### At Madison Square Garden . . . Rain Cancels NIT Opens 19th Stand Today With Four Tilts

NEW YORK (AP)—The oldest of the post-season basketball tournaments—the National Invitation—opens its 19th stand in Madison Square Garden Saturday with a familiar cast. The NIT, conceived by a group of New York basketball writers, originated in 1938, when the abolition of the center jump after each goal was a recent memory and when only a "racehorse" team could score 60 points in a game. It was a tremendous success from the start, when 14,497 spectators saw Temple beat Colorado 60-36 in the final.

Four games among unseeded teams open the NIT program Saturday. The winners meet the four seeded teams Monday and Tuesday, with the semifinals Thursday and the finals the following Saturday. For the first time, the finals will be played in the afternoon so they can be televised nationally. Dukes, Aggies on TV After an opening game between Lafayette and St. Francis of Brook-lyn, defending champion Duquesne takes on Oklahoma A. and M. in a second afternoon contest. The Duquesne-Aggies game also will be televised nationally. Saturday night's doubleheader pits Seton Hall against Marquette and St. Louis against Xavier. The winners of the afternoon games will face Niagara and Louisville, respectively, on Monday night and the evening victors will play St. Joseph's and Dayton on Tuesday.

### Skating Star Denies Charge

PHILADELPHIA (AP)—Ronnie Robertson, 19-year-old Long Beach, Calif., figure skater, who is the No. 2 amateur in America and the world, denied Friday that he had ever demanded excessive expenses "or any kind of expenses for that matter" for exhibitions in Europe. The young star appeared at a hastily summoned news conference after he finished second to Olympic and World Champion Hayes Alan Jenkins in the school figure competition in the 1956 American championships. Denis Any Knowledge Robertson, flanked by his father, Albert, and his skating coach, Gus Lussi, of Lake Placid, N. Y., insisted he didn't know who brought charges against him or exactly what the charges are. "I certainly think it is unfair to keep these things secret," said Robertson's father. "And making this announcement on the eve of the competition does not help the lad's morale." The controversy erupted Thursday night when the U. S. Figure Skating Assn., sponsor of the current tourney, disclosed that a "representative of a foreign skating association" said young Robertson had demanded "excessive expenses in connection with exhibitions."

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
