Baseball Battle At Barrick Field

EUGENE, Ore. (AP) — Sophomore Jack Henkel scattered seven hits as the University of Oregon defeated Portland State 8-6 in a pre-conference baseball game here Thursday. It was Oregon's seventh victory in nine games.

Oregon broke open the game with a five-run outburst in the fourth inning. The run-producing hits were a two-run single by Jim Piher, a double by Jerry Ross and another two-run single by Jim Pingree.

Dave Starbuck hit a bases-loaded double for Portland State in the seventh inning, scoring three runs.

Henkel was in trouble several times, mostly because of loose defense play behind him. He struck out seven, including the side in the Portland State ninth.

CINCINNATI (AP) — The New York Yankees used their home run power to offset the wobbly pitching of Mickey McDermott and Jim Konstanty as they edged out an 8-7 victory over the Cincinnati Redlegs Thursday.

Home runs boomed off the bats of Mickey Mantle, Elston Howard, Bill Skowron and Hank Bauer. It was Bauer's eighth inning blast over the left center wall which broke a 7-7 tie.

Mantle's wallop in the fourth sailed high over the right center-field wall beyond the 390 foot mark.

DENVER (AP) — The St. Louis Cardinals scored three runs in the 10th inning Thursday to defeat the Chicago White Sox 5-2 before 9,139 fans in Bears Stadium.

The Redbirds, winning their fourth successive game from the skidding Comiskey's, were two runs behind until the sixth inning when Stan Musial and Hank Sauer hit homers on successive pitches.

But the National League scored three in the 10th off Morrie Martin on a walk, a balk, a single and a double by Jackie Brandt.

Record Field Due for Event

Over 1,200 Athletes Groomed for Meet

UNIVERSITY OF OREGON, Eugene (Special) — A record field for the 19th annual running of the Hayward relays was assured here Thursday as 81 teams completed filing entries with Meet Director Ray Hendrickson for the two-day prep classic on Friday and Saturday.

More than 1,200 athletes will be on hand with about 700 of them representing the class B and C entries on Friday and the other 500 coming in Saturday for the class A and Metropolitan championships.

Three new champions are certain as 25 schools go after the class C title won last year by Mt. Shasta, Cal., 24 teams fight it out for the class B crown won by Central Union of Independence last spring and 13 teams battle for the class A championship which was won in 1955 by Marshfield.

Medford Back — Medford, which has won the Metropolitan title in each of the three years since the division was established, will be back again to face a field of 19 teams in the try for its fourth straight win. Marshfield has moved into the Metropolitan division and Central and Mt. Shasta are not entered this spring.

The time schedule for the meet sends the field event entrants into competition at 12:30 Friday with the runners to follow at 2 p.m. Saturday the field events will get under way at 10:30 a.m. with the running events scheduled for 12:30 p.m. After the final races in the prep meets, the Oregon varsity, the Oregon Frosh, the Portland Track and Field club and Lewis and Clark will have an open meet, set for 3 p.m.

Soggy Diamond Quiets Senators

The "Kings" didn't get to play the "Lobys" after all, in the first scheduled Salem Senators spring training intra-squad game at Napa Thursday. The rather heavy rains of Wednesday left the Napa Fairgrounds drill premises in soggy conditions — too much so for a ball game.

But Manager Hugh Luby reported via telephone to The Statesman that he was able to "give the boys a good, three-hour workout anyway, one that included lots of running, throwing and batting."

The weather seems to be on the improving side now at Napa, and the first intra-squad game is slated for today. Luby intends using Lefty Marion Coddell, Rookie right-hander Jim Leahy, pitcher-coach Ronnie King and rookie left-hander Jerry Cade in the game, two on each side.

Left-hander Ross Rugge, the pert southpaw purchased from Tri-City, and both rookies Gene Rodrick and Gary Espe will divide the pitching chores against the Yakima Bears Saturday afternoon in the Senators' first exhibition game at Napa.

Luby has heard nothing from pitcher Ad Satalich, purchased conditionally from the Portland Beavers, but expects to within the next few days. Bill (Red) Whitson, ace of the Solon staff last season, likely will check into camp sometime next week, according to the Generalissimo.

Rookie Andy George is slated to finish up his school work at Willamette University today, and is scheduled to leave for the Napa camp this afternoon. Bill Marriott, who serves in a downtown advisory capacity for the ball club will accompany George to Napa, and will be but one of a number of Salem residents to visit the training camp.

OCE Pastes Linfield, 9-6

OREGON COLLEGE OF EDUCATION, Monmouth (Special) — Oregon College of Education defeated the Linfield Wildcats here Thursday, 9-6. Big guns for OCE were centerfielder Wally Ramsey, with a three-run homer and a double in four trips to the plate; and Dean Sorenson, with two singles in two trips. Sorenson also scored two runs.

Linfield jumped to a four-run lead in the first inning after one out.
