

India's Nehru to Visit Eisenhower In July, to Review World Problems

WASHINGTON (AP)—Indian Prime Minister Nehru plans to visit President Eisenhower here in July, it was announced Tuesday. The two leaders are expected to debate a wide range of world issues—from United Nations membership for Red China to U. S. foreign aid.

Diplomatic officials said the United States hopes to give Nehru a better understanding of its policies, and to impress him with this country's peaceful aims, during the four or five day meeting. This apparently is one of the major reasons why American officials were anxious to arrange a meeting between the Indian Prime Minister and the President. They felt Nehru would take home a conviction of evident sincerity on the part of the president when he talks about the importance of obtaining world peace. They hoped this would make a strong impression on Nehru.

Tunisia Inks Independence Agreement

PARIS (AP)—France and Tunisia Tuesday signed a new agreement which recognizes the former French protectorate's independence and opens the way for talks which will keep it closely allied to France.

The proclamation of independence, which must be approved by the French parliament, was signed by Tunisian Premier Tahar Ben Ammar and French foreign minister Christian Pineau in the gilded clock salon of the French foreign ministry.

It ended six years of intermittent talks, which several times broke down in bloodshed. It left long and still difficult negotiations ahead before Frenchmen and Tunisians can define just what the relationship of their two countries is to be.

Both sides were eager to see the agreement quickly signed.

Oyster Bed Protection Promised

PORTLAND (AP)—The Oregon Fish Commission assured an oyster grower Tuesday that the Yaquina Bay oyster beds will be protected when the Georgia-Pacific Plywood Co. builds its proposed million-dollar plant near Toledo.

Commissioners said the commission would not approve the company's plans unless the company adopts measures to dispose of waste without endangering oyster beds or runs of steelhead and salmon.

Some officials said a Nehru visit to Eisenhower would do more than anything else to dramatize the basic American policy of respecting the independence and seeking the welfare of nations which reject anti-communist military alliances and insist on "neutrality" in the cold war.

That Nehru rejects such alliances was emphasized again today when, in a report to the Indian parliament on his talks with western foreign ministers, he denounced the Middle Eastern Baghdad pact, which the United States

Graham said some members of congress and other American officials have climbed into "their Cadillac" and driven away to hotels, upon arrival in India, without a display of friendliness. He added, however, that Vice President Nixon displayed a great deal of warmth when he arrived on his visit.

Graham said Communist Party Boss Nikita Khrushchev used the "Indian sign of welcome" in India and went around kissing babies "all over the place and hugging the women."

Graham said this made a great impression.

Solon Warns Of A-Plants Near Cities

WASHINGTON (AP)—Sen. Weller (R., Idaho), said Tuesday construction of atomic power plants near large cities would constitute an unwarranted hazard to many people.

Isolated areas in the west offer suitable sites for atomic plants, Weller said in a senate speech, "and yet the atomic energy commission (AEC) has entered into agreements to build large power reactors adjacent to densely populated areas."

"We all favor the vigorous development of an atomic power program, but in the absence of real necessity there is at the present time absolutely no justification for taking the risks involved in the present program."

The senator said atomic power plants could be built on the AEC's 400,000-acre reactor area in Idaho, or elsewhere in the west where there would be no danger to large populations.

Responsible officials, he said have described "the possible hazards from peaceful uses of atomic energy as ranging from minor to catastrophic."

As to a proposed atomic reactor at Shippingport, Pa., he declared: "Anyone but a congenial idiot knows that if you want atomic power even to be competitive, the last place in the world to build a reactor would be at Shippingport, sitting on top of a coal field in a region that has more coal, oil and natural gas per capita than almost any area in the United States or for that matter in the world."

He said he believed any "intelligent citizen" at Shippingport, which is near Pittsburgh, could obtain a court injunction to "prevent the construction of what might be a public hazard."

Balloon to Probe Upper Atmosphere

IOWA CITY, Iowa (AP)—Scientists at the State University of Iowa launched "Skyhook" Balloon No. 2 Tuesday in their study of the upper atmosphere.

The big balloon carried a six-foot gondola packed with 185 pounds of instruments for measuring the abundance of heavy elements in the upper one per cent of the earth's atmosphere.

The balloon was expected to move eastward at an altitude of 22 miles. A timing mechanism is set to discharge the parachute-equipped gondola at about 4:30 p.m. EST.

The instruments were expected to float to earth in western New York state, perhaps in the same general area where Skyhook No. 1 discharged its instrument cargo a week ago.

Instruments from No. 1 have not yet been recovered. Snow has hampered the search.

Oregon Farmers Plan to Plant More Acreages

PORTLAND (AP)—Oregon farmers intend to plant more acreages this year, the federal Department of Agriculture reported Tuesday.


The biggest increase will be in spring wheat, followed by oats and barley.

Sugar beet acreage also will be up, but field corn will be about the same and potato acreage will be smaller.

The agency noted that some of the spring seeding increase is really only a re-seeding of fall crops which froze in the severe winter in Western Oregon.
