

# Talbert Seeks Tennis Drills

### 'Spring Training' Needed by Netters

NEW YORK (AP) — Bill Talbert, slated to be renamed captain of the U. S. Davis Cup team this week, proposed Tuesday a month's "spring training" for America's depleted tennis forces.

"We should have something like the baseball teams in Florida," the printing executive said. "If I had my way — and it was humanly possible — I'd like to get the squad together for a month in May at some nice, quiet place like Greenbrier (in West Virginia).

"But there are problems. Sammy Giammalva is in college at the University of Texas. Barry McKay, another fine prospect, is at the University of Michigan. Ham Richardson is back home from England but he is contemplating marriage.

Present Setup Disturbed

"I think it's just too much to throw these kids together a week before an important match and say, 'okay, you're it.' It's bad for the esprit de corps. It accomplishes nothing."

Talbert has been Davis Cup captain the last three years, scoring a surprise victory in 1954, but recently there have been reports that he might be replaced. An informal poll of the tennis brass, however, indicates that Talbert's job is safe.

IF YOU Toss AN UNHOOKED BAIT ADRIFT, YOU'LL SEE THE DIFFERENCE BETWEEN IT AND ONE RESTRAINED ON A TAUT LINE. YOU CAN TAKE FISH OCCASIONALLY ON BAITS PLAYED AGAINST THE CURRENT, BUT A FREE-DRIFTING BAIT IS BEST. CAST UPSTREAM SO A SINKERLESS BAIT DRIFTS FREELY, NEAR BOTTOM WHEN IT REACHES DESIRED AREA DOWNSTREAM. RETRIEVE SLACK LINE UNTIL DRIFT PASSES YOU, THEN QUICKLY PULL SLACK AS NEEDED UNTIL DRIFT IS FINISHED. THEN FLIP BAIT UPSTREAM TO REPEAT. IN DEEP, SWIFT STREAMS, USE JUST ENOUGH SINKER TO WORK.

# Judge Blasts NFL Contract

TORONTO (AP) — United States professional football contracts Tuesday were compared to 19th-century slavery conditions by the chief justice of the Supreme Court of Ontario.

Chief Justice J.C. McRuer made the remark while hearing a \$10,000 breach-of-contract suit by the Detroit Lions of the National Football League against quarterback Tom Dublinski of the Big Four Football League's Toronto Argonauts.

"It is the element of trading in human services that is bothering me," he said. "I thought that was done away with in 1863."

(President Abraham Lincoln announced the freedom of the slaves in the United States Jan. 1, 1863).

He referred to a section of Dublinski's 1954 contract with the Lions which states the team may assign the services of a player to another club in the NFL.

The state-wide festival of sports and other recreational activities will aid in the maintenance and conservation of health and provide wholesome fun and recreation so essential to the general welfare of the public, Governor Smith said. Such a program merits citizen support and cooperation, he added.

The sports festival, fourth annual national event of its kind, is designed to stress the value of well-conducted sports and recreational activities and to encourage widespread interest and support in sound programs of recreation and physical education.

This committee will develop plans for a state-wide festival observance and will work with mayors and other civic leaders throughout the state in mapping sports festival events suitable to each individual community.

# Rams Ink Two Top Flankers

LOS ANGELES (Special) — The Los Angeles Rams, long known for their spectacular offensive ends, this week added a pair of promising rookie flankers to their corps of pass receivers.

Signing Ram contracts for their first season with Los Angeles were Leon Clarke, Southern California, obtained in the second round of the NFL draft from Detroit by previous trade, and Jim Carmichael, University of California, the Rams' fourth draft round selection. Both men are slated for offensive end duties.

The addition of Carmichael and Clarke to the Ram squad provides Coach Sid Gillman with one of the league's strongest group of offensive ends including Elroy Hirsch, Bob Boyd, Tom Fears, Bob Carey, Willie Roberts and Woodley Lewis.

**Clarke Big, Fast**  
Clarke, a 220 pounder who stands 6-4, is blessed with great speed as attested to by his third place finish last June in the NCAA 220 lb hurdles. His best time for the event is :23.3s. The Trojan speedster attended Venice High School near Los Angeles and earned three varsity football letters at Southern California.

Also a "local boy," Carmichael hails from nearby Inglewood High School. He played at El Camino Junior College before transferring to California. He was an outstanding receiver for the Bears, placing third among the nation's receivers in 1954 and capturing the 1955 Cal team. Jim, who is the brother of Green Bay's Al Carmichael, is 6-2 1/2 and weighs 215.

# Iowa Faces Job In Temple Twins

PHILADELPHIA (AP) — The Midwest is in for a real dose of Eastern style basketball when Temple University's "fast break" quintet meets Iowa at Evanston, Ill., Thursday night in the semi-final round of the national collegiate championship.

It is doubtful if fans in that area have seen the likes of Temple's twin terrors, Hal Lear and Guy Rodgers. These two break down court like a couple of fire engines headed for a blaze. And when they get the two on one situation, it's an automatic basket.

Co-Capt. Lear and Rodgers operate in the front of a 2-1-2 zone defense. They're both as quick as cats and their ball stealing antics have been a strong factor in Temple's 26-3 record. Both can hit from outside and despite the fact they're small as basketball players go today, can rebound with opponents three and four inches taller.

Depends on Twins  
Coach Harry Litwack makes no secret of the fact he is counting on Lear, an honorable mention All-America who has scored 665 points — a 22.9 average — this year, and Rodgers, a 531 point scorer and a brilliant floor man. Temple will rise or fall with King Lear and Gifted Guy.

Lear scored 40 points against Connecticut and dumped in the two fouls which topped Canisius in the Eastern regional playoff games.

**Temple Big Men**  
The big men on the Temple team are Freddy Cohen, 6-6, lops in rebounds with 295, an average of 10.2 a game; Jay Norman, 6-4, with 260 rebounds, an average of nine, and Tink Van Patton, 6-8, who hasn't played much in recent weeks.

Litwack disclosed that Co-Capt. Hal (Hotsy) Reinfield, who has started all 29 games this year, wrenched his back against Canisius Saturday night while rebounding. The coach feared the 24-year-old senior would be unable to face Iowa, but x-rays showed no serious injury. Physicians at Temple Hospital said they treated Reinfield for muscle spasm and that he probably will be available for action Thursday night.

# Eastern Hoop Team Complete

NEW YORK (AP) — The Eastern squad for the annual East-West college all-star basketball game at Madison Square Garden March 31 was completed Tuesday with the addition of a towering University of Kentucky center and a star North Carolina State guard.

The two are members of the squad which will compete in the Olympic trials next month at Kansas City.
