Meetings to Plan United Fund Drive

Plans and strategy for the 1936 United Fund campaign will be proposed, studied and perhaps adopted at important meetings early this week. Two national U.F. officials are scheduled to outline latest trends in budgeting and campaigning.

First on the agenda is a meeting of the Salem U.F. Budget Committee at 4 p.m. Monday at fund headquarters. Objective will be to organize for this year's budgeting job and to be present to offer suggestions will be Charles Sampson, National U.F. field secretary.

Annual Institute
Annual U.F. Labor-Management Institute is scheduled at 6:30 p.m. Tuesday at the Hotel Marion and will feature panel discussions and a talk by George Dooley, of the labor participation department of the national organization. Dooley will discuss labor's part in the fund drives.

Sampson will talk on modern trends in fund campaigns at a meeting of the Salem U.F. board of directors Tuesday, 7:30 p.m. at the Hotel Marion. Sampson and Dooley also will appear at the Hotel Senator.

Panel Planned
Panels at the Tuesday evening institute will include one on methods of procedure in campaigns, with William O. Hammond as head. Otto J. Wilson will serve as coordinator of a second panel dealing with the agency programs of the 48 states. Also a feature of the institute will be a talk by Joseph Dodd.

Aimed at coordinating efforts by labor and management in promoting U.F. campaigns, the institute is jointly sponsored by the Salem United Funds organization, headed by Herbert E. Barker, and the Salem Labor-Management Committee, whose head is Norman O. Nilsen, state labor commissioner. Nilsen will preside at the institute, which is in its fifth year.

Science Show to Conclude Run Today at Bush Park

The General Motors Parade of Progress will conclude its five-day showing at Bush Park today. Tent show and 26 outside exhibits will be in continuous operation from 2 to 10 p.m.

The big science show had attracted almost 35,000 persons through Saturday night, according to Bruce G. Overby, director of the Parade.

A survey taken at the crowded Saturday performance indicated that about two out of five visitors were from outside Salem, some from as far as 50 miles away.

Immediately after the show closes tonight, preparations will start for departure from the city on Tuesday morning. Personnel will start tearing down the Aero-dome tent, Futurelines will be ready for the road and exhibits packed in vans.

The show is scheduled to open in Portland on Wednesday night and will exhibit in that city through Tuesday, April 24.

Trust Firm Near Choice For Memorial

Selection of a Carroll Moore memorial has reached the negotiation stage among "three or four" offers and the final choice may come soon it was learned here Saturday.

An official of Pioneer Trust Co. administrators of the trust fund left by Moore to provide a memorial to Oregon pioneers, said letters had been sent out on the narrowed list to get technical details including price. He said one answer had been received so far.

Apparently out of the running was the marble and bronze offering "Spirit of Oregon Pioneer" of Salem's Mrs. Frances Kells MacCallin which had the endorsement of the Salem Art Association. Mrs. Kells said Saturday she had received no communication from the trust company.

Some seven models of memorials had been offered to the firm which faces the task of choosing the winner in the controversial case. Some \$36,000 has accumulated in the fund left by Moore, a former elevator operator for the state who died in 1927.

Selection of the memorial exploded into the national limelight three years ago when a citizens committee chose "Venus Victorious" a bronze sculpture of the French artist Renoir. A barrage of protest against the nude statue resulted in its withdrawal.

Results of a public poll on the seven models has not been revealed. Considerable agitation for a memorial entrance to the Salem Pioneer Cemetery has been reported.
