Court Studies Dam Moving On Champoege
Marion County Court Thursday delayed action pending further study of possible removal of portions of an old dam on Champoege Creek near its junction with the Willamette River.

Federal Tax Lien No Bar To Candidates

Attorney General Robert Y. Thornton ruled here Thursday that the filing or existence of a federal tax lien against the property of a candidate for nomination or election to a county office does not bar the candidate from running for such office.

The attorney general further held that Article II of the Oregon constitution applies only to those persons who hold or held a public office and, in connection with such office, failed to account for and pay over all sums which such officer received in his official capacity and was required by law to pay over to his successor or other proper governmental authority.

Thornton, in another ruling, said that prior opinions held that the county treasurer was the lawful custodian of school bond funds but a question arose by reason of certain statutory amendments by the 1955 Legislature.

In his latest opinion Thornton held that it is only in the case of "county school districts" that the school clerk may be made the custodian of school bond funds. In the case of other school districts the county treasurer remains the custodian of proceeds of the sale of school bonds.

The latter opinion was requested by the Harney County district attorney.

Mock Political Convention Set At Willamette

Delegations from 11 Oregon colleges and universities will travel to the Willamette University campus on May 11 and 12 to attend the Mock Democratic Convention.

In order to give students the practical knowledge of a nominating session, the convention will follow the exact pattern of the National Democratic Convention.

During the first day students will take part in a national committee meeting, a resolution committee meeting determining foreign and domestic policy, delegation chairmen, and campaign manager meetings. The actual convention sessions, caucuses, banquet, and nominating session will take place on Saturday, May 12.

Expected to preview the outcome of the Oregon Presidential primary the following week, the convention will be broadcast by radio stations KOCO, KEX, KGAE, and KSLM.

Colleges represented will be University of Oregon, Oregon State College, Portland State College, Lewis and Clark, Portland University, Linfield Pacific University, Oregon College of Education, Reed, Southern Oregon College, Maryhurst, and Willamette.
