

# Dag Sure Right Way Walked

## Plans Visit to Jordan, Syria

JERUSALEM (AP) — Dag Hammarskjöld wound up the second week of his Middle East peace mission Friday with the declaration "I am sure we are on the right road."

"Personally, I don't see any reason why we should lose it," the U. N. secretary general told newsmen after completing four days of talks with Israeli officials in Jerusalem.

Against a background of new friction on the Jordan-Israel frontier, Hammarskjöld took a plane for his temporary headquarters in Beirut, Lebanon.

With conferences in Egypt and Israel out of the way, he expects to visit Jordan and Syria next week. He opened the mission with his flight from New York April 4 under security council orders to seek an easing of tension.

"This particular job is very much like attempting to build an arch," he said in a statement at Lydda airport. "I feel the second stone put into the building here in Israel is as good as the first one (in Cairo). But an arch is not stable until all stones are in place."

The Egyptian-Israeli cease-fire agreement, ordered effective Wednesday night, is the mission's biggest announced accomplishment.

Egypt charged Israel has violated that cease-fire agreement both around and in the air. Israeli spokesmen denied it and U. N. officials in Cairo described the case as "minor incidents of little importance."

With conferences in Egypt and Israel out of the way, he expects to visit Jordan and Syria next week. He opened the mission with his flight from New York April 4 under security council orders to seek an easing of tension.

McKay will oppose Phil Hitchcock in the GOP primary for the right to meet Morse in the November election.

# Dr. Cornelius Added to WU Political Unit

Replacing State Sen. Mark C. Hatfield in the political science department of Willamette University will be Dr. William C. Cornelius, acting chairman of the department of political science at Milwaukee Extension Division of the University of Wisconsin.

Hatfield has resigned to run for secretary of state. His post as dean of students at Willamette will be filled by Elmer C. Rieck, now at University of Wisconsin.

Completing his undergraduate work at Vanderbilt University in 1934, Dr. Cornelius graduated Phi Beta Kappa and magna cum laude. He returned the following year to complete qualifications for a master's degree. Additional graduate work was done at Princeton and later at Columbia University, where Dr. Cornelius obtained his Ph.D. in Public Law and Government.

Dr. Cornelius' background has included work as a research assistant with the U. S. Department of Justice in 1939, director of the social science reference room of the Library of Congress from 1937-43, and information and educational specialist and lecturer on international relations in government for the U. S. Army until 1946.

Turning to college teaching, Dr. Cornelius became assistant professor of government at the University of Miami and assistant professor of political science at the University of Florida between 1947 and 1955.

# Probe Yields Dead Couple, Arm-in-Arm

CLE ELIUM, Wash. (AP) — Inquiries by worried relatives led Friday to the discovery of the bodies of a farm couple who are believed to have died together at least 40 days ago.

Discovered by Cle Elum and Roslyn police were the bodies of August Johnson, 62, and his wife, Lulu, 65. Investigation was at the request of Gordon Eliason of Mount Vernon, a son of Mrs. Johnson by a former marriage at the request of his sister, Mrs. Lorraine Sladek of Anahiem, Calif. Mrs. Sladek had been concerned because the couple had failed to arrive for a scheduled visit.

Eliason called police when he couldn't gain entry to the house. The bodies were found, linked with arms around each other. Cause of death was not immediately determined. Mail in the rural box dated back to March 2.

# Monkeys En Masse Bring Airline Plea

WASHINGTON (AP) — Seaboard and Western Airlines advised the government Friday that its monkey business has given rise to a serious problem. They smell.

In fact, said a petition to the Civil Aeronautics Board, monkeys "en masse" give off an offensive odor, damaging to morale of personnel flying plane loads of them to this country.

"Monkey odor pervades, permeates and penetrates," the petition said. "Nothing within an enclosed aircraft can escape its effects."

The airline asked the CAB to lift its ban on free passenger travel so that Sydney Grant, a New York chemist, can be carried on a round trip from New York to Frankfurt, Germany, and London.

Seaboard said Grant could experiment with chemical combinations "in an attempt to overpower and eliminate" the problem.

