Asphalt Foam Bins May Hold A-Garbage

DALLAS, Tex. (AP)—A cheap asphalt foam looks promising as the all-important radioactive garbage can for the atomic power age, two chemists said Thursday. Atomic power plants will produce tons a day of highly radioactive and dangerous liquid wastes. These must be stored safely, some perhaps for 200 years, without leaking away into the ground.

Bins lined with a special form of asphalt, resembling a blown up honeycomb or foam, may be the answer. The asphalt linings are already used in canals to prevent loss of water from seepage. Tests made

Dr. Arnold J. Holberg of the Lion Oil Co. division, Monsanto Chemical Co., and Clyde D. Watson of the Oak Ridge (Tenn.) National Laboratory, reported tests in which the asphalt linings stood up under radiation and chemical reactions such as would occur in bins of radioactive wastes. The two made the statements in formal reports to the American Chemical Society at its annual convention.

They estimate bins with these linings could be built at a cost of 3 cents per gallon of wastes to be stored. Costs of other storage methods range from 37 cents to \$2 per gallon. Cheap storage or disposal would be important in total costs of electricity for homes and industry from the atom.

Several years of testing will be needed to show the practicality of large asphalt-lined earthen pits, they said. Much Waste

Dr. Holberg and Watson said one estimate is that by the year 2,000, atomic power plants would be producing 50 to 100 thousand gallons of radioactive wastes every day. Safe storage is essential to safeguard human and animal health.

Dirt roads can be paved economically by using soils along the wayside, mixed with atomized asphalt, said Ladis H. Csany, professor in charge of the bituminous research laboratory, Iowa State College, Ames, Iowa.

Prof. Csany said research and tests showed that common soils, containing large amounts of clay, limestone and other materials, can be treated with atomized asphalt and mixed with crushed rock in a single operation.

The atomized asphalt acts as a binder to hold the particles of soil together. It results in a durable, waterproof, all-weather pavement, he said.

Norway Bans Jets Sale to Middle East

OSLO, Norway (AP)—Norway's Socialist government declared today it will not sell arms to Israel or any other nation in the Middle East during the present tense situation there.

The statement was made in the wake of a campaign by some sections of the press for sale of 33 obsolete Vampire jet fighters to Israel for about \$430,000. Arbeiderbladet, the Socialist Party newspaper, had joined in the campaign.

A spokesman said the government found no reason to change its previous stand on arms sales to the Middle East.

A Foreign Office spokesman declared the question of shipping jets to Israel had been settled last fall. Israel had asked to buy the planes, now mothballed at Norwegian air fields, and ammunition for the Vampire's guns.

"At that time the government found itself unable to approve the sale because of the tense situation in the Middle East," the spokesman said.

"The present situation is even more tense, and the Norwegian government has not found reason to change its stand on arms shipments to these areas."

Cloud Seeders Defend Rain Hike Figures

TUCSON, Ariz. (AP)—The President's advisory committee on weather control stood behind its report Thursday that cloud seeding operations in California, Washington and Oregon had increased precipitation from 9 to 17 per cent.

The report, issued in February, was criticized here at a meeting of world experts on weather modification Tuesday night. The claim was made that the results were arrived at in a manner that was statistically unsound.

Capt. Howard T. Orville, chairman of the committee, issued a statement that said in part: "Outstanding meteorologists not connected with commercial seeding, but with experience in this field, have expressed the view that the indication of increases in precipitation stated in the report is of the order of magnitude to be reasonably expected under the conditions and in the areas studied."

The criticisms made at the Tucson meeting appear to have been stimulated by the documents which accompanied the release of the interim report, and not by the report itself.

Miss Truman's Fiance Confirms Honeymoon Plans

NEW YORK (AP)—Clifton Daniel, Margaret Truman's fiance, says they will honeymoon in Nassau, The Bahamas, after their April 21 wedding at the Independence. Mr. Daniel, home of Count and Countess Guy de la Fregoniere had been offered to them for their honeymoon.

The countess, the former Philadelphia heiress Priscilla Dickerson, reportedly is a longtime friend of Daniel's.

Pilot Killed in Sabrejet Crash

TRAVIS AIR FORCE BASE (AP)—An Air Force F86 sabrejet from the 2nd Fighter-Interceptor Squadron exploded while coming in for a landing Thursday, killing the pilot.

Air Force police warned the public away from the area. One officer cautioned newspapermen "don't go out there, it's dangerous. There are live rockets out there."
