Word has been received here that funeral services were held Tuesday at Rockwell City, Iowa, for Mrs. Louise Koon, a longtime resident of Salem. She was 97.

Mrs. Koon came to Salem in 1911 with her husband, Charles J. Koon, who died in 1922. Miss Lou Koon, her daughter, lived in Salem for 23 years and died in 1950.

In recent years, Mrs. Koon was a member of First Methodist Church, having transferred in 1910 from Isaac Lee Memorial. She was a member of Salem Rebekah Lodge.

Survivors include three daughters, Myrtle Wall and Mattie Holmes of Rockwell City and Laverne Handley of Valparaiso, Calif. Mrs. Koon had eight grandchildren, 16 great-grandchildren and eight great-great-grandchildren. Interment was in the family plot in Roberts, Ill.

A 17-year-old Salem boy was awarded a \$15,000 judgment Thursday when a Marion County Circuit Court jury returned verdict in his favor in a personal injury suit based on a traffic accident.

Ronald Graves, 17, son of E. Bush St., won the judgment against Mr. and Mrs. Dallas D. Shipley and the Dairy Cooperative Association, both of Salem. The suit was brought by Ronald's father, Ben F. Graves, based on a three-vehicle accident Aug. 11, 1955, on South Liberty Street, when Graves was driving a motorcycle when the accident occurred, was hospitalized for a broken arm and leg.

The original complaint sought \$15,000 damages.