It said that if he is unsuccessful on the first trip, he will make others.

"These trips definitely will not be for pleasure," the airline added.

# Neuberger Challenges Resource Idea

WASHINGTON (AP) — The Eisenhower administration's record on natural resources was challenged Friday by Sen. Richard Neuberger (D-Ore) in a speech at the annual meeting of the American Society of Newspaper Editors. The national resource policy was denounced by another senator, Barry Goldwater (R-Ariz.).

Neuberger accused the administration of surrendering national resources to "predatory interests" and said the government favors public power only when the sites are so poor "that no private utility would touch them with a 300-mile transmission line."

Sen. Goldwater accused the Oregon senator of trying to show "the big doubt." Goldwater said "this is the application of the big doubt technique, to use twisted and distorted facts and the halitruh."

Neuberger cited the administration's support of the 700 million dollar Upper Colorado River project, at which he said the government can produce only power costing six to nine mills per kilowatt, while it refused to support federal development of Hells Canyon, where Neuberger said power could be produced costing only 2.7 mills.

"The reason is very obvious," Neuberger said. "The private utilities don't want the Upper Colorado sites but private utilities do covet Hells Canyon."

Goldwater countered by saying the giveaway charges are unwarranted and that the Interior Department is run "to the best advantage of all the people of the United States."

# Butler Says GOP Depriving Demos of TV

Democratic National Chairman Paul M. Butler accused the Republicans Friday of a "carefully planned effort" to deprive his party of free radio-TV time.

Butler said the Democrats are facing a "financial crisis" but the Republicans "have got the money to buy all the time they need."

Leonard W. Hall replied that Butler's "crybaby alibi is a transparent effort to cover up the disension in his own party and the utter bankruptcy of the Democratic program."

Only \$75,000

Butler told members of the national committee, convened in Washington for a two-day campaign strategy session, that the Democrats have only \$75,000 on hand. He said this is not enough to buy and produce a half hour program on a major TV network.

Against this, he said, the Republicans have five million dollars. The GOP national committee commented that was the gross from the "salute to Eisenhower" dinners last Jan. 20. The Republicans said the net was four million, which has been divided among the national, congressional and state committees.

Hope for \$250,000

The Democrats hope to raise \$250,000 from their \$100 a plate Woodrow Wilson centennial dinner in Washington Saturday night.

Butler said NBC had offered to give him and Hall 7 1/2 minutes every Friday morning on the Dave Garroway show to discuss campaign issues, but Hall turned down the offer after Butler had accepted. Butler said he saw in this a "carefully conceived effort to deprive us of time to get our story to the American people."

Hall replied in a statement, saying: "In recent months Paul Butler has whined about a so-called one-party press, his inability to raise money and now his inability to get free television time. And in some way which is not clear to anyone, he tries to blame me. How silly can he get?"

Plans Announcement

Butler announced plans for a weekly Democratic tabloid newspaper, saying: "We are going to break this iron curtain of one-party press. We're going to get our story to the people regardless of what the opposition does to control the media of communication."

# Elk Problem Solved But Sleep Lost

ASTORIA (AP) — The Astoria Rod and Gun Club found out it could drive away muskoxen elk in the Lewis and Clark Valley with firecrackers.

But now they have another problem — sleeping farmers.

The club used the firecrackers, timed to explode at 15-minute intervals, in an experiment on the farm of Jack Burkhardt on the outskirts of Astoria. The firecrackers, supplied by the Oregon Game Commission, came 12 to a string and are attached to a long rope, spaced to fire at approximately 15-minute intervals. All that Burkhardt had to do was light the fuse and go to sleep.

One of his neighbors mistook the noise for rifle shots and phoned to inquire who was shooting up the woods.

Elk have been threatening farm fields here because the late spring has retarded growth of elk feed in the hills.

# Tractor Flips, Kills Logger

MONUMENT, Ore. (AP) — One man was killed and another injured seriously when a logging tractor overturned in the woods near this Eastern Oregon community Friday.

John Vestal, 28, of Monument, was fatally injured when he was pinned under the tractor, James Nash, who also was riding the vehicle, was badly hurt.

