SAN FRANCISCO (AP)—The vice chairman of Sen. Estes Kefauver's national campaign declared Tuesday night that his "great victory in the Minnesota primary is an astounding political phenomenon."
Mrs. Clara Shipper, who also is a Democratic national committee woman, said that "Senator Kefauver's victory is another demonstration of what has been said so often, that 'no one is for Kefauver but the voters.'"
She added that "coming on the heels of his smashing win last week in New Hampshire, the Kefauver vote in Minnesota shows that the Senator's strength is national, not sectional, and we are more than ever convinced that he is going to be the next President of the United States."

C. L. Newsom Leaves Salem Ward's Store

Mrs. Newsom said the family will remain in Salem until they sell their home at 1450 Narcissus Dr. Burk said his family will remain in Sacramento, Calif., until accommodations are found in Salem.

Girl, 7, Suffers 25 Heart Attacks

NEW ALBANY, Ind. (AP)—Seven-year-old Sheila Whitehead is back in the hospital again, suffering from her 25th heart attack.
The little blonde-blue eyed girl's heart is too big for her body, doctors say, and they have advised the girl's mother, Mrs. Hazel Whitehead, an operation may be fatal.
Sheila suffered two attacks Monday after her temperature suddenly rose to 106.
So back she went to the hospital, where she was released last year before Christmas, and the familiar oxygen mask.

Boys School To Establish Camp at Coast

The State Training School at Woodburn will establish a summer work camp on the coast this year in a pilot program that might lead to several such camps.
The State Board of Control voted Tuesday to establish such a camp at Fogarty Creek, north of Depoe Bay, where 25 boys will build a state park.
The boys will get \$1 a day each for their work.
At the same time, the board voted to move the school's permanent camp at Tillamook Head to Nehalem. The 25 boys at this camp also have been working on state parks.
James Lamb, superintendent of the school, recommended the changes, asserting they would benefit the school of over-crowding. Four attendants are assigned to each camp.
The school has 250 inmates, but Lamb says he can find jobs for only half of them on the main campus.
The board also asked the State Department of Education to survey the educational programs at the boys and girls training schools.

GOP 'Helps' Working Man

NEWPORT, Ore. (AP)—Gov. Elmo Smith campaigning for Republican nomination to the P.C. he succeeded in upon the death of Paul Patterson, Tuesday credited the GOP with helping the laboring man.
He told a meeting of 100 Republicans here that Oregon was first and never below second in the nation in the amount its working men received in pay. He said this was due to the "long term domination" of the GOP in the state.
He said Oregon's tax situation was one of the best.
"There is no pleasant way to pay taxes. But Oregon's situation is compared among the best in the nation and it can, and will be improved," he said.

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House Okehs Satellite Aid, Polio Funds

WASHINGTON (AP)—The House Tuesday tentatively approved a \$795,798,823 catch-all appropriation bill including new funds for polio vaccinations and financing of a man-made earth satellite.
The lawmakers shouted approval of the supplemental measure but deferred a formal roll-call vote on passage until Wednesday.
The action at least tacitly endorsed the recommendation of the House Appropriations Committee that the Tennessee Valley Authority (TVA) be allowed to use \$4 million dollars of its own funds to start building a new generating unit at the John Sevier steam plant.
No funds were included for the TVA. The committee, in rejecting a request for new cash, stipulated that the agency use its own revenues for the project. Republican committee members had opposed the stipulation on the ground that the law prohibits use of TVA revenues for new projects.
Since the committee's recommendation was embodied in a formal report and was not mentioned in the bill itself, opponents had no opportunity to offer an amendment expressing their position.
The bill provides \$27,800,000 to finance anti-polio programs administered by the states, 185 million for veterans' adjustment benefits, \$34,800,000 for payments to school districts whose population is swollen by federal activities, \$286,771,471 to finance pay raises voted last year by Congress, and 26 million for work in connection with the International Geophysical Year. This includes the "round-the-world satellite."
The total was \$40,134,100 less than President Eisenhower had requested.

Ike Prepares Message for GOP Voters

ASTORIA (AP)—President Eisenhower has prepared a message to open the Republican voters registration drive and Wendell Wyatt, Republican state chairman, will read it by telephone to a number of party meetings throughout the state next Monday night.
Some 34 central committee groups are expected to be connected up to receive Wyatt's call.

YUMA, Ariz. (AP)—Aldous Huxley, 61-year-old British novelist best known for his "Brave New World," has married an Italian concert violinist.
She is Laura Archera, 40.
The ceremony was performed here Monday. Huxley and his bride both said their homes were in Los Angeles.
The marriage was the second for Huxley.

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Reuther Accuses Benson Of Campaign of Hatred

DENVER (AP)—Walter P. Reuther, vice president of the AFL-CIO, Tuesday night accused Agriculture Secretary Ezra Taft Benson of conducting a "campaign of hatred" to turn "various groups of American people against each other."
Reuther called for rigid farm support prices and a "full investigation" of prices farmers have to pay.
Reuther, in a speech to the biennial convention of the National Farmers Union, also:
Denied that the AFL-CIO already has picked its candidates.
Denied that labor political activities are dictated by a handful of labor bosses.
Cannot Buy Equal Time
Charged that political parties cannot buy equal time on radio and television.
Declared the farm problem can't be solved through "fear of abundance."
Reuther told the more than 1,000 NFU delegates at the convention that labor supports farm programs because "we know that American farmers cannot solve their problems without us and we cannot solve our problems without them."
He said industrial workers have been affected directly by the slump in farm income, and pointed to 50,000 unemployed auto workers in the Detroit area as an example.
He described the Republican administration's approach to the farm problem as ineffectual. He said Benson's legislative program will not raise farm prices "significantly for at least four years."
"How long does Mr. Benson think farmers can wait," he asked. "How long does the administration think we industrial urban workers can wait for the farmer to get a fair break?"
He charged Benson, instead of seeking a solution, has tried to turn consumers against farmers; farmers against labor, and some farmers against other farmers.

Sen. Kefauver Congratulated By Stevenson

Chicago (AP)—Adlai E. Stevenson early Wednesday congratulated Sen. Kefauver (D-Tenn.) on his upset victory in Minnesota's Democratic presidential primary.
In a statement, the former Illinois governor said:
"I congratulate Sen. Kefauver. The unprecedented Democratic vote in Minnesota overcomes any personal disappointment I might feel. I am grateful to Gov. Freeman, Sen. Humphrey and my many loyal friends in Minnesota for their confidence and support."
"My plans are not changed. In other states, where I am entered in the primaries, I will continue to express my views honestly and vigorously."

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
