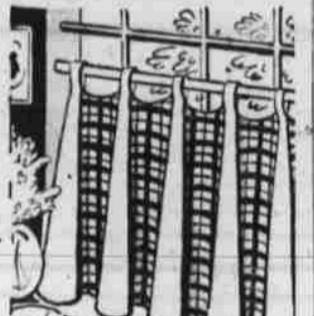

Smith will be speakers at the opening banquet on May 2.