They were working for the M & R Logging Co. in the woods eight miles north of here.

# Roseburg Vetoes Special Levy for School District

ROSEBURG (AP) — Roseburg voters for the second time this spring turned down a special levy of \$1,069.821 for the Roseburg School District.

The vote was 2,386 to 1,566. At the March 9 election the measure was defeated, 900-921.

Total estimated expenditures in the defeated budget were \$2,407,764, a little more than half of which was within the 6 per cent limitation.

# Reports of Ambulance Firms Selling Bodies To Undertakers Eyed

BOSTON, Tex. (AP) — Reports of bodies being sold to undertakers by ambulance services were examined Friday by the Harris County district attorney's office and the State Board of Morticians.

The entire record of testimony from a court of inquiry held before Justice of the Peace Dave Thompson is being examined to determine if there have been violations of state laws.

Houston's emergency ambulances are privately owned by funeral homes and ambulance companies. The police department dispatches the vehicles to accidents but has no control over the ambulance drivers and attendants.

# Kremlin Twins Agree to Join Peace Search

LONDON (AP) — Soviet Premier Nikhita Khrushchev and communist boss Nikhita Khrushchev agreed Friday to join the British in a search for a Middle East peace plan.

The Kremlin leaders and Prime Minister Eden ordered their experts to submit proposals for a U. N. program aimed to avoid war between Arabs and Israelis.

Diplomatic sources said President Eisenhower will be kept informed.

A joint communique said of the morning's talks: "This meeting was devoted to a discussion on the Middle East. It was agreed that representatives of both sides should prepare, on the basis of this useful discussion, further consideration."

The experts were ordered to report by next Tuesday, diplomatic sources said.

Khrushchev told the British at a luncheon Thursday that communists and capitalists, however much they dislike each other, must strive to maintain peace lest H-bomb warfare destroy both.

The British have long had the impression that Russia does not see the Middle East situation as dangerous.

All three major powers — the United States, Britain and Russia — have come out in favor of action through the U. N. to prevent a Middle East war and promote a stable peace.

# Report Card Fright Causes Lad to Vanish

EVERETT (AP) — Eleven-year-old Ernest Dawson was sent home from school Wednesday to get his report card for return to his teacher with a parent's signature.

For two nights and nearly two days he became the object of a wide search. Police searched the city and asked Snohomish and King County officers to be on the lookout.

The mystery of his whereabouts ended Friday. A golfer recognized Ernest as he went to a concession in Legion Park to get a bottle of "pop."

Police said the boy, son of Mr. and Mrs. A. P. Dawson, told them he had slept in the park both nights and had had only one soft drink for nourishment.

P. S.—The police didn't get the details on what the report card showed.

# Poles Purge Stalin-Era Communists

VIENNA, Austria (AP) — Communist-ruled Poland began purging its Stalin-era purgers Friday by firing three top officials.

They were Stanislaw Radewicz, minister of state farms and former minister of state security; prosecutor general Stefan Kalinowski; and the chief military prosecutor, Gen. Stanislaw Zarakowski.

Vienna specialists in Polish affairs expressed belief these dismissals, announced by the Warsaw radio, heralded a new era purge trial.

In these three men the Polish leadership under new party boss Edward Ochab has potential scapegoats for Red trials of the Stalin era they now want to disown.

Many Victims

Many victims of these trials — especially the "Titists" such as former deputy premier Wladyslaw Gonnika — have been released and restored to their old places of honor in the communist party. It remains to punish the police and prosecutors who handled their cases.

Vienna sources said Radewicz was the most notorious in the group. Schooled by the Soviet NKVD, his police terror methods as Polish security chief were described as matching those of the Russians under the executed Soviet secret police boss, L. P. Beria.

Especially Hard

Radewicz, 53, was especially hard on anti-communists and alleged "deviationists." When Radewicz's methods were exposed by Col. Joseph Swiatko, who defected to the West, the security ministry was reorganized and he was shifted to minister for state farms.

There he started a system of using criminal labor on farms. This backfired in a wave of crime and sabotage so notorious that even the Polish communist press had to protest.
