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Recheck Ups Silverton's Census Count

SILVERTON—Silverton's population is down only 52 from the 1920 count according to the rechecked count, R. E. Bergland, city manager said Thursday. Official count was set at 3,083 as it left Silverton.

Census takers completed the count by April 1, but the city was given time to re-check houses at which no one was found at home, or houses and apartments which might have been missed and which were listed with the city water department as Silverton residents. The first count showed the population down almost 150. The county census board will also review the figures.

In discussing the decline, a number of Silverton merchants said that they believed the population immediately outside the city limits was actually considerable larger as building has been brisk in most of the suburban areas surrounding Silverton.
