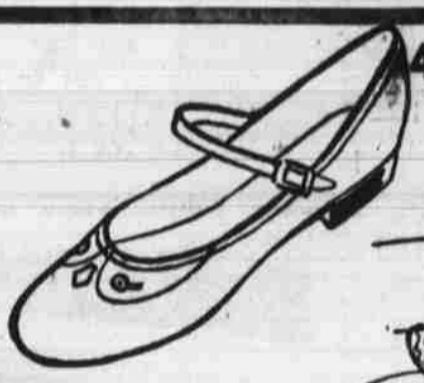

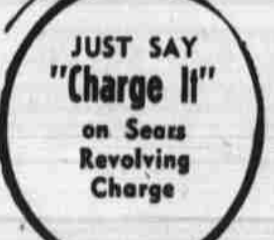
